ABOUT THE TOURNAMENT

The *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup has grown enormously in stature since the inaugural edition in South Africa 15 years ago, which was won by a young India side led by Mahendra Singh Dhoni.

The two close matches between India and Pakistan, including the final, and Yuvraj Singh's six sixes in an over from Stuart Broad, essentially set the platform for the event's popularity, even as the format grew apace the world over.

Pakistan won the second edition of the tournament in England in 2009, defeating Sri Lanka in the final at Lord's. Associate Members enjoyed great success, with the Netherlands defeating England and Ireland beating Bangladesh. One of the great strengths of the tournament has been the stage it gives growing cricketing nations to test themselves against the best. The format is now acknowledged as the one driving popularity of the game worldwide.

In 2009, the first ever women's tournament was held alongside the men's event, with double-header matches played at the semi-final and final stages. The women's tournaments became stand-alone events from 2018.

In 2010, England captured their first ever *ICC* global title, defeating Australia by seven wickets in the final. Then, in 2012, the West Indies beat hosts Sri Lanka by 36 runs to win the men's title, their first *ICC* trophy since the *ICC* Champions Trophy in 2004.

Sri Lanka won the 2014 edition in Bangladesh to join a select band of those to have also won the 50-over *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cup, before the West Indies became the first to win the tournament twice in 2016. Carlos Brathwaite's sensational four consecutive sixes off Ben Stokes capped a stupendous effort by the Darren Sammy-led side.

In 2021, Australia beat New Zealand by eight wickets, adding the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup trophy to their already crowded World Cup cabinet for the first time.

The reigning champions host the 2022 event with the hopes of being the first team in *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup history to defend their title and win the tournament in their own backyard.

HOW TEAMS QUALIFIED

FROM ICC MEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2021 (12 TEAMS)

Afghanistan, Australia, Bangladesh, England, India, Namibia, New Zealand, Pakistan, Scotland, South Africa, Sri Lanka and the West Indies qualified for the ICC Men's T20 World Cup 2022 by reaching the Super 12 of last year's *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2021. Eight of these teams qualified directly for the Super 12 phase: Australia and New Zealand as the winners and runners-up of the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2021, and Afghanistan, Bangladesh, England, India, Pakistan and South Africa based on their positions in the MRF Tyres *ICC* Men's T20I world rankings on 15 November 2021. The other four qualifiers – Namibia, Scotland, Sri Lanka and the West Indies – were placed in the Group stage.

FROM ICC MEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2022 GLOBAL QUALIFIERS (4 TEAMS)

The remaining teams qualified through two Global Qualifiers. The UAE and Ireland qualified via Global Qualifier A, which took place in Oman in February 2022; while Zimbabwe and the Netherlands qualified through Global Qualifier B, held in Bulawayo in July 2022.

THE TROPHY

Designed and manufactured by Links of London, the ICC Men's T20 World Cup trophy is based on the field dynamics of balls being hit to the boundary and fielders returning them in an interactive process. It has a sense of open space and vigour and captures the constant movements of T20 cricket. Made of silver and rhodium, it represents a youthful and edgy design.

PLAYING CONDITIONS

ICC CODE OF CONDUCT

The *ICC* Code of Conduct is part of the *ICC*'s continuing efforts to maintain the public image, popularity and integrity of cricket by providing: (a) an effective means to deter any participant from conducting themselves improperly on and off the field of play or in a manner that is contrary to the spirit of cricket; and (b) a robust disciplinary procedure pursuant to which all matters of improper conduct can be dealt with fairly, with certainty and in an expeditious manner.

DUCKWORTH-LEWIS-STERN METHOD

The Duckworth-Lewis-Stern (D-L-S) method sets revised targets in rain-interrupted limited-overs matches, taking into consideration the run-scoring resources at the disposal of the two sides. Information on the D-L-S method can be found on **the ICC website**.

ILLEGAL BOWLING ACTIONS

An Illegal Bowling Action is where a player is throwing rather than bowling the ball. This is defined by the *ICC* as being where the player's elbow extends by an amount of more than 15 degrees between their arm reaching the horizontal and the ball being released. Match Officials in international cricket use the naked eye and their cricketing experience to decide whether they believe a player may be using an Illegal Bowling Action – and, if so, they will submit a report.

ANTI-CORRUPTION

Cricket is considered by many to be a world leader in the fight against corruption in sport and strives to do its best to work towards the vision to "Keep Cricket Clean". All players and officials who take part in the top level of international cricket pass through the Anti-Corruption Unit (ACU)'s education programme.

The *ICC*'s Anti-Corruption Managers coordinate the ACU's prevention measures, and are present at tournaments and international series to ensure that strict anti-corruption protocols are enforced at all venues, particularly around the dressing room areas. ANTI-DOPING

Th *ICC* has a zero-tolerance approach to doping and is a signatory to the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) since July 2006. The *ICC* Anti-Doping Code, compliant with the World Anti-Doping Code, ensures cricket plays its part in the global fight against drugs in sport. ANTI-DISCRIMINATION

The *ICC* has a strict Anti-Discrimination Code that confirms a level of commitment from the *ICC* and its Members to promote and encourage participation at all levels, regardless of race, religion, culture, colour, descent, national or ethnic origin and to ensure that there is no discrimination in the sport.

The diverse history and culture of the game draws people together. There is a strong tradition of fans from rival teams enjoying matches alongside each other, while cricket players too are known to mingle with each other and often help each other out with the technicalities of the game. MEDIA ACCREDITATION

The *ICC* has accredited media from all over the world for the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2022. The tournament will be operating under a high trust model, and therefore all accredited media and participants are requested to practice safe behaviour for the duration of the event.

As in previous tournaments, the *ICC* will follow its priority order in allotting match-day seats. This is done in tandem by the *ICC* Media and Accreditation teams, keeping in mind the teams playing. We follow the general principles outlined in the media advisory and FAQs document on accreditation, which we shared at the start of the accreditation process.

Media accreditation passes may be collected from the venues. Reporters will be allotted seats, and a limited number of photographers will be allotted photo positions keeping in mind the biosafety protocols. Updates through the tournament will be sent out either individually or to the tournament media email list that we maintain. Please remember to read our advisories: there may be changes in protocols, biosafety measures or the way the media interactions are conducted, whether owing to changes in government guidelines or on advice from our own colleagues.

WHAT IF MY ACCREDITATION IS LOST?

If your tournament accreditation pass is lost or stolen, please report it to the Accreditation team and make a formal complaint at the nearest police station. Upon completion of the lost/stolen declaration form, the tournament accreditation will be replaced providing the individual has appropriate ID. If the original tournament accreditation is found, it should be surrendered, and the police should be informed. Please note that no additional temporary or match day passes will be provided.



CODE OF CONDUCT FOR MEDIA

Please note that all accredited Non Rights Holders (NRH) media must adhere to the code of conduct for the tournament as well as the tournament media terms and conditions agreed to while signing the accreditation form.

Accreditation cards of journalists will be cancelled if they are found to behave in an inappropriate manner at any of the venues. The *ICC* has a zero-tolerance policy towards racism and sexual harassment, and action will be taken immediately in any such case, which could include suspension of the accreditation card and blacklisting from all *ICC* events.

Journalists could also face suspension from future matches or have their accreditation revoked if they are found to be in violation of other terms and conditions, including those of video and audio recordings at venues.

NO SHOWS

Journalists who have changed their plans – those withdrawing from the tournament, those who become unavailable to attend particular matches, and/or those who need to change their selection of matches – must please send details in an e-mail to media.accreditation@t20worldcup.com.au.

Failure to do so could affect their chances of attending future *ICC* events. Journalists not informing us of their inability to attend any match of this tournament may not be given a match ticket for subsequent games.

BIO-SAFETY PROTOCOLS

The Event Biosafety Scientific Advisory Group (BSAG) has recommended that the event should be staged within a Health-Safe Environment (HSE). The HSE is defined as an approach to constructing an environment where individuals take personal responsibility for managing their own health and safety to prevent the transmission of COVID-19.

The BSAG has strongly recommended participants are fully vaccinated, and that they use health-mitigation lower-risk behaviours – social distancing, sanitisation, mask-wearing, mixing in open-air spaces – and appropriate early management of illness to safeguard their health and prevent the spread of infection.

The success of the event relies on everyone, including media personnel, taking personal responsibility and not attending venues if you feel unwell. If you attend with symptoms and are found to have contracted COVID-19, you will be impacting other colleagues.

- For all media sitting indoors for matches, masks are mandatory except when eating or drinking – i.e. in media boxes, indoor media areas, photographers' working rooms, etc.
- Masks must be worn for all media conferences and mixed zone activities.
- For photographers working outside, there is a recommendation that masks should be worn, but this is not mandatory.

Some other important points to note:

- Do not attend a match or training session if you are unwell. Please let the media operations team know if you will not be attending a match.
- If you test positive for COVID-19 at any time, you will need to undertake any isolation period imposed by government guidelines at that time and are personally responsible for understanding your obligations.

Built in 1925, Kardinia Park is a 36,000-crowd capacity stadium that is steeped in history – and an icon of Geelong. The stadium is a rare asset for a regional city: a source of pride for the community, and one that allows major events once reserved for state capital cities to take place in Geelong.

Kardinia Park has undergone a number of significant redevelopments since 2005 – including the northern end that, once complete, will bring the stadium's capacity to 40,000. The stadium's iconic light towers mean that it is visible no matter which direction you enter the city from.

Known as Victoria's regional home of cricket, Kardinia Park currently plays host to the Melbourne Renegades in the KFC Big Bash League.







The venue currently consists of the Ricky Ponting Stand, the David Boon Stand and the Members Pavilion. There is also one smaller stand and a traditional "hill" on the eastern boundary, which collectively contribute to a capacity of 19,500. The highest attendance ever recorded at the ground was 18,149 on 10 January 2016 for a KFC Big Bash League match between the Hobart Hurricanes and Perth Scorchers. The playing surface dimensions are 175 x 135 metres – slightly longer but somewhat narrower than the MCG.

The 10-strip centre wicket area consists of couch grass, which has been successfully propagated in a colder southern climate, and English rye in the perimeter pitches. Traditionally, the wicket has provided bowlers with early movement, but the pitch tends to become a batting paradise as the match progresses, with the ground influenced by afternoon sea breezes off the River Derwent.








Hugging the hillsides along the broad River Derwent, Hobart is Australia's second oldest city.


BRUNTON AVE, EAST MELBOURNE VIC 3002 MELBOURNE / NAARM, VICTORIA

Built in 1853, the Melbourne Cricket Ground (MCG) has a capacity of 94,000 – making it the largest stadium in the Southern Hemisphere and the 10th biggest in the world. It's a stadium rich in history and the scene of some of Australian sports' most memorable moments.

The MCG is the birthplace of Test cricket (1877) and One-Day International (ODI) cricket (1971). It also hosted the 1956 Olympic Games and 2006 Commonwealth Games, along with a range of major international events and concerts. Apart from Lord's, the MCG is the only other stadium in the world to host the ICC Cricket World Cup Final more than once: in 1992 and 2015.

The MCG underwent significant redevelopments in 1991, when the Great Southern Stand was rebuilt, and again in 2003-05, when the Northern Stand replaced the old Ponsford, Members and Olympic Stands. The MCG hosted the final of the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2020 and will also host the final of the ICC Men's T20 World Cup 2022.





MOHAMMAD NABI



Made his T20I debut against Ireland at Colombo in 2010

Playing in his sixth *ICC* Men's T20 WC

Has been at the heart of Afghanistan's rise to the global cricketing stage and was the first player from his country selected in the IPL

Scored 52 against Zimbabwe and took 4-20 against Hong Kong in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2016; five years later he scored 127 runs and was only dismissed twice

He has had a couple of stints as Afghanistan's captain, taking over the role from Nawroz Mangal in March 2013 and leading the side to the *ICC* Men's CWC 2015





Made his T20I debut against Bangladesh at Mirpur in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Having been part of Afghanistan's squad for the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2018, he went on to represent them in the 2018 ACC Emerging Teams Asia Cup

He made his senior debut for Mis Ainak Region in the 2017 domestic One Day Tournament and represented Paktia in the first edition of the Afghanistan Premier League tournament

Enjoyed an excellent start to his T20I career, taking 2-31 and 3-22 in his first two matches

DARWISH RASOOLI



Made his T20I debut against Bangladesh at Mirpur in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He scored his maiden one-day century for Speen Ghar in just his second match, striking an unbeaten 130 again Amo, and struck two half-centuries in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2018

He went on to be the leading run-scorer in the 2018 Ahmad Shah Abdali Four-Day Tournament, finishing with 1,073 runs in eight matches

That haul included innings of 249 against Speen Ghar and an unbeaten 200 against Boost in successive matches

FAREED AHMAD



DOB: 10 Aug 1994 BORN: Nangarhar STYLE: LHB/LFM

Made his T20I debut against UAE at Dubai in in 2016

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

A talented left-arm seamer, he has found it difficult to sustain a place in the national team due to their spin-heavy attack

His ODI debut came back in 2014 and he made a strong start to his T20I career two years later, picking up 11 wickets in his first seven matches, before injury and poor form plagued him

He made a successful return to national colours in 2021, and bowled well in the Asia Cup in 2022, notably taking 3-31 against Pakistan





DOB: 22 Sep 2000 BORN: Baghlan STYLE: RHB/LFM

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Abu Dhabi in 2021

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Having represented Afghanistan in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2020, Chennai Super Kings included him as a net bowler in their squad for the 2021 IPL

Started his T20I career well, taking six wickets in his first three matches

He went on to enjoy a successful Asia Cup in 2022, taking 3-11 against Sri Lanka and 3-31 against Pakistan

HAZRATULLAH ZAZAI



Made his T20I debut against the UAE at Dubai in 2016

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

In the inaugural season of the Afghanistan Premier League, he hit six sixes in an over for Kabul against Balkh and reached his 50 from just 12 deliveries

In February 2019, he struck an unbeaten 162 off 62 balls against Ireland in just his fifth T20I, which included a record 16 sixes

Played five matches for Afghanistan in the ICC Men's T20 WC 2021, scoring 44 against Ireland and 33 against Namibia

IBRAHIM ZADRAN



Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at Lucknow in 2019

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He was the leading run-scorer for Afghanistan in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2018, with 186 runs in five matches – including two half-centuries

He repeated the feat two years later in South Africa, where he scored 240 runs in his five matches, passing 50 on three occasions

Batted superbly in the 2022 Asia Cup, where he was Afghanistan's top-scorer with 196 runs at an average of 65.33

MUJEEB ZADRAN



DOB: 28 Mar 2001 BORN: Khost STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Sharjah in 2018

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He combines traditional off-spin with leg-spin and googlies, frequently taking the new ball

He took 20 wickets in five matches as Afghanistan won the U19 Asia Cup and subsequently helped his side to the semifinals in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2018, which prompted an IPL deal

Marked his first appearance in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 by taking 5-20 against Scotland, a record for Afghanistan in the competition

NAJIBULLAH ZADRAN



Made his T20I debut against India at Colombo in 2012

Playing in his fifth ICC Men's T20 WC

Scored an unbeaten 48 as Afghanistan defeated the West Indies at Nagpur in the 2016 competition, and struck 59 from 34 balls against Scotland in 2021

His maiden ODI century came in 2019 against Ireland at Dehradun, and he opened the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019 with 51 against Australia

He also has extensive Twenty20 experience around the world, with franchises in Canada, Pakistan, the Caribbean and Bangladesh

NAVEEN UL HAQ



Made his T20I debut against Bangladesh at Chattogram in 2019

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Captained the Afghanistan team in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2018, leading them to the semi-final, where they were eliminated after a washout against Pakistan at Queenstown

He has experience of playing in Twenty20 leagues around the world, in Sri Lanka, Bangladesh and the Caribbean

Representing Leicestershire, he was the leading wicket-taker in the Blast in 2021 with 26 wickets, and added 24 more in 2022

QAIS AHMAD



DOB: 15 Aug 2000 BORN: Nangarhar STYLE: RHB/LB

Made his T20I debut against Ireland at Greater Noida in 2020

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

First made his name in the 2018 Ahmad Shah Abdali Four-Day Tournament, when he was the leading wicket-taker for Speen Ghar Region with 41 wickets

He was Afghanistan's leading wicket-taker in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2018 with 14 wickets, and he has experience of playing in Twenty20 leagues in England, Australia and the Caribbean

Marked his T20I debut by taking 3-25 in his four overs, despite ending up on the losing side

RAHMANULLAH GURBAZ



Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Dhaka in 2019

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

In October 2019 he was the leading runscorer for Afghanistan in the 2018 ACC U19 Asia Cup, with 117 runs in four matches

In January 2021, he became the first Afghanistan player to score a century on his ODI debut, and he earned deals in Pakistan, Sri Lanka and India in domestic T20 cricket

Struck 46 against Scotland in his first match in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, but his returns fell away after that

RASHID KHAN



Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Bulawayo in 2015

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Took 11 wickets in his first appearance in the competition in 2016, highlighted with figures of 3-11 against Zimbabwe, and opened his ICC T20 2021 with 4-9 against Scotland

Named the 2017 ICC Associate Cricketer of the Year, he has spent much of the past few years top of the ICC T20I bowling rankings

He became the first bowler to take four wickets in four balls in T20I cricket and is the guickest bowler to take 100 wickets in the format, reaching the landmark in iust 53 matches

SALIM SAFI



BORN: Baghlan **STYLE: RHB/RF**

Awaiting his T20I debut

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

His senior debut came for Kunduz Province in the Mirwais Nika Provincial 3-Day Cup in February 2019

He developed into a consistent wicket-taker in the domestic four-day tournament, taking 13 wickets at 21.76 in 2019-20 and 15 wickets at 20.60 in 2021-22

He has been part of the Afghanistan squad to have faced Zimbabwe, the Netherlands and Bangladesh without making the final starting XI on any tour

USMAN GHANI



DOB: 20 Nov 1996 **BORN**: Kabul **STYLE: RHB**

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Bulawayo in 2015

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC


Played just one match in the 2016 competition, scoring 4 against the West Indies at Nagpur

Made his ODI debut for Afghanistan at the age of just 17, and struck a century in just his fourth match

His opening partnership of 236 with Hazratullah Zazai against Ireland at Dehradun in 2019 is a record for any wicket in Twenty20 cricket worldwide







AARON FINCH



Made his T20I debut against England at Adelaide in 2011

Playing in his fourth *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He has twice held the record for the highest score in a T20I – his career-best 172, made against Zimbabwe in 2018, surpassing his 156 that he took off England in 2013

He has played for seven IPL franchises as well as captaining Melbourne Renegades to their first BBL title in 2019

He went on to lead Australia to their first *ICC* Men's T20 WC title in the Middle East in 2021

ASHTON AGAR



DOB: 14 Oct 1993 BORN: Melbourne STYLE: LHB/SLA

Made his T20I debut against South Africa at Johannesburg in 2016

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Made an astonishing international debut by striking a world-record 98 at number 11 in the 2013 Ashes Test at Nottingham

He took 5-24 including a hat-trick against South Africa at Johannesburg in a T20I match in February 2020

Bettered that with 6-30 – the best figures for Australia in the format – against New Zealand at Wellington in March 2021

PAT CUMMINS



DOB: 8 May 1993 BORN: Westmead STYLE: RHB/RF

Made his T20I debut against South Africa at Cape Town in 2011

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Took six wickets in the 2012 competition before injuries laid him low for several years, threatening to end his international career

However, he roared back in 2017 and rose to be ranked the number-one Test bowler in the world

He played a key part in Australia's 2-2 series draw in England in 2019 and captained the side in the 4-0 home win 18 months later, as well as being ever-present in Australia's *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 win

TIM DAVID



DOB: 16 Mar 1996 BORN: Singapore STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut for Singapore against Qatar at Singapore in 2019

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He was raised in Western Australia, but represented Singapore in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC qualifier in 2019 – and playing occasionally for the Scorchers in the BBL

Having joined the Hobart Hurricanes for the 2020-21 season, his stock began to rise, which culminated in earning a contract with Lahore Qalanders in the PSL

Franchise contracts around the world continued to come his way, and he struck 16 sixes in the 2022 IPL for Mumbai Indians





DOB: 8 Jan 1991 BORN: Tamworth STYLE: LHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at Brisbane in 2013

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Grew up idolising Glenn McGrath and he was picked to make an ODI debut against England at the tender age of just 19, with a Test debut coming four years later

A back injury kept him out of the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019, but he returned later in the summer to take the wicket that retained the Ashes for Australia

Took 11 wickets as Australia won *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 and rose to the top of the T20I bowling rankings in February 2022

JOSH INGLIS



DOB: 4 Mar 1995 BORN: Leeds, England STYLE: RHB/WK

WK

Made his T20I debut against Sri Lanka at Sydney in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Relocated to Australia as a 14-year-old, and he enjoyed a breakthrough Sheffield Shield season in 2020-21 with 585 runs

He has been a prolific scorer in the BBL for Perth Scorchers, and enjoyed a prolific summer of 2021 in England, first with Leicestershire and then London Spirit in the Hundred

That earned him a spot in Australia's squad for the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, but he failed to make the final XI in any of the matches

MITCHELL MARSH



Made his T20I debut against South Africa at Johannesburg in 2011

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Captained the Australia U19s to victory in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2010 in New Zealand

Inconsistent at Test level, he achieved some startling highs, such as a memorable Perth Ashes century in 2017, but a lack of form saw him dropped when vice-captain

Enjoyed an excellent tour of the Caribbean in July 2021 with both bat and ball, and was named Player of the Match in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 final for his unbeaten innings of 77





DOB: 14 Oct 1988 BORN: Kew STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Dubai in 2012

Playing in his fifth ICC Men's T20 WC

One of the fastest scorers in world cricket, he possesses a complete repertoire of unconventional strokes

He struck a 51-ball century against Sri Lanka at Sydney in the *ICC* Men's CWC 2015, the fastest in the competition for Australia

Made 74 and 45 in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2014 in Bangladesh, and was ever-present as Australia won the 2021 crown

KANE RICHARDSON



DOB: 12 Feb 1991 BORN: Eudunda STYLE: RHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Dubai in 2014

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

As a teenager, he played for Australia's U19 team, winning the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2010 under the captaincy of Mitchell Marsh

Spent six seasons with the Adelaide Strikers in the BBL, before moving to the Melbourne Renegades ahead of the 2017-18 season

Bowled well on the 2021 tour of New Zealand, taking two three-wicket hauls in the T20I series, but was unused in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021

STEVE **SMITH**



DOB: 2 Jun 1989 BORN: Sydney STYLE: RHB/LB

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Melbourne in 2010

Playing in his fourth *ICC* Men's T20 WC

Took 11 wickets with his leg-breaks as Australia reached the final of the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2010 in the Caribbean

Reinvented as a batsman, he now boasts a Test average that is currently around the 60 mark

He was Australia's leading run-scorer as they won the *ICC* Men's CWC 2015 on home soil, before controversy at Newlands temporarily derailed his career

MITCHELL STARC



DOB: 30 Jan 1990 BORN: Baulkham Hills STYLE: LHB/LF

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Dubai in 2012

Playing in his fourth ICC Men's T20 WC

Took ten wickets in the 2012 competition, which included figures of 3-35 against the West Indies and 3-20 against Pakistan

Named Player of the Tournament in the *ICC* Men's CWC 2015, when he took 22 wickets at 10.18 and helped Australia win the title

He is married to Alyssa Healy, and joined her as an *ICC* T20 WC winner in 2021

MARCUS STOINIS



Made his T20I debut against England at Cardiff in 2015

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

Started his career in his home state before moving to Victoria to further his career, and then moving back to Western Australia in 2019

In just his second ODI he smashed 146 at number seven to nearly bring about an incredible victory against New Zealand at Eden Park in 2017

His unbeaten innings of 147 from 79 balls for Melbourne Stars against Sydney Sixers is the highest individual score in BBL history

MATTHEW WADE



Made his T20I debut against South Africa at Cape Town in 2011

Playing in his third *ICC* Men's T20 WC

Played six games in the 2012 competition in Sri Lanka, but only batted twice

Returned to the Test team for the 2019 Ashes series after two years away, and responded by striking two centuries

That run of form saw him return to both the ODI and T20I squads, and he dramatically won the semi-final of the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 against Pakistan with 41 not out from just 17 balls





DOB: 27 Oct 1986 BORN: Paddington STYLE: LHB/LB

Made his T20I debut against South Africa at Melbourne in 2009

Playing in his seventh ICC Men's T20 WC

He was the first man since 1877 to debut for Australia before playing first-class cricket and he made 89 from 43 balls

Progressed to become a successful Test opener, hitting an unbeaten 335 against Pakistan at Adelaide in 2019

He has had a prolific franchise T20 career, especially in the IPL, and in 2021 became just the fourth batter to pass 10,000 runs in the format

ADAM ZAMPA



DOB: 31 March 1992 BORN: Shellharbour STYLE: RHB/LB

Made his T20I debut against South Africa at Durban in 2016

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

First propelled himself into the minds of the selectors after a successful domestic white-ball season in 2015-16

Played four matches in the 2016 tournament, taking 3-23 against Bangladesh and 2-32 against Pakistan and took 6-19 for Pune against Sunrisers in the IPL that followed

Australia's leading wicket-taker in their march to the title in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 with 13, including figures of 5-19 against Bangladesh







SHAKIB AL HASAN



Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Khulna in 2006

Playing in his eighth ICC Men's T20 WC

Probably the finest cricketer produced by his country, he became the first Bangladeshi to take 100 wickets in T20I cricket

He enjoyed a stellar *ICC* Men's CWC 2019, scoring 606 runs including two centuries, and took a five-wicket haul against Afghanistan

He has been ranked the number 1 all-rounder in all three forms of the international game in the *ICC*'s rankings

AFIF HOSSAIN



Made his T20I debut against Sri Lanka at Dhaka in 2018

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

The vice-captain of the Bangladesh side for the 2016 U19 Asia Cup, he took 5-21 on his BPL debut, which included the wicket of Chris Gayle

He progressed to the Bangladesh squad for the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2018, in which he was his team's leading run-scorer with 276 runs

He was disappointing with the bat in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, scoring just 54 runs in eight innings, but found some form in 2022, with 246 runs at 35.14 in his first nine matches in the year

EBADOT HOSSAIN



DOB: 7 Jun 1994 BORN: Moulvi Bazar STYLE: RHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against Sri Lanka at Dubai in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He was first spotted in the 2016 Robi Pacer Hunt, and was invited to a training camp in Dhaka; he impressed with 4-19 against Chattogram Vikings in the 2019 BPL

In January 2022, he inspired Bangladesh to their first Test victory over New Zealand, taking 6-46 and being named Player of the Match

Took three wickets in his first T20I, but he was expensive, conceding 51 runs in the process

HASAN MAHMUD



DOB: 12 Oct 1999 BORN: Laxmipur STYLE: RHB/RM

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Mirpur in 2020

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He emerged from the BCB's age-group structure, having first played for the Chattogram U16s in 2015, and took nine wickets in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2018

He followed up with 12 wickets in the Dhaka Premier League and in the 2019-20 season, he took ten wickets each in the BPL (T2Os) and Bangladesh Cricket League (first-class) competitions

Spent more than two years out of the T20I team after his debut, before returning for the tour of Zimbabwe in July 2022

LITON DAS



Made his T20I debut against South Africa at Dhaka in 2015

Playing in his Second ICC Men's T20 WC

He represented Bangladesh in both the 2012 and 2014 *ICC* U19 Men's CWCs, and scored 1,024 runs in the 2014-15 National Cricket League for Rangpur, which helped them to the title

His innings of 176 against Zimbabwe at Sylhet in March 2020 remains the highest individual score in Bangladesh ODI history

Played eight matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, with a top score of 44 against the West Indies at Sharjah

MEHIDY HASAN MIRAZ



Made his T20I debut against Sri Lanka at Sylhet in 2018

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He captained Bangladesh in two *ICC* U19 tournaments, and was named Player of the Match in the 3rd-place playoff victory against Pakistan at Fatullah in 2016

A veteran of the Test side, he took a 12-wicket haul against England in just his second Test, and struck a century against the West Indies in 2021

After nearly four years out of the national T20I side, he returned for the Asia Cup in mid-2022, striking 38 against Sri Lanka

MOSADDEK HOSSAIN



DOB: 10 Dec 1995 BORN: Mymensingh STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Khulna in 2016

Playing in his first *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He represented his country in two *ICC* U19 Men's CWC tournaments – in Australia in 2012 and then in the UAE in 2014

He became the first Bangladeshi bowler to take a wicket with his first delivery in ODI cricket and smashed a 23-ball 50 against the West Indies in the Ireland tri-series in 2019

Played two matches in the Asia Cup in 2022, striking 48 not out against Afghanistan and then an unbeaten 24 from just nine balls against Sri Lanka





Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Dhaka in 2015

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

He returned figures of 5-50 and 6-43 in his first two ODIs, and became the first player to be named Player of the Match on both Test and ODI debuts

Took 5-22 against New Zealand at Kolkata in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2016, and added 4-36 against Oman in the tournament in 2021

Injuries have slowed him of late, but he reached 100 ODI wickets during the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019 in just 54 matches – the fourth-fastest at the time

NAZMUL HOSSAIN SHANTO



Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Chattogram in 2019

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Played in two *ICC* U19 tournaments – in 2014 and then in 2016, when he was his team's leading run-scorer with 259 runs in six matches

He was named as the captain of Bangladesh squad for the men's cricket tournament at the 2019 South Asian Games where Bangladesh won the gold medal

A maiden Test century came against Sri Lanka at Pallekele in April 2021, and he added another three months later against Zimbabwe at Harare

NASUM AHMED



Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at Hamilton in 2021

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

His first-class debut came back in 2011 and it took him the best part of a decade to make his international debut

His figures of 4-19 in the first T20I in August 2021 helped Bangladesh defeat Australia for the first time in T20I cricket. and the following month he took 4-10 to bowl New Zealand out for just 93

He repeated those figures of 4-10 in early 2022 against Afghanistan in Mirpur

NURUL HASAN



DOB: 21 Nov 1993 **BORN**: Khulna **STYLE: RHB/WK**

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Khulna in 2016

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He spent three years at the U19 level, playing in two ICC U19 Men's CWC in 2010 and 2012, before graduating to the senior team

He spent four years out of the T20I side before returning on the tour to Zimbabwe in July 2021

Failed to fire in the ICC Men's T20 WC 2021. scoring just five runs in three innings, but found some form on the July 2022 tour of Zimbabwe, striking an unbeaten 42 in the first T201

SHORIFUL ISI AM



Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at Hamilton in 2021

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He was originally inspired by watching Mustafizur Rahman on television, after cycling for half an hour to a village where there was electricity

He starred with nine wickets as Bangladesh won the ICC U19 Men's CWC 2020, bowling with pace and aggression

He received his maiden international call-up the following year, and went on to take four wickets in his four matches in the ICC Men's T20 WC 2021

SOUMYA SARKAR



DOB: 25 Feb 1993 **BORN:** Satkhira **STYLE: LHB/RMF**

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Dhaka in 2015

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

After playing an integral part in two ICC U19 Men's CWC competitions, he played seven matches in the 2016 competition, scoring 75 runs with a highest score of 21 against India

In April 2021, he became the first Bangladesh batsman to make a List A double-century when he scored 208 not out for Abahani against Sheikh Jamal Dhanmondi

Later that year, he became the fifth Bangladesh player to score 1,000 runs in T20I cricket, but scored only 27 runs in the ICC Men's T20 WC 2021

TASKIN AHMED



DOB: 3 Apr 1995 **BORN**: Dhaka STYLE: LHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against Australia at Dhaka in 2014

Playing in his fourth *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He burst upon the scene, taking 5-28 on his ODI debut, the best figures by a Bangladeshi on his first appearance in the format

Took 2-32 in his four overs against Pakistan in the ICC Men's T20 WC 2016 and bettered that with 2-12 against Papua New Guinea in the 2021 competition

Scored 75 batting at number 10 and shared a national Test ninth-wicket record partnership of 191 with Mahmudullah against Zimbabwe at Harare in July 2021

YASIR ALL



DOB: 6 Mar 1996 **BORN:** Chattogram **STYLE: RHB/OB**

Made his T20I debut against Afghanistan at Mirpur in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He played all six of Bangladesh's matches in the ICC U19 Men's CWC 2014, but found opportunities limited, with just 44 runs in his four innings

Having been named in the 2018 Emerging teams Asia Cup, an international debut finally came in a Test against Pakistan at Chattogram in late 2021

He struck 55 in his third Test, against New Zealand at Christchurch, but he hasn't been able to cement a starting place in the national side yet







JOS BUTTLER



63 C WK

BORN: Taunton STYLE: RHB/WK

Made his T20I debut against India at Manchester in 2011

Playing in his fifth ICC Men's T20 WC

In a three-month period from mid-2014, he struck what were at the time England's three fastest ODI centuries

Arguably England's biggest white-ball draw, he struck 59 in the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019 final before starring with bat and gloves in the Super Over victory over New Zealand

Helped England to the final of the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2016, and added 269 runs in the 2021 tournament, which included an unbeaten century against Sri Lanka

MOEEN ALI



DOB: 18 Jun 1987 BORN: Birmingham STYLE: LHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against West Indies at Bridgetown in 2014

Playing in his fourth ICC Men's T20 WC

Part of the England team who reached the final of the 2016 competition, he struck an unbeaten 41 against Afghanistan to rescue England from trouble

Struck a 53-ball ODI century against the West Indies at Bristol in 2017, moving from 50 to 100 in just 12 balls

Played all six of England's games in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, scoring 92 runs at a strike rate of 131.42 and taking seven wickets while conceding just 5.50 runs per over

HARRY **BROOK**



Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at Bridgetown in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He was England's leading run-scorer in the ICC U19 Men's CWC 2018, and a maiden first-class century followed for Yorkshire that summer

His form in the domestic Twenty20 competition in 2020 and 2021, as well as a successful inaugural season in the Hundred led to his first international call-up

A senior debut came early in 2022 and he spent most of the summer on the fringes of the Test team too after a superb start to the County Championship season

SAM CURRAN



DOB: 3 Jun 1998 BORN: Northampton STYLE: LHB/LMF

Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at Christchurch in 2019

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

The son of former Zimbabwe international Kevin Curran, he was named Player of the Match in just his second Test

Already in his young career, he has proved himself to be a much in-demand T20 cricketer, with successful spells in the IPL to his name

No mug with the bat, he struck an unbeaten 95 at number 8 to almost bring an incredible ODI victory against India at Pune in March 2021

ALEX HALES



Made his T20I debut against India at Manchester in 2011

Playing in his fourth *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He was the first Englishman to score a T201 hundred, an unbeaten 116 against Sri Lanka in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2014

He struggled when given the chance in Test cricket, but he remained prolific in the white ball game, smashing 171 against Pakistan at Nottingham in 2016 when England made 444-3

Despite playing a key role in the resurgence of England's limited-overs team, he missed both the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019 and the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021

CHRIS JORDAN



Made his T20I debut against Australia at Sydney in 2014

Playing in his fourth ICC Men's T20 WC

First spotted by Bill Athey, he was invited to Dulwich College in England to receive a cricket scholarship

England's leading wicket-taker in T20I cricket, he took 4-28 against New Zealand in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2016 and 3-17 against Australia in the 2021 tournament

The first England player to participate in an IPL final, he has vast experience in Twenty20 leagues around the world

LIAM LIVINGSTONE



DOB: 4 Aug 1993 BORN: Barrow-in-Furness STYLE: RHB/OB/LB

Made his T20I debut against South Africa at Taunton in 2017

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

First came to prominence with an innings of 350 in a club game and hit a county championship double-century two years later

In the summer of 2021, he struck a 42-ball century against Pakistan, the fastest by an England batsman in T20I cricket

Followed up by becoming the leading run-scorer in the inaugural season of the Hundred, and was named the competition's MVP





DOB: 3 Sep 1987 BORN: Roehampton STYLE: LHB/LB

Made his T20I debut against South Africa at Cardiff in 2017

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

Made an incredible start to his T20I career, striking five fifties and a century in his first nine matches, and reached the top of the *ICC* T20I batting rankings in 2020

Scored a Test century at Perth on the 2017-18 Ashes tour, but spent three years out of the red-ball team before a short-lived recall in late 2021

He continued to flourish in white-ball cricket and was the leading run-scorer in the 2022 Hundred competition in England

ADIL RASHID



Made his T20I debut against the Netherlands at Lord's in 2009

Playing in his fourth ICC Men's T20 WC

After playing in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2009 at the tender age of 21 he fell out of favour, but returned to become England's leading spin-bowling wicket-taker in both ODI and T20I cricket

Played a crucial role in helping England reach the final of the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2016, and then emerge victorious from the 50-over competition three years later

Played all six matches as England reached the semi-final of the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, taking the remarkable figures of 4-2 against the West Indies at Dubai

PHIL SALT



61 WK

DOB: 28 Aug 1996 BORN: Bodelwyddan, Wales STYLE: RHB/WK

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Cardiff in 2021

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Born in Wales but raised in Barbados, his first domestic success came in 2018, when his fast scoring attracted attention for Islamabad United who drafted him for the 2019 PSL

He continued his globe-trotting that year with victory in the CPL final for Barbados Tridents, and became a regular member of the Adelaide Strikers squad in the BBL

He moved from Sussex to Lancashire before the 2021 season and made an international debut that year before striking a maiden ODI century the following year in the Netherlands

BEN **STOKES**



DOB: 4 Jun 1991 BORN: Christchurch, NZ STYLE: LHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at The Oval in 2011

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He enjoyed a productive *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2009 and a full international debut came two years later before he struck a century in just his second Test – at Perth in 2013

He was struck for four successive sixes by Carlos Brathwaite in the final over of the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2016, but came back to help England win the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019 with an unbeaten 84 in the final at Lord's

He has starred in the IPL for both Pune and Rajasthan and was elevated to England's Test captaincy in 2022 as Joe Root's successor

REECE TOPLEY



Made his T20I debut against Australia at Cardiff in 2015

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He was the leading wicket-taker in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2012 with 19 wickets at just 9.10 runs apiece, with an economy rate of 3.17 runs per over

A successful 2015 season with Hampshire led to a place in the squad for the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2016, in which he played two matches before his career was derailed by multiple back stress fractures

He fought his way back into the international squad in the summer of 2020 and marked 2022 by taking England-record ODI figures of 6-24 against India at Lord's

DAVID WILLEY



DOB: 28 Feb 1990 BORN: Northampton STYLE: LHB/LFM

Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at Manchester in 2015

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

First came to prominence with a 19-ball half-century and a hat-trick in the final of the 2013 English domestic Twenty20 competition

Ever-present for England in the 2016 competition, taking 3-20 in his four overs in the final against the West Indies, but missed out on selection for the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019 squad to Jofra Archer

He returned with a Player of the Series performance against Ireland in the summer of 2020 and continues to be a key part of England's white-ball set-up

CHRIS WOAKES



DOB: 2 Mar 1989 BORN: Birmingham STYLE: RHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against Australia at Adelaide in 2011

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He exploded onto the international scene, taking 6-45 in just his second ODI back in 2011 against Australia at Brisbane

Helped England to victory in the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019, taking three wickets in both the semi-final against Australia and the final against New Zealand

A regular in the IPL, he played all six matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, taking seven wickets at 21.57 apiece and conceding just 7.36 per over

MARK **WOOD**



DOB: 11 Jan 1990 BORN: Ashington STYLE: RHB/RF

Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at Manchester in 2015

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC


Created a huge impression in his first summer of international cricket, taking the wicket that clinched the Ashes at Nottingham

Often derailed by injuries, he abandoned his short run-up in favour of a longer one and made an impact as England won the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019, taking 18 wickets over the course of the tournament

He has been a massive success for Mumbai Indians in the IPL, helping them to win five titles, and scored two half centuries in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Harare in 2010

Playing in his fifth ICC Men's T20 WC

Prolific in Test cricket, he has taken more than 400 wickets as well as striking five centuries with the bat

He was named *ICC* Cricketer of the Year in 2016 and was named to the *ICC* Test Team of the Decade 2011-2020

DOB: 23 Jul 1990 BORN: Jind STYLE: RHB/LB

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Harare in 2016

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

A former chess champion, he is an intelligent spinner who is tough to hit out of the attack

He was the second-highest wicket-taker in the 2016 IPL season, and in February 2017 he became the first Indian bowler to claim a five-wicket haul in T20Is

Took 12 wickets in the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019, but missed out on selection for the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, so he will be hoping to make amends this year

DEEPAK HOODA



DOB: 19 Apr 1995 BORN: Rohtak STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Sri Lanka at Lucknow in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He starred for India in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2014, and having scored a century on first-class debut, made his IPL debut the following year

His big-hitting abilities were clearly visible in that IPL season, where he scored 151 runs at a strike rate of 158.94

After several years on the fringes of the national team, he made up for lost time by striking 104 from 57 balls against Ireland in just his third innings in T20I cricket





Made his T20I debut against South Africa at Johannesburg in 2006

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

He played an integral part in India's ICC Men's T20 WC 2007 triumph, and was also part of the 2013 ICC Champions Trophy-winning squad

After several years out of the limelight he came to the fore by striking a six from the last ball of the final of the Nidahas Cup to defeat Bangladesh in March 2018

A stellar 2022 IPL season, in which he scored 330 runs at a strike rate of 183.33, earned him another recall to international colours

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Harare in 2010

Playing in his fifth *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He has passed 50 on ten occasions in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC tournaments, more times than anyone else

He scored more runs in international cricket in the 2010s than anyone else has done in any decade in international cricket history

The first batsman to pass 3,000 runs in T201 cricket, he scored his maiden century in the format in the 2022 Asia Cup

BHUVNESHWAR **KUMAR**



DOB: 5 Feb 1990 BORN: Meerut STYLE: RHB/RMF

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Bengaluru in 2012

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Helped India reach the final of the 2014 tournament, conceding just 5.42 runs per over in his six matches

He won the Purple Cap as the leading wicket-taker in both the 2016 (23 wickets) and 2017 (26 wickets) IPL seasons

By taking 5-24 in a T20I against South Africa at Johannesburg in 2018, he became the first Indian to take a five-wicket haul in all three forms of the international game

HARDIK **PANDYA**



DOB: 11 Oct 1993 BORN: Choryasi STYLE: RHB/RMF

Made his T20I debut against Australia at Adelaide in 2016

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Bowled the crucial final over against Bangladesh in 2016, defending two runs off three balls, and smashed a 13-ball unbeaten 35 against Afghanistan in 2021

Starred in the Bristol T20I against England in 2018, smashing an unbeaten 33 from just 14 balls before taking 4-38

Part of the successful Mumbai Indians dynasty in the IPL, he also has a Test century and five-wicket haul to his name

RISHABH PANT



Made his T20I debut against England at Bengaluru in 2017

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He opened the batting for India in the ICC U19 Men's CWC 2016 in Bangladesh, striking a century against Namibia

Enjoyed a memorable 2018 by striking an unbeaten 128 in the IPL before notching a maiden Test century at The Oval in 2018, and was then named the *ICC* Emerging Player of the Year

On India's tour of England in 2022, he struck 146 from just 111 balls in the Birmingham Test, before adding a maiden ODI century at Manchester

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Harare in 2015

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

When a Test debut came in the 2021 series against England, he starred by taking 27 wickets in his first three matches

No mug with the bat, he struck a 27-ball half-century to seal a series win for India against the West Indies at Port-of-Spain in July 2022

Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at Ranchi in 2021

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

During the 2019-20 Ranji Trophy, he finally found his best form, taking 52 wickets to break Rajinder Goel's 36-year-old record for the most wickets in a season for Haryana

Having been traded to Royal Challengers Bangalore ahead of the 2021 IPL, he took 32 wickets, the joint-most in a season, which led to his debut with the national team KL RAHUL



Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Harare in 2016

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He was part of India's squad for the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2010, and in 2016 became the first Indian to score a century on ODI debut

A maiden T20I century came in just his fourth match, and another followed against England at Manchester in 2018

He was the leading run-scorer in the 2020 IPL with 670 runs for Kings XI Punjab, and scored three successive half-centuries in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021

MOHAMMAD SHAMI



DOB: 3 Sep 1990 BORN: Amroha STYLE: RHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Dhaka in 2014

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Marked his Test debut by taking nine wickets – the most by an Indian seamer in his first appearance

In 2019, he became the fastest Indian bowler to take 100 ODI wickets, and took a hat-trick in the *ICC* Men's CWC match against Afghanistan

Had success in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, taking 3-31 against Afghanistan and 3-15 against Scotland in successive matches





Made his T20I debut against England at Southampton in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He played two matches as India lifted the ICC U19 Men's CWC trophy in 2018, and he earned an IPL debut with Punjab the following year, when his first two wickets were Jos Buttler and Ajinkya Rahane

He took nine wickets in eight games in the 2020 competition, and impressed with his death-bowling skills

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC


His first-class debut came way back in the 2010-11 season, and he marked it with a composed innings of 73

He was Ireland's leading wicket-taker in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC Qualifier 2019 in the UAE, with 12 wickets in eight matches

Took 3-9 against the Netherlands and 2-35 against Sri Lanka in his first two matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2022

CURTIS CAMPHER

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Dublin in 2021

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

Left South Africa after having represented their U19 side and made use of his Irish passport thanks to his grandmother, who was brought up in Derry

He made half-centuries in his first two ODI innings as well as dismissing Tom Banton with his fourth ball on debut

Became the first bowler to take four wickets in four balls in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC when he performed the feat against the Netherlands at Abu Dhabi in 2021

GARETH **DELANY**



DOB: 28 Apr 1997 BORN: Dublin STYLE: RHB/LB

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Bready in 2019

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

The brother of Laura Delany – who also plays for Ireland – he made his senior debut for Leinster in summer 2017

Scored 150 runs and took 9 wickets as Ireland qualified via the qualifying tournament in the UAE, including 89 not out against Oman

Represented Leicestershire in the 2021 Blast competition in England and started the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 with an innings of 44 against the Netherlands





Made his T20I debut against Afghanistan at Colombo in 2010

Playing in his fifth ICC Men's T20 WC

A veteran of the team, he marked his first ICC Men's T20 WC appearance by taking 3-16 against the West Indies in 2010 and took 3-7 against the Netherlands last time out in 2016

Switched from bowling seam at the age of 13 and made his international debut just four years later before captaining Ireland at the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2012

He is Ireland's leading wicket-taker in T20I cricket as well as their leading spin-bowling wicket-taker in ODIs

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He was part of Ireland's squad for the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2016 and subsequently made his senior Twenty20 debut for Leinster Lightning the following year

Having been named in the Ireland Wolves squad to face Scotland A in 2019, he was invited to join the Ireland academy in February 2021

A call-up to the senior Ireland squad followed in 2022 for the series against India, New Zealand and South Africa, but he failed to make the final XI

FIONN HAND



Made his T20I debut against Afghanistan at Belfast in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

His senior debut came for Leinster Lightning in the 2018 Inter-Provincial Twenty20 competition when he had just turned 20 years of age

In May 2022 he was rewarded with a nine-month contract with Cricket Ireland, and received a call-up for the T20I series against South Africa and Afghanistan

On his first international appearance he struck 36 from just 18 balls at number nine, but couldn't quite bring victory

A regular on British shores, he has enjoyed a decade playing club cricket and moved to Northern Ireland permanently before a senior Irish debut came in 2022

Made his T20I debut against Hong Kong at Bready in 2016

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

In 2020, he was the key performer in Ireland's T20I victory against West Indies in the Caribbean, taking 3 for 29 while defending 208, and later that year he took five wickets in two ODIs against England

Returned figures of 4-23 against Sri Lanka at Abu Dhabi in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, the second-best performance by an Ireland bowler in the competition's history

Made his T20I debut against Afghanistan at Greater Noida in 2017

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He represented Ireland at U19 level and joined Durham after a recommendation from Ben Stokes, who he impressed after bowling in the nets

When promoted to the senior side, he returned figures of 4-33 on his T20I debut, but conceded 69 runs next time out

He raced to 50 ODI wickets in just 25 matches, the fastest for Ireland and the eighth-fastest in history

Made his T201 debut against India at Malahide in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

A product of the Bready club, which has produced a long line of pace bowlers, such as Boyd Rankin and Craig Young

He made his senior debut for North West Warriors in 2020, and acted as a net bowler for Ireland in 2021 as part of their preparation for matches against the USA and Afghanistan

In May 2022, he was awarded a Cricket Ireland Educational Contract having just completed the second year of his Mechanical Engineering degree at Ulster University

Made his T20I debut against the Netherlands at Rotterdam in 2018

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

Had a superb T20I debut, scoring 57 not out from 29 balls and taking 3-23

Played only one match in the qualifying tournament for the 2019 competition, and went wicketless in his three matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021

PAUL STIRLING



Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at The Oval in 2009

Playing in his seventh *ICC* Men's T20 WC

His standout performance in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC to date is his innings of 60 from just 34 balls against Zimbabwe at Sylhet in 2014

His innings of 177 against Canada at Toronto in 2010 remains the highest in ODI history for Ireland

Struck 291 runs in the qualifying competition for the 2021 event before striking 30 not out against the Netherlands and 38 against Namibia once the tournament started

Made his T20I debut against Scotland at Dublin in 2019

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

Captained Ireland Wolves in their 2021 home series with Netherlands A and was the top run-scorer with 128 runs

Scored just 3 and 8 in his two innings at the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, but struck successive T20I half-centuries in 2022 against the UAE and India

Made his T20I debut against Hong Kong at Bready in 2016

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC


An ODI debut came against England in 2019 and he struck 56 against Zimbabwe in just his fourth game

Made his T20I debut against Ireland at Rotterdam in 2018

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

Grew up in Australia and qualified for the Netherlands via his grandmother, he played club cricket in both England and Australia

An electrical apprentice before switching to cricket, he can play hard-hitting innings down the order

Ever-present for the team in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC Qualifier 2019, he made 13 dismissals behind the stumps and took over as national captain in 2022 after the retirement of Pieter Seelaar





DOB: 4 Apr 1991 BORN: George, SA STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Ireland at Al Amarat in 2019

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He is a product of Grey High School in Port Elizabeth but left his home country to play for Leicestershire in 2017

In 2019 he became the first bowler to take seven wickets in a Twenty20 match when he took 7-18 against Birmingham Bears

He became eligible to play for the Netherlands in June 2019 and played all three matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, scoring 35 against Namibia

SHARIZ AHMAD



Made his T20I debut against Papua New Guinea at Bulawayo in 2022

Playing in his first *ICC* Men's T20 WC

In late 2020 he was named in the Dutch Academy squad following impressive performances domestically at U18 level

The following year he represented the Netherlands in the qualifying tournament for the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2022

Despite the team failing to qualify, his stock continued to rise and he earned a senior debut soon afterwards

TOM COOPER



DOB: 26 Nov 1986 BORN: Wollongong, Australia STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Canada at Dubai in 2012

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Hailing from New South Wales, he represented Australia in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2006, scoring a century against South Africa in Colombo

In 2010 he decided to represent the Netherlands, as his mother is Dutch, and struck 80 not out, 87 and 67 in his first three ODIs

Enjoyed a sensational *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2014, scoring 231 runs at an average of 57.75 with a strike rate of 137.50, but has struggled to reclaim that form since then





DOB: 15 Nov 1999 BORN: Nootdorp STYLE: RHB/RM

Made his T20I debut against Ireland at Rotterdam in 2018

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He is the son of Tim de Leede, who enjoyed a long career with the Netherlands, participating in the *ICC* Men's CWC in 1996, 2003 and 2007

He was added to the Netherlands squad for the *ICC* Men's CWC 2018 Qualifier to replace the injured Stephan Myburgh, and scored 86 runs in three matches

Scored an unbeaten 81 from 42 balls against Nepal in the T20I series at Kirtipur in April 2021

BRANDON **GLOVER**



DOB: 3 Apr 1997 BORN: Johannesburg, SA STYLE: RHB/RF

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Rotterdam in 2019

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

Played U19 cricket in South Africa, but decided to use his Dutch passport after completing a degree in accounting

Led the Dutch with 16 wickets in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC Qualifier 2019, the highlight being 4-12 against UAE

He impressed bowling coach Chris Liddle during the competition, and when Liddle moved to Northamptonshire, Glover followed him there and earned a deal with Oval Invincibles

FRFD KLAASSEN



DOB: 13 Nov 1992 **BORN:** Haywards Heath

Made his T20I debut Ireland at Rotterdam in 2018

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He played club cricket in New Zealand followed by stints in Australia, England and Scotland before moving to VOC Rotterdam, helped by his Dutch passport via his grandfather

Toured Kent as part of a Netherlands development squad in 2018 and impressed so much that the county offered him a deal

He continued to make strides in England, earning a deal with Manchester Originals for the 2021 Hundred, and bowled economically in the ICC Men's T20 WC 2021. conceding just 4.80 per over





DOB: 28 Feb 1984 **BORN:** Pretoria, SA **STYLE: LHB/OB**

Made his T20I debut against Canada at Dubai in 2012

Playing in his fourth *ICC* Men's T20 WC

His senior debuts in first-class and List A cricket came back in 2006 for Northerns on the South African domestic circuit

Smashed 63 from just 23 balls to stun Ireland in the 2014 competition and enable the Netherlands to gualify for the Super 10 stage

He ended up 224 runs in the competition and was named in the ICC's Team of the Tournament

MAX O'DOWD



DOB: 4 Mar 1994 **BORN:** Auckland, NZ **STYLE: RHB/OB**

Made his T20I debut against Nepal at Amstelveen in 2015

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He holds a Dutch passport via his mother, and played club cricket in England and New Zealand before starting his international career

Smashed the first T20I century for the Netherlands when he struck 133 not out against Malaysia at Kirtipur in April 2021

Followed up by starting his ICC Men's T20 WC campaign with innings of 51 against Ireland and 70 against Namibia

TIM PRINGLE



DOB: 29 Aug 2002 BORN: The Hague STYLE: RHB/SLA

Made his T20I debut against Papua New Guinea at Bulawayo in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He is the son of a Dutch mother and former New Zealand international Chris Pringle, who coached and lived in the Netherlands

As a 9-year-old he made a memorable start to his representative cricket career with a hat-trick with the first three balls of his first over for Western Bay of Plenty U11s against Manawatu

Debuts in both forms of the game for the Netherlands came in the summer of 2022, with Liam Livingstone his first wicket

VIKRAM **SINGH**



DOB: 9 Jan 2003 BORN: Cheema Khurd, India STYLE: LHB/RMF

Made his T20I debut against Scotland at Malahide in 2019

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Born in Punjab, India, he moved to the Netherlands at the age of seven and started playing for the same club side as his father

Idolising Quinton de Kock, he likes to strike the ball hard, and made his debut for Netherlands A at the age of just 15

Enjoyed a successful start to his ODI career in 2022, striking 47, 46 and 54 in three ODIs against the West Indies, before following up with 65 and 50 against Pakistan

LOGAN VAN BEEK



DOB: 7 Sep 1990 BORN: Christchurch, NZ STYLE: RHB/RMF

Made his T20I debut against UAE at Sylhet in 2014

Playing in his fourth ICC Men's T20 WC

The grandson of former New Zealand and West Indies Test player Sammy Guillen, he represented New Zealand in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC in 2010

He remained a regular wicket-taker for Canterbury and qualified for the Netherlands by virtue of his Dutch passport in 2014

Starred as the Netherlands upset England at Chittagong in the 2014 competition, taking 3-9 in his two overs

TIMM VAN DER GUGTEN



DOB: 25 Feb 1991 BORN: Hornsby, Australia STYLE: RHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against Canada at Dubai in 2012

Playing in his fourth *ICC* Men's T20 WC

Started his career with New South Wales before moving to Tasmania, and he has recently enjoyed a successful six years with Glamorgan

Took nine wickets in the 2014 tournament, including figures of 3-30 against New Zealand and took 3-21 against Bangladesh two years later

Contributed again in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC Qualifier 2019 by taking 12 wickets in his nine matches, but played only one match in the tournament proper two years later



DOB: 31 Dec 1984 BORN: Johannesburg STYLE: RHB/SLA

ROELOF VAN DER MERWE

Made his T20I debut for South Africa against Australia at Centurion in 2009

Playing in his fifth ICC Men's T20 WC

He found success in franchise cricket in South Africa, which led to an international call-up and an IPL deal with Royal Challengers Bangalore

Having debuted with Somerset in 2010, he gained a Dutch passport in 2015 and rejoined the county with great success in 2016

Took 14 wickets for the Dutch in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC Qualifier 2019 while conceding just 5.23 runs per over, but failed to take a wicket in the tournament in 2021

PAUL VAN MEEKEREN



DOB: 15 Jan 1993 BORN: Amsterdam STYLE: RHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against Kenya at Windhoek in 2013

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Played two matches in the 2016 tournament, taking 2-17 against Bangladesh and then a career-best 4-11 against Ireland

That success led to a trial and eventual contract with Somerset, for whom he played before joining Durham in 2021

Took 15 wickets in nine matches in the ICC Men's T20 WC Qualifier in late 2019 to help the Netherlands qualify for the tournament proper, in which he played one match







KANE WILLIAMSON





Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Harare in 2011

Playing in his fifth ICC Men's T20 WC

A consistent scorer throughout his *ICC* Men's T20 WC career, he struck 51 against South Africa and 42 against Sri Lanka in 2014 and 85 against Australia in the final in 2021

Led New Zealand to the final of the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019, where he was named the Player of the Tournament

He went one better in the summer of 2021 when he captained New Zealand to victory in the *ICC* World Test Championship final against India

FINN ALLEN



DOB: 22 Apr 1999 BORN: Auckland STYLE: RHB/WK

Made his T20I debut against Bangladesh at Hamilton in 2021

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He was included in New Zealand's squad for the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2016 and went on to play in the next *ICC* U19 Men's CWC two years later, when he was New Zealand's leading run-scorer

He was the leading run-scorer in the 2020-21 Super Smash Tournament with 512 runs in 11 matches, which led to his first international call-up and an IPL deal

While he was dismissed first ball on his full debut, he made a 29-ball 71 in his third match, and a maiden century came against Scotland in Edinburgh in July 2022

TRENT **BOULT**



DOB: 22 Jul 1989 BORN: Rotorua STYLE: RHB/LF

Made his T20I debut against England at Auckland in 2013

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

He was the joint leading wicket-taker in the *ICC* Men's CWC 2015 and then took a hat-trick against Australia four years later

Helped New Zealand emerge victorious in the final of the *ICC* World Test Championship final against India at Southampton in 2021

Continued his success into the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, taking a total of 13 wickets at New Zealand reached the final

MICHAEL BRACEWELL



DOB: 14 Feb 1991 BORN: Masterton STYLE: LHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Ireland at Belfast in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He played alongside his cousin Doug at the ICC U19 Men's CWC 2010, but his maiden international call-up came after he was the leading run-scorer in the 2021-22 Super Smash

He earned an ODI debut on tour of the Netherlands in 2022 and earned a Test debut at Nottingham after Kane Williamson was ruled out due to Covid

He found his form in the shortest form of the game later that summer, smashing a 25-ball unbeaten 61 against Scotland and taking 3-15 against the West Indies

MARK CHAPMAN



DOB: 27 Jun 1994 BORN: Hong Kong STYLE: LHB/SLA

Made his T20I debut for Hong Kong against Nepal at Chattogram in 2014

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Scored 38 against Afghanistan in the 2014 tournament and 40 against Scotland two years later

Scored a century on his ODI debut for Hong Kong before switching to New Zealand, for whom he qualified through his father, and became the tenth player to represent two countries in ODIs

Struck a career best 83 in T20I cricket against Scotland at Edinburgh in August 2022

DEVON CONWAY



DOB: 8 Jul 1991 BORN: Johannesburg STYLE: LHB/RM

Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at Auckland in 2021

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

After making the decision in 2017 to commit to cricket in New Zealand, he became the first man ever to top all three domestic runscoring charts in the same season (2019-20)

He then became just the seventh man to score a double century on his Test debut when he hit 200 against England at Lord's in the summer of 2021

Scored 46 in the semi-final victory over England in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, but missed the final after breaking his hand after striking his bat in frustration after his dismissal

LOCKIE FERGUSON



DOB:13 Jun 1991 BORN: Auckland STYLE: RHB/RF

Made his T20I debut against Bangladesh at Napier in 2017

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Replacing Adam Milne as the team's spearhead in white-ball cricket, he has developed into a major weapon in both ODI and T20I cricket

He was named in the Team of the Tournament of the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019 after taking 21 wickets at 19.47 apiece with an economy rate of 4.88

A veteran of the IPL, he took his maiden five-wicket haul in T2OI cricket with figures of 5-21 against the West Indies in 2020, and added 4-14 against Ireland at Belfast in July 2022

MARTIN GUPTILL



DOB: 30 Sep 1986 BORN: Auckland STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Australia at Sydney in 2009

Playing in his seventh ICC Men's T20 WC

He was the leading run-scorer in the *ICC* Men's CWC 2015, during which he made the competition record score of 237 not out against the West Indies

Entrusted to bat in the Super Over in the final four years later, he was run out agonisingly short of winning the trophy

A regular contributor across all five of his previous *ICC* Men's T20 WC tournaments, he struck 93 from just 56 balls against Scotland in the 2021 competition

ADAM MILNE



DOB: 13 Apr 1992 BORN: Palmerston North STYLE: RHB/RF

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Auckland in 2010

Playing in his fourth ICC Men's T20 WC

Played a solitary match in the 2012 competition, before being ever-present in the team four years later, taking 2-26 against Pakistan at Mohali

One of the fastest bowlers ever produced by New Zealand, but he has been plagued by injuries throughout his career and exited the *ICC* Men's CWC 2015 after the quarter-final

He was back in form in the 2020-21 BBL in Australia, and took a hat-trick in the 2021 Blast for Kent against Surrey

DARYL MITCHELL



DOB: 20 May 1991 BORN: Hamilton STYLE: RHB/RM

Made his T20I debut against India at Wellington in 2019

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He is the son of former New Zealand rugby union player and coach John Mitchell who, at the time of Daryl's Test debut against England, was defence coach for the England rugby union side

His unbeaten 72 from 47 balls in the semifinal of the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 brought a thrilling win for his side against England

Enjoyed a superb summer of 2022 in England, striking centuries in all three Tests, including an innings of 190 at Nottingham

JIMMY NEESHAM



DOB: 17 Sep 1990 BORN: Auckland STYLE: LHB/RMF

Made his T20I debut against South Africa at Durban in 2012

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Scored centuries in both his first and second Tests back in 2014 – against India and the West Indies respectively

After briefly contemplating retirement, he was outstanding in the final of the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019, taking three wickets and effecting the final-ball run out to tie the scores

Helped New Zealand reach the final of the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, playing every match and making several useful contributions with the bat

GLENN PHILLIPS





DOB: 6 Dec 1996 BORN: East London, SA STYLE: RHB/OB/WK

Made his T20I debut against South Africa at Auckland in 2017

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He moved to New Zealand from South Africa at the age of five and played in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2016

Came to prominence after topping the run-scorers' charts in the 2016-17 Super Smash with 369 runs for Auckland

Struck a century against the West Indies at Mount Mounganui in November 2020 and led the country with 36 sixes for Gloucestershire in the 2021 Vitality Blast

MITCHELL SANTNER



DOB: 5 Feb 1992 BORN: Hamilton STYLE: LHB/SLA

Made his T20I debut against England at Manchester in 2015

Playing in his third *ICC* Men's T20 WC

Took ten wickets in five matches in the ICC Men's T20 WC 2016, including the remarkable figures of 4-11 to bowl India out for just 79 at Nagpur, but added just two wickets five years later

His experience in the IPL held him in good stead for the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019 in England, where he bowled a clutch spell in the semi-final win over India

Later in the same year he recorded a maiden Test century during an epic partnership of 261 with BJ Watling to help New Zealand to 615-9, their highest Test total against England

ISH **SODHI**



DOB: 31 Oct 1992 BORN: Ludhiana, India STYLE: RHB/LB

Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at Roseau in 2014

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

He moved to New Zealand when he was four and made his debut for Northern Districts in the 2012-13 season

Played five matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2016, taking 3-18 in the victories over India at Nagpur and 3-21 over Bangladesh at Kolkata

He also enjoyed some success five years later, taking nine wickets at New Zealand reached the final

TIM SOUTHEE



DOB: 11 Dec 1988 BORN: Whangarei STYLE: RHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against England at Auckland in 2008

Playing in his fifth ICC Men's T20 WC


He was named Player of the Tournament in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2008, which led to an international debut, and he smashed nine sixes in his innings of 77 on his Test debut

He devastated England's batting with figures of 7-33 at Wellington in the *ICC* Men's CWC 2015 when New Zealand reached the final

He played only one match as they reached another final four years later, but was a major reason why New Zealand became *ICC* World Test champions in 2021







BABAR AZAM



Made his T20I debut against England at Manchester in 2016

Playing in his first *ICC* Men's T20 WC

Struck three ODI centuries in a row against the West Indies in late 2016 and his sustained good form enabled him to reach top spot in the *ICC* ODI batting rankings in April 2021

It took him just 18 matches to reach the equivalent number one place in the *ICC* T20I batting rankings, with a 59-ball 122 against South Africa at Centurion in April 2021 his standout effort

He was the leading run-scorer in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 with 303 runs, including half-centuries against India, Afghanistan, Namibia and Scotland

ASIF ALI



Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at Karachi in 2018

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He was the leading run-scorer for Faisalabad in the 2017-18 Quaid-e-Azam Trophy, and his run-scoring earned him a stint at the 2017 Everest Premier League in Nepal

Helped Islamabad United win the 2018 PSL, which propelled him into the selectors' minds who rewarded him with a T20I debut

His unbeaten cameos of 27 and 25 helped Pakistan beat New Zealand at Afghanistan in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021

FAKHAR ZAMAN



Made his T20I debut against West Indies at Port-of-Spain in 2017

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

Hit a match-winning century in the final of the *ICC* Champions Trophy 2017, and the following year he became the first Pakistan batsman to score an ODI double-century

That was no flash in the pan as he struck 193 against South Africa at Johannesburg in April 2021, the highest individual score batting second in ODI cricket

Played six matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, saving his best for last as he struck an unbeaten 55 from just 32 balls against Australia in the semi-final at Dubai

HAIDER ALI



Made his T20I debut against England at Manchester in 2020

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He was named vice-captain of the Pakistan team for the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2020 and enjoyed an excellent debut season in the PSL, scoring 239 runs for Peshawar Zalmi

Touring England in the summer of 2020, he became the first Pakistan batter to score a half-century on his T20I debut with an innings of 54

Found his form in late 2021, with successive innings of 45 against Bangladesh followed by 68 and 31 against the West Indies

HARIS RAUF



DOB: 7 Nov 1993 BORN: Rawalpindi STYLE: RHB/RF

Made his T20I debut against Bangladesh at Lahore in 2020

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He was first spotted by former Pakistan paceman Aaqib Javed, who selected him for Lahore Qalanders in the PSL

He replaced Dale Steyn in the Melbourne Stars squad for the 2019-20 BBL and took 5-27 against Hobart in his second game followed by a hat-trick against Sydney Thunder

Took 4-65 against England in the Edgbaston ODI in July 2021 before taking 4-22 against New Zealand at Sharjah in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021

IFTIKHAR AHMED



STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Sri Lanka at Mirpur in 2016

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

A consistent run-scorer on the domestic circuit, he made his ODI debut against England in November 2015 but failed to make an impression

He was recalled after top-scoring for Sui Northern Gas Pipelines Limited in the Quaid-e-Azam trophy, which forced himself back into the international reckoning

He made a comeback in the T20 squad in 2019 and smashed a brilliant 62 not out against Australia, which ensured an ODI comeback too

KHUSHDIL SHAH



DOB: 7 Feb 1995 BORN: Bannu STYLE: LHB/SLA

Made his T20I debut against Australia at Perth in 2019

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He was the leading run scorer in the 2018-19 Quaid-e-Azam trophy with 463 runs in seven matches, and the following year struck an unbeaten 154 off just 96 balls in the domestic one-day trophy

In October 2019, he smashed a 35-ball century, the fastest T20 hundred by a Pakistani batter, for Southern Punjab against Sindh

He made his ODI debut against Zimbabwe in November 2020 but failed to pass fifty in any of his first 10 matches, despite some useful middle-order cameos





DOB: 5 Apr 2000 BORN: Hyderabad STYLE: RHB/RF

Made his T20I debut against England at Cardiff in 2019

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Having grown up playing tape-ball cricket, he rose through the domestic ranks to represent his country at both U16 and U19 level before being name Player of the Match in the 2019 PSL final

Later that year, he became the youngest bowler to take a hat-trick in a T20I match when he performed the feat against Sri Lanka at 19 years and 183 days old

Making his debut for the Sydney Thunder in the BBL in early 2022, he took three wickets without conceding a run in his first over

MOHAMMAD NAWAZ



DOB: 21 Mar 1994 BORN: Rawalpindi STYLE: LHB/SLA

Made his T20I debut against UAE at Dhaka in 2016

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He was the third-highest wicket-taker in the inaugural PSL, which earned him a place in Pakistan's T20 squad for the 2016 Asia Cup in Bangladesh

He struggled on his T20I debut, and was hit for 38 runs in just three overs in his second match against Sri Lanka, but struck an assured 53 on his first ODI appearance

Spent 18 months out of the ODI side before returning with 3-34 against South Africa at Centurion in April 2021, then bowled economically in the 2022 Asia Cup

MOHAMMAD RI7WAN





DOB: 1 Jun 1992 **BORN:** Peshawar **STYLE: RHB/WK**

Made his T20I debut against Bangladesh at Dhaka in 2015

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

Found his international feet on Pakistan's Test tour of England in 2020, when he scored two half-centuries at Southampton and kept wicket brilliantly

Carried that form into T20I cricket in 2021. a year in which he scored 1,326 runs at 73.66 with one century and 12 half-centuries

Carried that form into 2022 when he overtook his team-mate Babar Azam at the top of the ICC T20I batting rankings in September





DOB: 25 Aug 2001 **BORN**: North Wazirastan **STYLE:** RHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at Bridgetown in 2021

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

His rise was rapid, as he was selected for the Pakistan squad in the ICC U19 WC 2020 without having played a senior match

Only played two matches in the competition, but took 5-12 against Scotland at Potchefstroom

He only played one match in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, but took 13 wickets in his remaining six T20I matches in the year

NASEEM SHAH



DOB: 15 Feb 2003 **BORN:** Lower Dir **STYLE:** RHB/RF

Made his T20I debut against India at Dubai in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

After just a year in domestic cricket, he was named in Pakistan's Test squad for their series against Australia and soon afterwards he became the second-youngest bowler to pick up a five-wicket haul

In February 2019 he took a hat-trick against Sri Lanka at the age of 16 years and 359 days old – the youngest to perform the feat

He made his name with the bat by striking two sixes in the final over to help Pakistan reach the final of the 2022 Asia Cup

SHADAB KHAN



Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at Bridgetown in 2017

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

Bowled superbly in the 2016-17 PSL, which led to an international call-up, and he responded by taking 3-7 and 4-14 in his first two T20I matches

A good-enough batsmen to have made half-centuries in Test and ODI cricket, he took 4-26 in the semi-final defeat to Australia in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021





DOB: 6 Apr 2000 BORN: Khyber Agency STYLE: LHB/LF

Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at Karachi in 2018

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

Extraordinary figures of 8-39 on his first-class debut and then 5-4 in a PSL group game fasttracked him into the minds of the selectors

He was Pakistan's leading wicket-taker in the ICC U19 WC 2018 with 12 wickets, which led to an international debut

At the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019, he became the first bowler to take six wickets in a Lord's ODI, and was named *ICC* Player of the Year in 2021

SHAN MASOOD



Made his T20I debut against England at Karachi in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC


He was selected as a 13-year-old for the U15 Asia Cup in 2002 after impressing Aaqib Javed, and scored 1,237 runs for Stamford School in England in 2009 before attending Durham University

His maiden Test century came against Sri Lanka in 2015 as Pakistan successfully chased 382 against Sri Lanka at Pallekele, but he was generally overlooked in the shorter forms of the game

He enjoyed a prolific 2022 season for Derbyshire, scoring back-to-back double-centuries and adding 547 runs in the domestic Twenty20 competition







RICHIE BERRINGTON



Made his T20I debut against Ireland at Belfast in 2008

Playing in his third *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He emigrated to Scotland as a youth and as an 18-year-old he was sent to India as part of the *ICC*'s European Cricket Academy

Struck Scotland's first T20I century when his 58-ball innings of 100 helped them defeat Bangladesh at The Hague in 2012, their first victory over a Full Nation

He was Scotland's top run-scorer in the ICC Men's T20 WC 2021 with 177 runs, which included innings of 70 against PNG and 54 not out against Pakistan





Made his T20I debut against Kenya at Aberdeen in 2013

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

He has a degree in engineering from Loughborough University, and struck two ODI centuries in the first three months of 2018

Topped Scotland's batting averages with 189 runs at 47.25 including two half-centuries in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC Qualifier 2019, and added nine dismissals behind the stumps

Ever-present for Scotland in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, scoring a total of 135 runs with a highest score of 45 against PNG

JOSH DAVEY



Made his T20I debut against Bangladesh at The Hague in 2012

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

He made an immediate impression on the international scene by taking 5-9 against Afghanistan at Ayr in just his fourth ODI

He went one better on Scotland's pre-*ICC* Men's CWC 2015 acclimatisation tour of the UAE, taking 6-28 against Bangladesh, then took 15 wickets in six matches in the tournament itself

Took 4-18 against PNG and 3-25 against Oman in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, before a groin injury ended his tournament early

CHRIS **GREAVES**



DOB: 12 Oct 1990 BORN: Johannesburg, SA STYLE: RHB/LB

Made his T20I debut against PNG at Dubai in 2021

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He was bowling at England in the nets in South Africa January 2010 when a chance conversation with Matt Prior led him to come over and make use of his British passport

Spent some time in Durham's Academy, before he injured his shoulder and spent a season with Glenrothes in Scotland

He was named Player of the Match in Scotland's win over Bangladesh in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 for his all-round performance of 45 and 2-19

MICHAEL JONES



DOB: 5 Jan 1998 BORN: Omskirk, England STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at Edinburgh in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Spent time at Lancashire's academy and played Second XI county cricket for Durham, Derbyshire and Leicestershire in 2017 before signing a senior academy contract with Durham in 2018

Scored 87 and 74 in his first two ODIs – against Ireland at Dubai – over the course of three days in January 2018

Struck his maiden first-class century for Durham against Leicestershire in April 2022, before adding 206 against Middlesex three months later

MICHAEL LEASK



DOB: 29 Oct 1990 BORN: Aberdeen STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Kenya at Aberdeen in 2013

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Came up through the Scotland ranks, and first made his name by hitting five sixes in a 16-ball 42 in an ODI against England in May 2014

He was part of the MCC squad who toured Pakistan under the captaincy of Kumar Sangakkara in January 2020

Struck 130 runs in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 at a strike rate of 154.76, which included innings of 44 against Namibia and 42 not out against New Zealand from just 20 balls

CALUM MACLEOD



DOB: 15 Nov 1988

BORN: Glasgow STYLE: RHB/RMF/OB

Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at The Oval in 2009

Playing in his fourth *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He hit 154 against PNG in 2017 and 157 not out against Afghanistan as Scotland shocked them in the opening match of the *ICC* Men's CWC Qualifier 2018

His unbeaten innings of 140 helped defeat number one-ranked England in a memorable ODI at The Grange in 2018 and helped earn him the *ICC* Associate Cricketer of the Year award

He was named *ICC* Associates Player of the Decade in 2020, but struggled in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, scoring just 43 runs in six innings, including successive ducks against Afghanistan and Namibia





DOB: 18 Jan 1999 BORN: Durban, SA STYLE: RHB/RM

Awaiting his T20I debut

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Grew up in South Africa and was part of the KwaZulu-Natal Academy, representing them at both U17 and U19 level

Moved to Scotland and first played for Western Warriors in the summer of 2018

Earned his first international call-up after impressive performances at the Regional series and A team matches with both bat and ball

GEORGE MUNSEY



DOB: 21 Feb 1993 BORN: Oxford, England STYLE: LHB/RMF

Made his T20I debut against Ireland at Bready in 2015

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

Played all three of Scotland's matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2016, striking 41 from 29 balls in his first match against Afghanistan at Nagpur

He hit an unbeaten 127 from just 56 balls against the Netherlands in the 2019 Tri-series, the second fastest T20I century at the time

He was Scotland's leading run-scorer in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC Qualifier 2019 with 234 runs in eight matches at a strike rate of 141.81 but failed to pass 30 in the tournament proper

SAFYAAN **Sharif**



DOB: 24 May 1991 BORN: Huddersfield, England STYLE: RHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against Kenya at Dubai in 2012

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

He took 4 for 27 against the Netherlands in his first ODI in 2011 and contributed 14 wickets towards Scotland's success in the *ICC* Men's CWC Qualifiers in New Zealand in 2014

He took his first five-wicket haul in ODIs in the ICC Men's CWC Qualifier 2018 tied match against Zimbabwe and took the winning wicket as Scotland defeated England at the Grange

Scotland's leading wicket-taker in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC Qualifier 2019 with 13 wickets at 15.61 apiece and added eight wickets in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021

CHRIS SOLE



Made his T20I debut against Oman at Dubai in 2017

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

The son of David Sole, who captained the Scotland rugby union team to the Grand Slam in 1990, he made his international debut in the *ICC* World Cricket League Championship 2015-17

He started well in ODI cricket, with two four-wicket-hauls in his first nine matches, before moving to Australia in 2018

He kept in touch with the Scotland coaches and returned to the Scotland team in 2021

HAMZA **TAHIR**



DOB: 9 Nov 1995 BORN: Paisley STYLE: RHB/SLA

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Edinburgh in 2018


Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

He took three wickets in Scotland's upset victory over England at The Grange in 2018

Bowled superbly in the ICC Men's T20 WC Qualifier 2019, taking 12 wickets in seven matches at just 13.66 apiece and conceding just 5.85 runs per over

He then took seven wickets in the 2021 competition, conceding just 6.13 runs per over in his 30 overs

BRAD WHEAL



Made his T20I debut against Hong Kong at Mong Kok in 2016

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He was spotted playing for Natal U19s by Hampshire's then-head coach Dale Benkenstein, who brought him to England by virtue of holding a British passport thanks to his Scottish mother

Made an excellent start to his ODI career. with four hauls of three wickets in his first 13 matches, and took eight wickets in the ICC Men's T20 WC 2021

Finished fifth on the top wicket-takers' table at this season's Vitality Blast with 22 wickets in 13 matches playing for champions Hampshire





TEMBA **BAVUMA**



Made his T20I debut against India at Mohali in 2019

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He was the first black African cricketer to make a Test century for South Africa and the first to captain the side

He also became only the second South African cricketer to score a century on ODI debut, scoring 113 runs against Ireland at Benoni in September 2016

Took over the captaincy of South Africa's white ball sides in early 2021 and struck his maiden T20I half-century with an innings of 72 against Ireland that July

QUINTON DE KOCK



DOB: 17 Dec 1992 BORN: Johannesburg STYLE: LHB/WK

WK

Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at Durban in 2012

Playing in his fourth ICC Men's T20 WC

He reeled off three successive ODI centuries before turning 21, and became the fastest South African to reach 1,000 ODI runs

Played successive innings of 52, 45 and 47 in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2016 and was named in the *ICC*'s Team of the Tournament

Enjoyed a stellar 2019-20 season in T201 cricket, striking four half-centuries, and carried that form into the 2021 tour of the Caribbean but failed to reach 50 in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021

REEZA HENDRICKS



DOB: 14 Aug 1989 BORN: Kimberley STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Australia at Adelaide in 2014

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He was spotted early, and was part of the South African side who participated in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2008 in Malaysia and reached the final

In January 2018 he came the first player to score a century in all three of South Africa's domestic competitions in the same season

In August the same year he became just the third South African to strike a century on ODI debut with an innings of 102 against Sri Lanka at Pallekele

MARCO **JANSEN**



DOB: 1 May 2000 BORN: Klerksdorp STYLE: RHB/LFM

Made his T20I debut against India at Rajkot in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He first made the news when he was invited by the Indian team to bowl to them in the nets when they travelled to South Africa in 2017-18, impressing Virat Kohli and Head Coach Ravi Shastri

He was the leading wicket-taker for North West in the 2018-19 CSA Three-Day Provincial Cup, and was picked by Durban Heat for the Mzansi Super League

He earned an IPL deal with Mumbai Indians ahead of the 2021 season and toured England in 2022, playing some useful lower-order innings and taking 5-35 in the Oval Test





Made his T20I debut against India at Johannesburg in 2018

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

In just his second T20I he smashed 69 from just 30 balls to help South Africa successfully chase 189 to defeat India at Centurion

His maiden ODI century came against Australia at Paarl on leap year day 2020

He was chosen to captain the South African T20I side on their tour of Pakistan in early 2021 and led them in the return series when Temba Bavuma was ruled out injured

KESHAV MAHARAJ



DOB: 7 Feb 1990 BORN: Durban STYLE: RHB/SLA

Made his T20I debut against Sri Lanka at Colombo in 2021

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He was named South Africa's Newcomer of the Year in 2017 and in the following year took 9-129 against Sri Lanka at Colombo, South Africa's best bowling figures since re-admission in 1991

In June 2021 he took South Africa's second Test hat-trick when he took three West Indies wickets in three balls at St Lucia

His T20I debut finally came in September 2021, when he was not only the captain, but also dismissed Bhanuka Rajapaksa with his first delivery

AIDEN MARKRAM



DOB: 4 Oct 1994 BORN: Centurion STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Sri Lanka at Centurion in 2019

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

Captained South Africa to victory in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2014 where he was the team's leading run-scorer, and third overall

After being dismissed for 97 on his Test debut, he quickly made amends with 143 in his second match followed by 125 in his third

Scored 162 runs in five matches in the ICC Men's T20 WC 2021, which included unbeaten half-centuries against the West Indies and England

DAVID MILLER



DOB: 10 Jun 1989 BORN: Pietermaritzburg STYLE: LHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at North Sound in 2010

Playing in his fourth ICC Men's T20 WC

Hit an unbeaten 138 from 92 balls on his ICC Men's CWC debut against Zimbabwe at Hamilton in 2015, sharing a record unbroken fifth-wicket partnership of 256 with JP Duminy

He has made his reputation as a white ball 'finisher' in franchise Twenty20 around the world, and retired from first-class cricket in March 2018

Struck a 35-ball century against Bangladesh at Potchefstroom in October 2017, setting a record for the fastest century in all T20I cricket

LUNGI NGIDI



Made his T20I debut against Sri Lanka at Centurion in 2017

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He impressed early in his international career, and was named Player of the Match on his Test debut against India at Centurion in 2018

In March 2020, he took his maiden ODI five-wicket haul and in doing so became the fastest South African to take 50 wickets in that form of the game

He made a similarly excellent start to his T20I career, and in July 2020 he was named both ODI and T20I cricketer of the year at Cricket South Africa's annual awards ceremony

ANRICH NORTJE



DOB: 16 Nov 1993 BORN: Uitenhage STYLE: RHB/RF

Made his T20I debut against Sri Lanka at Johannesburg in 2019

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

In late 2018 he impressed in the inaugural edition of the Mzansi Super League, and was named in South Africa's squad for the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019 but withdrew with a broken thumb

Signed as a replacement for Chris Woakes for the Delhi Capitals in the 2020 IPL, he bowled the fastest delivery in the competition's history against Rajasthan Royals

South Africa's joint leading wicket-taker in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 with nine wickets, which included figures of 3-8 against Bangladesh at Abu Dhabi

WAYNE **PARNELL**



DOB: 30 Jul 1989 BORN: Port Elizabeth STYLE: LHB/LFM

Made his T20I debut against Australia at Brisbane in 2009

Playing in his fourth ICC Men's T20 WC

He captained South Africa in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2008 in Malaysia, taking 18 wickets – the most in the tournament – to help South Africa to the final

He went on to enjoy a fruitful *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2009, taking 3-14 against England and 4-13 against the West Indies

A regular in English county cricket and in T20 leagues around the world throughout the 2010s, he returned to international cricket in late 2021 after four years

KAGISO **RABADA**



DOB: 25 May 1995 BORN: Johannesburg STYLE: LHB/RF

Made his T20I debut against Australia at Adelaide in 2014

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

First made headlines at *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2014 when he helped South Africa win their first title and was their highest wicket-taker, headlined by 6-25 against Australia

He became just the second player to take a hat-trick on ODI debut, and his figures of 6-16 against Bangladesh at Mirpur set a record for a debutant

Having topped both *ICC* bowling rankings in Test and ODI cricket, he took a hat-trick against England at Sharjah in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021

RILEE ROSSOUW



DOB: 9 Oct 1989 BORN: Bloemfontein STYLE: LHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Australia at Adelaide in 2014

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He first came to attention in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2008, and having impressed on the domestic circuit, earned an IPL contract with Royal Challengers Bangalore

Played six matches in the *ICC* Men's CWC 2015, and he was also part of South Africa's 2016 Men's T20 WC squad, bagging a duck in the only match he played

Retired from international cricket in 2017 and became a man in demand around the world fot T20 leagues, before returning to the international fold for the 2022 summer tour of England

TABRAIZ **SHAMSI**



DOB: 18 Feb 1990 BORN: Johannesburg STYLE: RHB/SLC

Made his T20I debut against England at Southampton in 2017

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

A superb 2015-16 domestic season gained him an IPL deal at Royal Challengers Bangalore, and he has rapidly become South Africa's first-choice limited overs spinner

He took six wickets in the three-match T201 series against Pakistan in early 2021 to rise to the top of the *ICC* T201 bowling rankings for the first time

He followed up by taking eight wickets in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 at just 15.12 apiece while conceding just 6.36 per over

TRISTAN **STUBBS**



DOB: 14 Aug 2000 BORN: Johannesburg STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against India at Delhi in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC


He moved to Knysna at the age of eight and moved on to Grey High School in Gqeberha (formerly Port Elizabeth), while representing EP through the rest of their age group levels

Starred in the 2022 CSA T20 competition for Warriors, scoring 293 runs from seven matches at an average of 48.83 and incredible strike rate of 183.12 with 23 sixes

Marked his first innings in T20I cricket by striking 72 from just 28 balls against England at Bristol in July 2022

Struck unbeaten innings of 47 and 74 in the T20I series against India at Dharamsala in February 2022 before captaining Sri Lanka to their sixth Asia Cup title later in the year





DOB: 29 Jun 1997 BORN: Elpitiya STYLE: LHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against India at Colombo in 2021

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

Captained Sri Lanka's U19 team against Pakistan in 2015, scoring a double-century and a century, and led the team in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2016

Made his maiden ODI half-century against India in July 2021 and followed up with successive innings of 72 and 77 in the home series with South Africa, both at better than a run-a-ball

Enjoyed a fruitful *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, striking 80 not out against Bangladesh at Sharjah and 68 against the West Indies at Abu Dhabi

DUSHMANTHA CHAMEERA



DOB: 11 Jan 1992 BORN: Ragama STYLE: RHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at Pallekele in 2015

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

He took the wicket of Ross Taylor in his first ODI over and earned selection for the *ICC* Men's CWC 2015, where he took 3-51 against Scotland

Played three matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2016 in India, but failed to take a wicket, despite bowling economically against Afghanistan and the West Indies

A maiden ODI five-wicket haul came his way in May 2021 when he took 5-16 against Bangladesh at Mirpur, and the following month he took 4-17 against England in the Southampton T20I

DHANANJAYA **DE SILVA**



DOB: 6 Sep 1991 BORN: Colombo STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Colombo in 2015

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Had a great 2016, scoring 234 runs in Sri Lanka's T20 competition, but had to wait until 2021 to become a regular in the national T20I side

He took three wickets in nine deliveries to help Sri Lanka upset England at Leeds in the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019

Two centuries came his way in his first five Tests and during the course of his seventh Test century, he batted through the fourth day without being parted from Dimuth Karunaratne



DOB: 17 Mar 1991 BORN: Panadura STYLE: LHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at Mount Maunganui in 2016

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He represented Sri Lanka in the *ICC* U19 WC 2010, but it was another six years before he made his full international debut

Often preferred in the shorter formats, he struck 116 against Zimbabwe in 2017 and followed up with 133 against Pakistan two years later

Having breached the bio-secure bubble on the 2021 tour of England he was handed a ban, but returned to the national fold the following year

DANUSHKA GUNATHILAKA WANINDU HASARANGA



DOB: 29 Jul 1997 BORN: Galle STYLE: RHB/LB

Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at Pallekele in 2019

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

On his ODI debut against Zimbabwe at Galle in 2017 he became just the third debutant to take a hat-trick

Bowled economically against the West Indies and England at the start of 2021 to rise to number 2 in the *ICC* T20I bowling rankings

Took a hat-trick against South Africa in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 and ended up as the leading wicket-taker in the competition with 16 wickets

ICC MEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2022

CHAMIKA **KARUNARATNE**



DOB: 29 May 1996 BORN: Colombo STYLE: RHB/RMF

Made his T20I debut against India at Colombo in 2021

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

Born into a family of badminton players, he was a former junior national javelin champion as well as a former national U19 badminton champion

When Suranga Lakmal suffered a back injury the day before the match, he made his Test debut against Australia at Canberra in February 2019 and took a wicket with his fourth ball

International limited overs honours came two years later, but he failed to fire with bat or ball despite playing all eight of Sri Lanka's matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021





DOB: 13 Feb 1997 BORN: Kandy STYLE: LHB/RF

Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at Auckland in 2019

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He played four matches in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2016, and subsequently bowled superbly on the U19 tour of England, taking 11 wickets in the victory at Northampton

Announced himself on the international stage in just his third Test, with figures of 6-122 in South Africa's first inning at Cape Town in January 2017

Took eight wickets in his seven games in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC, with the stand-out performance figures of 3-7 in three overs against the Netherlands

PRAMOD MADUSHAN



DOB: 14 Dec 1993 BORN: Hambantota STYLE: RHB/RMF

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Dubai in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

One of the most exciting fast bowling prospects of Sri Lanka, he made his first-class debut in February 2015 for Tamil Union, and the following year impressed in his T20 debut with 3-17

He received a national call-up in June 2022 after picking up four wickets in a List-A game against Australia A and earned a deal with Dambulla Giants for the 2022 Lanka Premier League

Having taken two wickets on his T20I debut, he was retained for the 2022 Asia Cup final, when he took 4-34 against Pakistan to help Sri Lanka win the title

DII SHAN MADUSHANKA



DOB: 18 Sep 2000 **BORN**: Hambantota

Made his T20I debut against Afghanistan at Dubai in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Another product of the Colts Cricket Club, he earned selection in the Sri Lankan squad for the ICC U19 Men's CWC 2020

He starred with a five-wicket haul in the Plate Quarter-final and finished the competition as Sri Lanka's highest wicket-taker with 13 wickets

In 2020 he toured with the national side for the two-Test series against South Africa, and in 2022 he helped Sri Lanka win the Asia Cup, taking 3-24 against India along the way





Made his T20I debut against England at Southampton in 2016

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Having been named Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year in 2013, he led the Sri Lankan team in the ICC U19 Men's CWC 2014 where they reached the guarter-finals

In 2016 he scored a maiden Test century against Australia, and the following year his innings of 89 helped Sri Lanka chase 322 to beat India in the ICC Champions Trophy

Inconsistency has plaqued him, epitomised by his 2022 Asia Cup, when he struck 60 against Bangladesh and 57 against India, bur ended the tournament with successive golden ducks

PATHUM NISSANKA



DOB: 18 May 1998 **BORN:** Galle **STYLE: RHB**

Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at Coolidge in 2021

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He enjoyed a superb 2018-19 domestic season, totalling 1088 runs for Nondescripts and making a match-saving 217 for Sri Lanka A against Ireland A

He became just the fourth Sri Lankan to score a century on his Test debut – and the first to do so away from home - when he made 103 against the West Indies at Antigua in March 2021

Struck three half-centuries in the ICC Men's T20 WC 2022, the highest of which was 72 from 58 balls against South Africa at Sharjah

BHANUKA **Rajapaksa**



DOB: 24 Oct 1991 BORN: Colombo STYLE: LHB/RM

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Lahore in 2019

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He was Sri Lanka's leading run-scorer in the ICC U19 Men's CWC 2010 with 253 runs and impressing with his attacking style

Struck 19 sixes in his career-best innings of 268 for Burgher against Sri Lanka Ports Authority at Colombo in February 2019

Struck 77 from 48 balls against Pakistan in just his second T20I and made 155 runs in six innings in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 at a strike rate of 143.31





DOB: 1 Aug 2000 BORN: Colombo STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against South Africa at Colombo in 2021

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He attended St Benedict's School, which had not produced a Sri Lankan cricketer since 1979, and won the All-Island Best All-Rounder award in his final year at school

He subsequently became the 29th bowler to take a wicket with his first ball in ODI cricket when he dismissed Janneman Malan

Bowled well in the first round of the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, taking 3-25 against Namibia, 3-17 against Ireland and 2-3 against the Netherlands

JEFFREY VANDERSAY



Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Colombo in 2015

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He originally burst onto the scene when he took eight wickets in a three-day game for the Sri Lanka Board President's XI against Pakistan in 2015

Having replaced the injured Lasith Malinga, he bowled well in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2016, taking 1-11 in his four overs against the West Indies and 2-26 against England

Having only featured periodically for the national team since that competition, he returned in early 2022 for the tour of Australia

Made his T20I debut against Ireland at Sylhet in 2014

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

His father ran a plumbing business in Sharjah, having emigrated to the UAE in 1972 to work as an electrical engineer

Best known for his economical spells of left-arm spin, he has juggled a job as a bank officer while playing professional cricket

In January 2020, he took his first ODI five-wicket haul against Namibia in Al Amerat, and two years later at the same venue, he took 5-19 against Nepal in a T20I

Made his T20I debut against Iran at Al Amerat in 2020

His maiden ODI century followed in March 2022 when he struck an unbeaten 115 from just 76 balls against Namibia at Sharjah

He followed up with 102 not out against the USA at Texas three months later

Made his T20I debut against Namibia in 2021

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

In 2016 he moved to the UAE to work as a coach at Sharjah Cricket Stadium on the recommendation of former UAE batter Mohammad Qasim

An international debut followed at the age of 34 and he took seven six wickets at the UAE won the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2022 Global Qualifier A

BASIL HAMEED

Made his T20I debut against Iran at Al Amerat in 2020

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Four years later he made his international debut and has become a consistent performer with both bat and ball

He was on the verge of making the national side in January 2021 but contracted Covid, so had to wait patiently for his chance

Made his T20I debut against Namibia at Dubai in 2021

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He started playing cricket in 2010 in the streets of his home city and joined Sakhi Shabaz Club in 2012, the same year he was picked up by the Rashid Latif Cricket Academy in Burewala

After being spotted playing in Lahore in 2017, he was offered a UAE residency visa by Mudassir Ali to join his company Versatile Deployment Solutions as a full-time member of their cricket team

He picked up a T10 winners' medal with the Maratha Arabians in 2019, and struck T20I centuries against Ireland in both 2021 and 2022

Made his T20I debut against Iran at Al Amerat in 2020

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He became the third youngest player ever to feature for the senior national team and also represented Maratha Arabians in the T10 Cricket League in early 2021

He featured in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2014 on home soil and scored a half-century against New Zealand, and became the first UAE player to earn an IPL deal in 2017 with the Gujarat Lions

Made his T20I debut against the Netherlands at Voorburg in 2019

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

In just his third T20I match he struck 55 from 35 balls against Nigeria at Abu Dhabi in the *ICC* T20 WC Qualifier 2019-20

Represented Emirates Cricket Board in the Emirates D20 competition in December 2020, scoring 151 runs in his seven matches

Took ODI career-best figures of 4-30 as the UAE defeated the USA at Pearland in the *ICC* World Cricket League Two in June 2022

BORN: Couva, Trinidad STYLE: LHB/WK

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Dubai in 2016

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He was the fourth-highest run-scorer in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2014, but a serious car accident pushed his international breakthrough back to 2018

In the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019, he struck halfcenturies against England and Afghanistan, and 118 from 103 balls against Sri Lanka

Enjoyed an excellent IPL season in 2020 in which he scored 353 runs and hit 25 sixes, and did well in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, scoring 40 against Bangladesh and 46 against Sri Lanka





DOB: 1 Oct 1988 BORN: St Michael, Barbados STYLE: RHB/LB

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Karachi in 2021

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He played in two *ICC* U19 WC tournaments, captaining the West Indies side in 2008, but found the transition to senior cricket difficult and was dropped by Barbados in 2012

He made a stunning comeback in 2015, striking 124 against Windward Islands, and continued his upward momentum, makinng 91 and 122 not out as West Indies A captain against India A in 2018

A first Test century came against Afghanistan in late 2019 in just his third Test, and after striking 93 on his ODI debut against Ireland, a maiden ton in that format followed in June 2022

Made his T20I debut against Australia at Carrara in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He represented the West Indies under-19s at the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2010 in Australia in which he struck 110 not out against Sri Lanka in the third-place play-off

He was the leading run-scorer in the 2016–17 Regional Four Day Competition, with 691 runs in ten matches

He captained the West Indies Emerging Team for the 2019–20 Regional Super50

JOHNSON CHARLES





DOB: 14 Jan 1989 BORN: St Lucia STYLE: RHB/WK

Made his T20I debut against England at The Oval in 2011

Playing in his third ICC Men's T20 WC

He toured with the West Indies to play two T20Is in England in 2011, and the following year made his ODI debut against a touring Australian side

Despite struggling at the world stage, he was named in the 15-men West Indies squad for the *ICC* Men's T20 WC, where he helped his side to the title, scoring 84 against England

Four years later, he again won a winner's medal, making a crucial 52 off 36 balls against the hosts India, and he has plied his trade in T20 leagues around the world since then

Made his T20I debut against England at Bridgetown in 2014

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Picked up 12 wickets in the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019 to finish as his team's leading wicket-taker in the tournament

Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at Wellington in 2014

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He was his team's leading wicket-taker in the ICC U19 Men's CWC 2010 and was drafted into the national squad the following year, replacing Tino Best

Scored an unbeaten 202 from 229 deliveries against England in the 2019 Bridgetown Test, which included 23 fours and eight sixes, and led the West Indies in the *ICC* Men's CWC later that year

Was Player of the Series in the 2022 T20I series against England when he took four wickets in four balls in the final match to help decide the series

AKEAL HOSAIN



DOB: 25 Apr 1993 BORN: Port-of-Spain, Trinidad STYLE: LHB/SLA

Made his T20I debut against South Africa at St George's in 2021

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

A calm, composed player, he represented the West Indies in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2012 in Australia, in which he scored 82 runs and took five wickets

After helping the Trinbago Knight Riders win the 2020 edition of the CPL with ten wickets, he was promoted to the international squad for the tour of Bangladesh

Took five wickets in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021 and started 2022 by taking 4-30 in the deciding fifth match of the T20I series against England





Made his T20I debut against India at Tarouba in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He was the leading wicket-taker in the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2016, leading the West Indies to the title and bowling the fastest delivery in the competition

Marked his IPL debut by taking a competition-record 6-12 for Mumbai Indians against Sunrisers Hyderabad in the Indian Premier League in 2019

He has two scores in the 80s in Test cricket, and spent the summer of 2021 playing for Worcestershire in England

BRANDON KING



DOB: 16 Dec 1994 BORN: Jamaica STYLE: RHB

Made his T20I debut against Afghanistan at Lucknow in 2019

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He enjoyed a breakout season in 2018-19, when he racked up 630 runs in seven games, landing him a middle-order slot in the West Indies A side

Scored 496 runs for Guyana in the 2019 CPL, including an unbeaten 132 against Barbados Tridents, then the highest individual score in the CPL

He initially struggled in the international arena, but on his recall in 2021 he scored fifties in T20Is against Pakistan and England, and an unbeaten 58 and 91 in an ODI series win against Netherlands

EVIN **LEWIS**



DOB: 27 Dec 1991 BORN: Port-of-Spain, Trinidad STYLE: LHB

Made his T20I debut against Afghanistan at Nagpur in 2016

Playing in his third *ICC* Men's T20 WC

His maiden ODI century was an innings of 148 against Sri Lanka in 2016, and his innings of 176 against England at The Oval the following year only ended when he had to retire hurt

His unbeaten innings of 125 against India at Kingston in 2017 was the highest individual innings batting second in a T20I match at the time, and remains a national record

Played five matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, scoring 56 off 35 balls against South Africa at Dubai

KYLE **MAYERS**



DOB: 8 Sep 1992 BORN: Barbados STYLE: LHB/RM

Made his T20I debut against New Zealand at Mount Maunganui in 2020

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He travelled to England as a reserve for West Indies in 2020 before making his T201 debut in New Zealand later in the year on the back of some impressive form in regional cricket for Barbados

He became an overnight sensation for his fourth innings, unbeaten 210 in an improbable run-chase of 395 to defeat Bangladesh at Chittagong in February 2021

He was at it again against England at Grenada the following year, taking 5-18 to set the West Indies on the way to victory

OBED McCOY



Made his T20I debut against England at St Kitts in 2019

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 WC

He was named in the West Indies squad for the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2016, but suffered an injury before the quarter-finals

Bowed excellently in the five-match T201 series in Grenada against South Africa in mid-2021, taking 3-25 in the third match and 4-22 in the fourth

Played just one match in the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2021, but roared back to form the following year, taking 6-17 against India at Basseterre, a national record

ROVMAN POWELL



Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Bridgetown in 2017

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He has been a semi-regular presence in West Indies' white-ball squads from the mid-2010s without managing to quite cement a spot

Struck a maiden ODI hundred against Ireland in 2018, but was left out of the squad for the *ICC* Men's CWC the following year

Struck 107 off 53 balls against England at home in early 2022 and played was everpresent for the Delhi Capitals in the IPL, playing several impressive cameos





DOB: 11 May 1991 BORN: Archer's Road, Barbados STYLE: LHB/LM

Made his T20I debut against Australia at Carrara in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

Not only is he a wicket-taking bowler, but he also has the extraordinary ability to clear the fence with utmost precision

The son of former national captain Floyd, he received his maiden international call-up in the 2016-17 home season, but failed to make the playing XI against the England tourists

Two years later, he was included in the Tri-Series tournament that featured Ireland and Bangladesh, and was named as a reserve for the *ICC* Men's CWC 2019 in England

ODEAN SMITH



DOB: 1 Nov 1996 BORN: St Elizabeth, Jamaica STYLE: RHB/RM

Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Karachi in 2018

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC


After his initial selection, his lack of consistency saw him sidelined from the squad, and he spent more than three years out of the T20I side

He returned towards the end of 2021 and earned himself a deal with the Punjab Kings in the 2022 IPL, for whom he played five matches

That experience propelled him to greater success in the international arena, taking 3-32 and 3-29 in the T20I series against New Zealand at Kingston in August 2022

Made his T20I debut against Sri Lanka at Providence in 2010

Playing in his third *ICC* Men's T20 WC

His father, uncle and older brother Sean all played first-class cricket, before he received a call-up to Zimbabwe's squad for the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2010

He took an 18-month break from international cricket after the 2013 tour of the Caribbean, but returned in time for the *ICC* Men's CWC 2015 and struck two ODI centuries soon afterwards

He scored a third Test century in early 2020 and was named captain of the Zimbabwean side the following year

RYAN BURL



DOB: 15 Apr 1994 BORN: Marondera STYLE: LHB/LB

Made his T20I debut against Afghanistan at Sharjah in 2018

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He was part of two *ICC* U19 Men's CWC campaigns in 2012 and 2014, and was the stand-out performer in the 2017-18 Logan Cup with 401 runs in five matches

Struck 30 runs from one Shakib Al Hasan over at Mirpur in 2019, the most by a Zimbabwean in one over in T20I cricket as he made an unbeaten 57 from 32 balls

He has experience in the BPL with Chattogram Challengers, and found form against Bangladesh again in August 2022 with innings of 32 and 54 at Harare

REGIS CHAKABVA



Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Toronto in 2008

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He first played for Zimbabwe at the Afro-Asia U19 Cup in 2005, but had to wait in line behind Tatenda Taibu and Brendan Taylor in the national wicket-keeping stakes

He was part of the Zimbabwe squad for the *ICC* Men's CWC 2015 and made solid if not spectacular contributions in T20I cricket in 2021 and 2022

His 73-ball century against Bangladesh at Harare in August 2022 set a record for the fastest ODI ton for Zimbabwe

TENDAI CHATARA



DOB: 28 Feb 1991 BORN: Chimaniamani STYLE: RHB/RFM

Made his T20I debut against India at Harare in 2010

Playing in his second *ICC* Men's T20 WC

He represented Manicaland in 200m and 400m events while still in high school, and played for his country at the *ICC* U19 Men's CWC 2010 before a senior debut followed shortly afterwards

He took 32 wickets in 18 international games in 2013 and his maiden Test five-for sealed a famous Test win over Pakistan, soon after which he found himself Zimbabwe's senior bowler

He recently passed the 100-wicket mark in ODI cricket and contributed four wickets as Zimbabwe qualified for the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2022 via Global Qualifier A

BRAD EVANS



DOB: 24 Mar 1997 BORN: Harare STYLE: RHB/RMF

Made his T20I debut against Namibia at Bulawayo in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

The son of former Zimbabwean international Craig, he made his first-class debut for Cardiff University in 2018, from where he achieved First Class honours in BSc Sports & Exercise Science

Took 2-26 in his fourth T20I match – against Bangladesh at Harare in early August 2022

Enjoyed a superb all-round match in the third ODI against India later the same month, scoring 28 and taking 5-54

LUKE JONGWE



Made his T20I debut against Pakistan at Harare in 2015

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He arrived on the domestic stage in December 2013 as a teenager and found himself in the national team eight months later

He suffered a head injury in a practice match against the UAE just weeks before the *ICC* Men's T20 WC 2016 and only returned to the international side five years later

When he did return, he stole the show in a T20I match against Pakistan, when he took 4-18 to enable Zimbabwe to defend a target of just 119

CLIVE MADANDE



DOB: 12 Apr 2000 **BORN:** Chitungwiza STYLE: RHB

Made his T20I debut against Afghanistan at Harare in 2022

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He made his debuts in all three forms of the game in the 2020-21 domestic season for Tuskers, having first represented Zimbabwe U19s at the age of 16

His first appearance in a national squad came in January 2022 when he was included for the series against Sri Lanka, but he failed to make the final XI

A full international debut eventually came in both forms of the game later in the year, and he struck 24 on his first ODI appearance

STYLE: RHB/OB

Made his T20I debut against Bangladesh at Mirpur in 2020

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

He was part of the Zimbabwe squads for the ICC U19 Men's CWC in 2016 and 2018. and the ICC named him one of the rising stars of the latter tournament

He top-scored on his ODI debut with an innings of 35 and made a good start to his T20I career, striking 70 not out against Pakistan in just his third match

His success in the shortest format continued through the next two years, striking successive half-centuries against Bangladesh in 2021 and Namibia in 2022

WELLINGTON MASAKADZA



Made his T20I debut against Afghanistan at Bulawayo in 2015

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 WC

The youngest of three brothers who have each played cricket at high levels - the others are Hamilton and Shingirai - he represented Zimbabwe at the ICC U19 Men's CWC 2012
