# TOURNAMENT HISTORY

The ICC Men's Cricket World Cup is the pinnacle 50-over event of the international cricket calendar and takes place every four years.

The 2019 tournament is the 12th edition and is being hosted by England and Wales for the first time since 1999. England also staged the first three tournaments but they have yet to lift the trophy.

The 2015 tournament was jointly hosted by Australia and New Zealand, who faced each other in the final. Australia, who have won four of the last five ICC Men's Cricket World Cups, prevailed and became the second host nation in succession to win the tournament. India's triumph over Sri Lanka in Mumbai in 2011 was the first such occurrence of a home win.

The inaugural ICC Men's Cricket World Cup was held in England in 1975 and won by West Indies, who also won the second four years later and were expected to win a third but were stunned by India at Lord's in 1983.

The ICC Women's World Cup has been played since 1973, most recently in 2017 when England won a memorable final against India at Lord's.

The first, and still one of the best. A glorious mid-summer day at Lord's culminated in Clive Lloyd lifting the trophy following West Indies' thrilling 17-run victory over Ian Chappell's Australia. Lloyd's memorable century came off 82 balls. Australia's chase was punctuated by two brilliant run-outs executed by Viv Richards.

In the semi-finals of the eight-team tournament, Australia beat the hosts England at Headingley thanks to six for 14 from left-arm swing bowler Gary Gilmour – then the best ODI bowling figures. The Windies progressed past New Zealand in the other semi at The Oval.

West Indies comfortably retained the trophy won four years earlier thanks to a fifth-wicket stand of 139 between Viv Richards and Collis King, whose blistering display contained three sixes and ten fours and took only 66 balls.

England, who, like West Indies, were unbeaten in the eight-team tournament going into the final, replied with a 129-run opening stand from Mike Brearley and Geoff Boycott but they had left themselves too much to do, needing 158 from the last 22 overs.

A tournament of shocks. Zimbabwe, making their first appearance at the ICC Cricket World Cup, beat Australia, thanks to 69 not out and four wickets from their captain, Duncan Fletcher, who would later coach England and India.

Nine days later, Zimbabwe had India 17 for five before Kapil Dev played one of the great World Cup innings – a then tournament record 175 not out off 138 balls. India prevailed by 31 runs despite 73 from Kevin Curran, the late father of England brothers Tom and Sam, who had earlier taken three wickets.

The most lasting shock came in the final when India fell in love with the one-day game after dramatically denying West Indies a hat-trick of titles. Chasing 184 to win, West Indies seemed to be cruising until Viv Richards top-edged a pull off Madan Lal and was well caught by Kapil Dev running back from square leg. Mohinder Amarnath won the match award as much for his battling 26 against the Windies' pace battery as for his three valuable late wickets.

The first ICC Cricket World Cup to be staged in Asia (and the first to comprise 50 overs per side) had an Anglo-Australian final. In the semi-finals, England beat India in Mumbai thanks to a masterful century from Graham Gooch who relentlessly and successfully swept the home side's spinners. In the other semi, Australia beat Pakistan by 18 runs in Lahore.

The group stages produced some nail-biting finishes, including the holders India losing by one run to Australia and England scoring 35 off the last three overs to beat West Indies by two wickets.

The tournament moved into more new territories and also into the modern era with the first use of coloured clothing, a white ball and floodlights. The format was an all-play-all league, which is being revisited for the 2019 edition.

Co-hosts New Zealand, who lost in the semi-finals for the third time, revealed a glimpse of the game's limited-overs future by using a power-hitter (Mark Greatbatch) at the top of the order and a spinner (Dipak Patel) to open the bowling.

England, with a team of canny all-rounders including a 36-year-old Ian Botham, beat South Africa in a controversial rain-affected semi to set up a final with Imran Khan's Pakistan. In front of 90,000 at the MCG, Wasim Akram took two wickets in successive balls late in England's innings to seal his side's victory.

Sri Lanka hosted for the first time and made their mark on the world game in spectacular fashion. Their quarter-final with England in Faisalabad epitomised their revolutionary, aggressive approach. Chasing 236 to win, they had reached 113 for one in the 13th over with Sanath Jayasuriya smashing 82 off 44 balls. Sri Lanka reached their target with 9.2 overs to spare.

Having beaten India in the semi-final, Sri Lanka dominated the final against Australia, becoming the first side batting second to triumph. Aravinda de Silva's 124-ball innings was the third century in a final.

In the group stage, Kenya, in their first appearance, upset West Indies in a remarkable match in Pune. The Windies, chasing only 167 to win, were bowled out for 93, their lowest World Cup total.

The one-sided final was overshadowed by the epic tied semi-final at Edgbaston between Australia and South Africa, which allowed Australia to progress because they had finished above South Africa in the Super Six table.

Lance Klusener had bludgeoned 31 off 14 balls to take South Africa, whose team contained Steve Elworthy, the managing director of this tournament, to the brink of the final. But, with only one needed from four balls, a mix-up with Allan Donald led to a run-out and the tie.

Having lost two of their first three matches, including to eventual runners-up Pakistan, Australia were unbeaten in their remaining seven matches of the tournament. Pakistan were the victims in the tournament's major giant-killing act, losing by 62 runs to Bangladesh in Northampton.

Fixtures also took place in Wales, Scotland, Ireland and the Netherlands.

The ICC Men's Cricket World Cup moved to Africa for the first time though the main hosts, South Africa, exited the group stage in agonising fashion after a tie with Sri Lanka in which they had misinterpreted the Duckworth-Lewis calculation.

Australia retained the title and were dominant throughout, winning all 11 of their matches. In the final against India, captain Ricky Ponting made the highest individual score in a final while his team's total was also a record for the final. He scored 90 off his last 47 balls and hit eight sixes.

India lost Sachin Tendulkar, the player of the tournament, in the first over of their reply and were never in the hunt. Tendulkar's 673 runs was an ICC Men's Cricket World Cup record and included a brilliant 98 off 75 balls in a six-wicket win over Pakistan at Centurion.

For Pakistan, Shoaib Akhtar bowled the fastest recorded delivery (100mph/160kph), to England's Nick Knight in Cape Town.

The lowest-ranked side Canada upset Bangladesh but also recorded the lowest ever ODI total, 36 against Sri Lanka.

Ricky Ponting emulated Clive Lloyd in lifting the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup for a second time. His Australian side completed a hat-trick titles and were even more dominant in the Caribbean's first staging of the tournament than they had been in South Africa four years earlier.

Australia's batsmen posted 300 or more every time they batted first and hit 67 sixes. Ten of those came from the bat of Adam Gilchrist, whose 149 off 104 balls was the highest score in a final and the first by an opener.

A single day produced two of the tournaments biggest ever upsets. Bangladesh beat India while Ireland, on St Patrick's Day, knocked out Pakistan.

Another highlight was the diving one-handed catch by the 122 kg Bermuda player Dwayne Leverock to dismiss India's Robin Uthappa. It was Bermuda's debut in the tournament and the dismissal came from teenager Malachi Jones' first ball. Leverock set off on a lap of honour while Jones was reduced to tears.

MS Dhoni's six into the Mumbai sky to complete the first home win in tournament history sent a billion Indians into ecstasy and reduced the great Sachin Tendulkar to tears.

India did not dominate the tournament but they did get progressively better as it went on. They eliminated holders Australia, who had earlier lost their first ICC Cricket World Cup match since 1999, in the quarter-finals and Pakistan in the semis.

In the first ICC Cricket World Cup to feature the Decision Review System, there were impressive victories over England by Bangladesh on home soil in Chittagong and Ireland, who recovered from 111 for five to chase down England's 327. There was also a thrilling tie between India and England in Bengaluru.

Michael Clarke led co-hosts Australia to their fifth title in the last of his 245 One-Day Internationals in front of 93,013 at the MCG, a record official attendance for a day's cricket.

Early in the tournament, in Auckland, the two finalists had played out a memorable encounter with New Zealand winning by one wicket. The match was dominated by the left-armers, Trent Boult for New Zealand (five for 27) and Australia's Mitchell Starc (six for 28), who would emerge as Player of the Tournament.

Afghanistan made their tournament debut and Bangladesh reached the quarter-finals for the first time.

There were two double centuries: by Martin Guptill (NZ v WI) and Chris Gayle (WI v Zim), whose 215 contained 16 sixes and was the fastest ODI double ton.

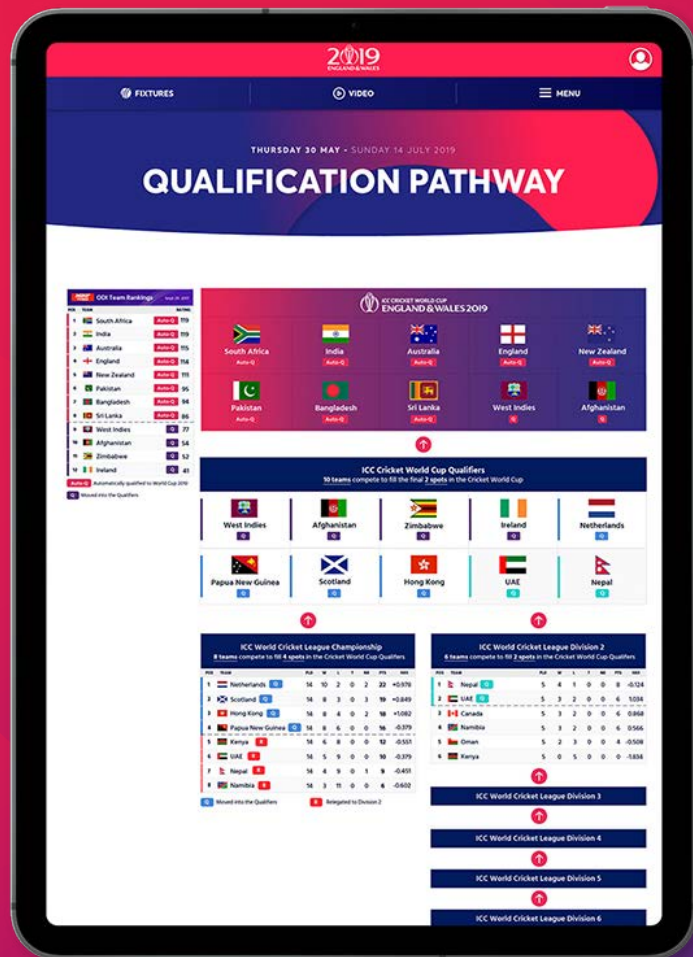

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# QUALIFICATION PATHWAY

The journey to the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2019 began way back in 2013 with regional qualifiers as 83 nations started out on the road to one-day cricket's showpiece event.

The top eight nations in the ICC ODI Team Rankings in September 2017 qualified automatically for the tournament.

The next four in the rankings – West Indies, Afghanistan, Zimbabwe and Ireland – were joined by Netherlands, Scotland, Hong Kong and Papua New Guinea from the ICC

World Cricket League Championship plus Nepal and United Arab Emirates from ICC World Cricket League Division 2 in the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup Qualifiers in Zimbabwe in March 2018.

Afghanistan defeated West Indies in the final in Harare and both progressed to the tournament proper.

# THE TROPHY

The ICC Men's Cricket World Cup trophy is presented to the winner of the tournament final.

The current trophy was created for the 1999 champions, Australia, and was the first permanent prize in the tournament's history; prior to this, different trophies were made for each ICC Men's Cricket World Cup.

The trophy was designed and produced in London by a team of craftsmen from Garrard & Co over a period of two months. The current trophy is made from silver and gilt, and features a golden globe held up by three silver columns.

The columns, shaped as stumps and bails, represent the three fundamental aspects of cricket: batting, bowling and fielding, while the globe represents a cricket ball. The trophy stands 60cm high and weighs approximately 11kg.

The names of the previous winners are engraved on the base of the trophy, with space for a total of 20 inscriptions.

## UMPIRES' COLOURS

Umpires will wear a pink shirt in all matches **except** those matches involving West Indies, Afghanistan in red or Bangladesh in red. In those matches a black shirt will be worn. For the West Indies v Afghanistan match a pink shirt will be worn.



# PLAYING REGULATIONS

## DECISION REVIEW SYSTEM

The Decision Review System (DRS) is a technology-based process for assisting the match officials with their decision-making.

On-field umpires may consult with the third umpire (an Umpire Review) and players may request that the third umpire consider a decision of the on-field umpires (a Player Review).

Teams are permitted ONE unsuccessful Player Review per innings.

## DUCKWORTH-LEWIS-STERN METHOD

The ICC formally adopted the Duckworth-Lewis-Stern (DLS) method, which is a formula to fairly calculate the winning side when inclement weather intervenes and the match is interrupted, which includes re-calculating totals when time is lost in the match.

## ICC CODE OF CONDUCT

The ICC Code of Conduct is part of the ICC's continuing efforts to maintain the public image, popularity and integrity of cricket by providing: (a) an effective means to deter any participant from conducting themselves improperly on and off the 'field-of-play' or in a manner that is contrary to the 'spirit of cricket'; and (b) a robust disciplinary procedure pursuant to which all matters of improper conduct can be dealt with fairly, with certainty and in an expeditious manner.

## ILLEGAL BOWLING REGULATIONS

An Illegal Bowling Action is where a player is throwing rather than bowling the ball. This is defined by the ICC as being where the player's elbow extends by an amount of more than 15 degrees between their arm reaching the horizontal and the ball being released. Match Officials in international cricket use the naked eye and their cricketing experience to decide whether they believe a player may be using an Illegal Bowling Action and, if so, they will submit a report.

## REPLACEMENT PLAYER APPLICATION PROCESS

After the commencement of the Support Period, Members are only permitted to replace a Player with the approval of the Event Technical Committee. The process for seeking approval is as follows:

- a) The Team Manager shall apply in writing for permission to replace a Player;
- b) The request must include details of the player being withdrawn, the reason for the request, and confirmation of the eligibility of the proposed replacement;
- c) If the replacement is due to an injury, independent (i.e. not from a physician or doctor connected to the squad) written medical certification of the injury must be provided;
- d) If the application is based on 'exceptional circumstances', these must be fully explained.

All passes must be collected in person and you must present photo identification. Accepted forms of identification are passport, national ID card or UK driving licence.

Accreditation passes are not transferable and must be worn at all times when working in match venues and practice grounds.

## LOST & STOLEN PASSES

If your pass is lost or stolen you must report it to the nearest Venue Accreditation Centre as soon as possible and complete a lost/stolen pass declaration form. Provided you have adequate photo identification, your pass can be replaced at the Venue Accreditation Centre.

If your pass has been left at a hotel or other local venue, you will be required to return to the location to retrieve it. No additional or temporary pass will be issued in this case.

All accredited photographers will be issued with an individually numbered photo bib along with their accreditation.

The photo bib is valid for the duration of the tournament. Please ensure you take it with you, along with your accreditation, when you are covering warm up matches, practice sessions and tournament matches. You are required to wear both the bib and your accreditation at all times when working in a Cricket World Cup venue.

Please note that the photo bib is not transferable, you must not swap it with any other person.

If your bib is lost or stolen, you must report it to the Media Operations team in your nearest venue as soon as possible.



# MEDIA SERVICES

## VENUE ACCESS & MATCH ALLOCATIONS

The accreditation pass itself does not automatically entitle media to entry into the ground on a match day. On match days, passes will be scanned at the gate and only those who have been approved for a place at the match will be granted entry.

On match day -1 and match day -2 access will be granted once the pass has been checked visually.

Matches are allocated in accordance with the ICC's quotas and priority orders and those who have been granted a seat in the press box or a photo position will find this information published in their online accreditation account.

Anyone whose request is still listed as pending is on a waiting list and will be advised as early as possible, but no later than 24 hours before a match if they have an approved place.

Media who have been approved for a match will also receive an email in advance of match day to confirm their place and advise of key operational information.

## NO SHOWS & CANCELLATIONS

If you can no longer attend a match for which you have a confirmed place you must email [mediaoperations@cw19.co.uk](mailto:mediaoperations@cw19.co.uk) as soon as possible, but no later than 48 hours ahead of the match.

Any media who fail to report their cancellation without good reason risk being removed from future match lists, even if they have been previously confirmed.

## SEMI-FINALS & FINAL

Applications for the semi-finals and final must be submitted through your online accreditation account. Matches will become available for selection from 10:00 on 4 July and will remain open until 10:00 on 7 July.

Priority will be given to media whose teams feature in these matches.

## MEDIA CONFERENCES

According to the media guidelines, official press conferences take place on match day minus one and match days only. However, the teams will be encouraged to make players available either before or after training on match days minus two.

On pre-match days, teams training in the morning will hold their media conference after training, while the teams training in the afternoon will hold their conference beforehand. The pre-match conferences are expected to be attended by the captains and/or coaches.

Post-match media conferences will take place immediately after the presentation ceremony, with the losing captain first and followed by the winning captain.

If the player of the match doesn't attend the post-match media conference, then he will be available to the media in the Mixed Zone.

## MIXED ZONE

The Mixed Zone is an area where media can conduct short interviews with players just prior to their departure from the venue. The mixed zone starts after the media conferences with players from the losing side attending first, followed by the players from the winning side.

Each team will be expected to make, at least, four players available and if mixed zone is delivered according to the guidelines, the sides will not be obligated to organise follow-up media interview opportunities the next day. This will be clarified to the media by the ICC.

The mixed zone has separate areas for the rights holding broadcasters and the written press. Non-rights holding broadcasters can also attend the mixed zone along with the written press but are not permitted to record any content. However, to facilitate the NRHs, the ICC will provide unedited video interviews from the Mixed Zone the following morning through the Online Media Zone.

## ONLINE MEDIA ZONE

The Online Media Zone (OMZ) [www.icc-cricket.com/media-zone/login](http://www.icc-cricket.com/media-zone/login) will be a one-stop shop for media attending or following the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2019. The OMZ has been designed to ensure the media remains up to speed on all matters relating to the tournament, and will include content that can be downloaded and used for editorial purposes.

As this is a password protected site, you will need login details, which you can get by writing to Rajshekhar Rao at [rajshekhar.rao@icc-cricket.com](mailto:rajshekhar.rao@icc-cricket.com). If you have already signed up and have forgotten the password, then please retrieve the password by clicking the Retrieve Password button.

### The OMZ will include:

- Unedited video clips of all media conferences.
- Unedited video clips of Mixed Zone interviews.
- Verbatim transcripts of all media conferences.
- Exclusive columns from former international stalwarts.
- Match previews and reviews, features and articles.
- Resources section to include playing conditions; important telephone numbers; match officials' appointments; training sessions; electronic media kits/guide; daily stats pack etc.

## VERBATIM TRANSCRIPTS OF PRESS CONFERENCES

The ICC has engaged ASAP Sports to provide a complete, word-for-word FastScript, which will be delivered within minutes of the completion of the press conferences in electronic form to the media and will also be available on the Online Media Zone. This will enable journalists to concentrate on their match reports, not worrying about missing interviews, trying to read illegible notes, trying to transcribe poorly recorded press conferences or having to borrow material from other journalists.

The service will also benefit journalists who are not attending the tournament as they will be able to produce their own copy with the assistance of the captains' quotes.

## MEDIA RIGHTS

ICC's Global Broadcast Partner for the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2019 is Star Sports, the sports broadcasting network owned by Disney and through its subsidiary STAR TV, broadcasts primarily to India, Bangladesh, Bhutan, Maldives, Nepal and Sri Lanka.

Star Sports also oversees the syndication and distribution of ICC events to a global audience and Broadcast Partners include; Sky Sports (United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland), OSN (Middle East and North Africa), Willow TV (USA), SuperSport (South Africa and sub-Saharan Africa), Fox Sports (Australia), SKY TV (New

Zealand), ESPN (Caribbean), PTV and Ten Sports (Pakistan), Maasranga, GTV & BTV (Bangladesh), SLRC (Sri Lanka) as well as reaching Afghanistan, Hong Kong, Fiji (and other Pacific Islands), Singapore, Malaysia and Europe.

## Digital Clip Rights

ICC licenses near-live clips for online and mobile viewing to various broadcasters, aggregators and mobile technology companies for all ICC events.

ICC's portfolio of Digital Clip Licensees include: Hotstar (India), BBC (United Kingdom & Republic of Ireland), ESPN (United Kingdom, South-East Asia and Australia), Stellar Digital Limited (South-East Asia), Global Sports Commerce PTE Ltd. (South-East Asia and Australia), Channel 2 Group (Sub-Saharan Africa, Europe, United Kingdom & Republic of Ireland, Caribbean, Australia and South-East Asia), OSN (MENA), Khaleef Technologies (Pakistan), Dialog (Sri Lanka), Times Internet (USA & Canada).

Digital Clip Licensees will not be seen on-ground at the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2019 however will ensure that the reach of ICC events remains strong despite shift of content consumption from linear to digital, from long form to short form.

## Other Media Rights

In addition to Broadcast Partners and Digital Clips Partners, ICC carved out additional media rights from its' broadcast agreement with Star and has licensed these rights to various other partners. These rights include Audio Rights, In-Flight Rights, Programming Rights, Public Screening Rights, Data Rights, News Access Rights, Public Screening and Archive Rights.

## Audio Rights

Channel 2 Group are ICC's Global Audio Rights Partner and hold FM, AM and digital audio rights until 2023. Channel 2 Group produce an English language world feed which they distribute to partners worldwide as well as syndicating rights to various on-ground partners.

Channel 2 Group will attend at all ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2019 matches under the banner of "Sports Flashes" as well as BBC Test Match Special, ensuring ball-by-ball audio coverage is made available to 800 million fans worldwide.

## Public Screening Rights

ICC's exploitation of Public Screening Rights will bring coverage to fans through (a) cinemas (b) Fan Zones (c) public screening events, around the world.

Cinemas in India (INOX Movies), the UAE (Reel Cinemas & Novo Films) and Bahrain (Novo Films) will broadcast select matches, LIVE.

Official Fan Zones will be in operation in the 10 UK host cities, in Pakistan and the UAE and Public Screening Events will take place at malls, airports and metro stations, around India.

## In-Flight Rights

ICC's live In-Flight Rights are held by Global Eagle Entertainment (GEE) until the end of the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2019. Via their maritime channel "Special Event", GEE will make available LIVE rights to worldwide cruise ship operators, such as P&O and Cunard.

## News Access Rights

ICC has long standing relationships with news distributors, SNTV and Perform, to sell 90-second highlights clips at the end of every televised match from ICC events. The rights are non-exclusive, thereby increasing the potential exposure of ICC events.

## Data Rights

ICC has appointed Perform Media/Opta Sports as its 'Official Data Collection and Distribution Partner' until 2019. Opta has the exclusive right to collect and distribute live data from venues for all major ICC events to ICC partners and third parties.

## BROADCAST

ICC TV will produce live world feed coverage of all 48 matches of the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2019. In addition to this, all ten official warm-up matches too will be covered live.

For all the tournament matches, the world feed will provide end-to-end match day coverage, commencing 30 minutes before the match. The coverage will continue during the innings interval, with a review of the first half of the game and a preview of the run chase. Once the game ends, there will be a short, sharp post-game show to end the day's coverage.

ICC TV's coverage of the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2019 will employ a world-class coverage plan with 34 match cameras employed at each match, including 8 Ultramotion Hawk-eye cameras. An integral part of the visual coverage will be the stunning aerial views with the use of Spidercam and drone cameras.

Playing in his first ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Canada at Sharjah in 2010.

Made his way through the age group teams to the 2010 ICC U19 World Cup in New Zealand where he was his team's leading wicket-taker, with 12 scalps.

In July 2018, he was the leading wicket-taker for Speen Ghar Region in the 2018 Ghazi Amanullah Khan Regional One Day Tournament, with 10 wickets in four matches.

Took an ODI career-best 4-25 against Ireland in a 109-run victory in March.

## ASGHAR AFGHAN

Playing in his second ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Scotland at Benoni in 2009.

In 2014, he scored a scintillating 90 not out that helped Afghanistan register their first win against a Test playing nation when they beat Bangladesh.

Playing in his second ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Scotland at Benoni in 2009.

He was first spotted when playing for Afghanistan in March 2006 in Mumbai when they defeated an MCC side and the following year became the first Afghanistan cricketer to play at Lord's.

Took eight wickets in six matches in ICC CWC 2015, with a best of 3-45 v Sri Lanka at Dunedin, and possesses a fearsome yorker.

He has been affected by injuries since 2015 and was called up to the CWC squad having not played an ODI since July 2016.

## HASHMATULLAH SHAHIDI

Playing in his first ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Kenya at Sharjah in 2013.

Struck 163 in the final of the 2017-18 domestic four-day trophy to help Band-e-Amir to win the title.

Narrowly missed out on a maiden ODI centry when he made an unbeaten 97 against Pakistan in September 2018 and scored his maiden Test fifty in the recent victory over Ireland.

He has remained the backbone of the side that qualified for four ICC World T20s and ICC CWC 2015, where he captained the side.

Contributed 291 runs in eight matches in the qualifying tournament, in which he was the leading run-scorer for Afghanistan.

Playing in his second ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Ireland at Dublin in 2012.

In 2016, he slammed a 35-ball 60 in his comeback against UAE which helped Afghanistan qualify for the main draw of the Asia Cup in Bangladesh.

ODI debut against Zimbabwe at Bulawayo in 2015.

He was subsequently honoured as the 2017 ICC Associate Cricketer of the Year and in early 2018 he became Afghanistan's first IPL millionaire.

He finished the 2018 Ghazi Amanullah Khan Regional One Day Tournament as the leading run-scorer, with 398 runs in six matches, including 192 not out.

At the 2016 ICC World T20 in India, no Australian bowler took more wickets during the tournament than Zampa's five at 13.80 at an economy rate of 6.27.

In the subsequent IPL he took 6-19 for Rising Pune Supergiants against Sunrisers Hyderabad.

Took 4-53 when Bangladesh defeated England at Adelaide in ICC CWC 2015.

His maiden ODI century came in his tenth game – a 110-ball unbeaten 127 against Pakistan at Mirpur in April the same year.

This is the fifth occasion when England have hosted the ICC CWC. On home soil they have won 15 and lost six matches in the tournament.

Despite being runners-up in three of the first five ICC CWCs, England had to wait until ICC World T20 2010 in the Caribbean to win their first global tournament.

In 2015 England were unable to defeat any Test nations in the competition, beating only Scotland and Afghanistan.

Had a successful summer in 2017, taking a hat-trick against South Africa in the Oval Test and adding a 53-ball ODI century against West Indies.

A late move in the 2018 IPL season to promote Buttler to an opener produced immediate results, as he smashed five consecutive fifties to propel the Rajasthan Royals into the playoffs.

His younger brother Sam impressed for England's Test side in 2018 and their late father, Kevin, played for Zimbabwe in the 1983 and 1987 ICC CWC tournaments.

Took 18 wickets for Hampshire on the road to 2019 domestic 50-over tournament final.

Part of the England team who reached the final of ICC World T20 2016, he memorably struck a final-ball six to earn a tie in the Trent Bridge ODI with Sri Lanka later that summer.

Took over the Test captaincy from Alastair Cook in 2017 and struck successive, unbeaten ODI centuries the following year against India.

Playing in his first ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Ireland at Dublin in 2015

Awaiting his ODI debut.

He was the leading run-scorer in the 2017-18 Ranji Trophy with 1,160 runs in eight matches for Karnataka, with five centuries, including 304 not out against Maharashtra.

Those performances culminated in a Test debut against Australia in the 2018 Boxing Day Test at Melbourne, in which he scored 76 and followed up with 77 the following week at Sydney.

ODI debut against Zimbabwe at Bulawayo in 2018.

He smashed a 58-ball century on his Twenty20 debut for Faisalabad Wolves, and Islamabad United owed much to him in their Pakistan Super League win in 2018.

Two consecutive fifties at much better than a run a ball in the series against England in May 2019 forced him into the World Cup squad.

## BABAR AZAM

Playing in his first ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Zimbabwe at Lahore in 2015.

He was drafted into the squad for the 2010 ICC U19 World Cup as a 15-year-old and also played in the 2012 tournament.

In 2016 he made three consecutive ODI hundreds against West Indies in the UAE, and a 90 in his third Test.

He reached 1,000 ODI runs in only 21 innings, equalling the world record held by four other batsmen.

Playing in his first ICC CWC.

ODI debut against South Africa at Birmingham in 2017.

It was in the Quaid-e-Azam trophy in 2016-17 that his form began to be noticed, scoring 663 runs in the competition at an average of 51, including 170 in the second innings of the final.

His prolific form earned him a contract in the PSL and a call-up to Pakistan's T20I side for the West Indies tour, and he made his debut in the second match in Port of Spain.

In the 2017 ICC Champions Trophy he missed the opening-match defeat to India, but he turned Pakistan's batting fortunes around with scores of 31, 50, 57 and then 114 in the final.

## HARIS SOHAIL

Playing in his second ICC CWC.

ODI debut against the West Indies at Gros Islet in 2013.

Scored six half-centuries in seven ODI innings stretching from 2015 to his recall in 2018.

Struck 110 in the Dubai Test against Australia in late 2018 and followed up with 147 at the same venue against New Zealand a couple of months later.

## HASSAN ALI

Playing in his first ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Ireland at Dublin in 2016.

He managed to gain some attention in the 2015 National T20 Cup in where he picked up eight wickets in four matches under the captaincy of Shoaib Malik.

His 17 wickets at 17.05 in the National One-Day Cup in 2016 was a key part of him being promoted to the Pakistan side.

He was the leading wicket-taker in ICC Champions Trophy 2017 in England with 13 at an average of 14.69 as Pakistan won the tournament.

Captaining the side in the next edition, he became a solid performer in first-class cricket before achieving international honours in 2015.

In September 2016 he became the first spinner from Pakistan to take five wickets in a T20I with 5-14 against West Indies.

## IMAM UL HAQ

Playing in his first ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Sri Lanka at Abu Dhabi in 2017.

Burst onto the scene during the U19 Asia Cup in 2012, where he averaged 45 from five games including three successive fifties.

The nephew of former captain Inzamam ul Haq, he scored a century on his ODI debut and became the first player in ODI history to score four hundreds in his first nine matches.

## MOHAMMAD AMIR

Playing in his first ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Sri Lanka at Dambulla in 2009.

In his first full year in Pakistan's domestic cricket in 2009, he picked up 55 wickets for National Bank and then helped Pakistan win ICC WT20 2009 in England.

At 18, he was the youngest bowler to take 50 Test wickets as he etched his name on both The Oval and Lord's honours boards in 2010.

His opening spell in the final of ICC CT 2017 at The Oval dismissed India's top three batsmen and helped Pakistan lift the trophy.

## MOHAMMAD HASNAIN

Playing in the 2018-19 Pakistan Super League, he bowled the fastest delivery of the tournament, which was measured at 151 kph.

He was named Player of the Match in the PSL final for his figures of 3-30 as Quetta Gladiators defeated Peshawar Zalmi.

## MOHAMMAD HAFEEZ

**STYLE:** RHB/OB

Playing in his third ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Zimbabwe at Sharjah in 2003.

In 2011 he won ten Player-of-the-Match awards in international cricket.

He also became only the third cricketer – after Sanath Jayasuriya and Jacques Kallis – to score 1,000 runs and take 30 wickets in ODIs in a calendar year.

He was ranked the No.1 ODI bowler for a period in 2012 and has spent a total of 622 days as the top-ranked ODI all-rounder.

## SHADAB KHAN

Playing in his first ICC CWC.

ODI debut against West Indies at Providence in 2017.

First emerged in 2016, taking 4-9 for Pakistan U19 v Afghanistan then picking up nine wickets for Islamabad United in the 2016-17 PSL.

He made an immediate impact in his first two T20Is, taking seven wickets for 21 runs and winning the Player-of-the-Match award on both occasions.

He was also a part of the Pakistan team that won the ICC Champions Trophy 2017 in England and was given a Test cap against West Indies the following month.

Brother of former international Riaz Afridi, he took 8-39 on Quaid-e-Azam Trophy debut, the best debut figures in the competition's history.

He became the first cricketer born after the turn of the millennium to represent Pakistan and subsequently made his Test debut before turning 19.

## SHOAIB MALIK

Playing in his second ICC CWC.

ODI debut against West Indies at Sharjah in 1999.

Starting his career primarily an off-break bowler, he has had success with the bat at almost every position in the order.

Consistent performances between 2005 and 2007 saw him appointed captain after Pakistan's elimination from ICC CWC 2007.

He is one of only two players still playing (the other being Chris Gayle) whose ODI careers started in the 1990s.

## WAHAB RIAZ

Playing in his third ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Zimbabwe at Sheikhpura in 2008.

He took 5 for 46 against India in the ICC CWC semi-final in Mohali in 2011 - among his wickets were Virender Sehwag, Virat Kohli, Yuvraj Singh and MS Dhoni - but it couldn't prevent defeat.

Bowled a memorable spell against Shane Watson at Adelaide in the 2015 World Cup quarter-final, having already dismissed David Warner and Michael Clarke.

He was recalled to the World Cup squad having not played an ODI match since facing India at Edgbaston in the 2017 ICC Champions Trophy.



# SOUTH AFRICA

Playing in their eighth ICC Men's Cricket World Cup.

**Best achievement:** Semi-finals (1992, 1999, 2007, 2015).

South Africa made their first appearance in the 1992 competition, losing in the semi-final to England when the controversial rain rule left them needing 21 runs from one ball.

They suffered more heartbreak in 1999 in the memorable tied semi-final against Australia.

In the 2015 tournament, AB de Villiers struck the fastest 150 in ODI history, off only 64 balls against West Indies at Sydney.

He hit 185 in the Cape Town ODI and was named Player of the Series as South Africa beat Sri Lanka 5-0 in early 2017.

## HASHIM AMLA

Playing in his third ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Bangladesh at Chittagong in 2008.

He is the fastest to 3,000, 4,000, 5,000 and 6,000 ODI runs, breaking records held by Zaheer Abbas and Viv Richards.

First ranked the No.1 ODI batsman in the world in November 2010, he has spent 332 matches occupying top spot.

In 2012 he scored the first Test triple-century for South Africa with an unbeaten innings of 311 against England at The Oval.

## QUINTON DE KOCK

**STYLE:** LHB/WK

Playing in his second ICC CWC.

ODI debut against New Zealand at Paarl in 2013.

In 2013 he became the fourth player to score centuries in three successive ODI matches, with innings of 135, 106 and 101 against India.

In February 2017 he became the fastest batsman to reach 12 ODI centuries, taking only 74 matches.

His maiden Test century came in his eighth match with a score of 129 not out against England at Centurion in January 2016.

His ICC CWC 2015 started with an unbeaten century against Zimbabwe and his occasional off-breaks picked up a hat-trick in the quarter-final against Sri Lanka.

Playing in his first ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Pakistan at Centurion in 2019.

Those performances earned him a spot in the squad for ICC World T20 2014 in Bangladesh, where he played three matches and he also has IPL experience with Kings XI Punjab.

Took 32 wickets in the four-day franchise series in 2018-19 leading to an ODI debut in early 2019 and then to his call-up to the CWC squad as an injury replacement for Dale Steyn.

## AIDEN MARKRAM

Playing in his first ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Bangladesh at East London in 2017.

Captained the national side against India in early 2018 in Faf du Plessis's absence – only Graeme Smith has captained the side at a younger age.

Two more unbeaten ODI centuries followed in the 2016-17 season – both at Durban – against Australia and Sri Lanka.

In October 2017 he smashed a T20I century from only 35 balls against Bangladesh – setting a new world record, which was matched by India's Rohit Sharma two months later.

## CHRIS MORRIS

He was bought by Chennai Super Kings for \$650,000 in the 2013 IPL auction and by Delhi Daredevils for \$1 million in 2016, when he finished as their leading wicket-taker.

A replacement for Anrich Nortje, his last ODI was in March 2018, but he has continued to perform well in T20 leagues around the world.

After going wicketless in his first ODI in February 2018, he took at least one wicket in his next 17.

Took 3-32 against Australia at Perth last November in his first ODI for 13 months.

## KAGISO RABADA

He represented Paarl Rocks in the first edition of the Mzansi Super League T20 tournament in which he was the joint-leading wicket-taker for the team with ten wickets.

## IMRAN TAHIR

Playing in his third ICC CWC.

A regular wicket-taker in ODI cricket, he took 5-45 against West Indies at Sydney in ICC CWC 2015 which propelled him to top spot in the ODI bowling rankings.

He has been even more effective in T20I cricket, with 11 wickets in ICC World T20 2014 and six wickets in the 2016 tournament.

He was top-scorer in South Africa's first-class domestic competition in 2017-18, as well as being Lions' vice-captain.

The team also reached subsequent finals in 2007 and 2011, losing to Australia and India respectively.

Sri Lanka co-hosted the tournament in 1996 and 2011.

In Sri Lanka's first ever day-night Test in Dubai in 2017, he made a career-best 196 to help breach Pakistan's long-standing unbeaten series record in UAE.

## DHANANJAYA DE SILVA

Playing in his first ICC CWC.

ODI debut against Ireland at Dublin in 2016.

Later that year he was the star of Tamil Union's first victorious first-class campaign in 55 years, hitting 868 runs at 54.20 and claiming 32 wickets at 14.23.

He also had a successful start to his Test career in 2016 striking 129 against Australia at Colombo in his third match and 127 against Zimbabwe just two matches later.

His maiden Test five-wicket haul came in his 32nd Test when he took 5-63 against South Africa at Port Elizabeth in late 2016.

Was part of Sri Lanka's march to the 2012 ICC World T20 final, performances which led to deals in the IPL and Big Bash League.

After three years out of the international arena, he returned in February 2018 and then took 16 wickets for Tshwane Spartans in the Mzansi Super League.

He hit his maiden ODI century against Bangladesh at Mirpur in 2014 and then hit a 17-ball half-century, Sri Lanka's joint-fastest, against Pakistan in Pallekele in July 2015.

His memorable unbeaten innings of 153 in February sealed an incredible one-wicket Test victory at Durban which helped Sri Lanka to its first Test series victory in South Africa.

His international debut came against India in a T20I in 2016 and he dismissed Rohit Sharma, Shikhar Dhawan and Ajinkya Rahane to claim the Player of the Match award.

However, despite that start, he struggled to break into the national side, with Nuwan Pradeep, Suranga Lakmal and Dushmantha Chameera preferred.

He was Galle's leading wicket-taker in the 2018 Sri Lanka Twenty20 League with 13 wickets in six matches which propelled him back into the international reckoning.

In his fifth ODI in 2015, he made his first international fifty in 25 deliveries during a 114-run stand with Angelo Mathews against Pakistan.

A successful initiation in those formats paved the route to his Test debut against West Indies later the same year.

He was the leading wicket-taker in the 2018-19 Afghanistan Premier League, with 17 wickets in eight matches.

In March, he smashed 84 not out against South Africa at Centurion – the highest score by a No.8 batsman in all T20 cricket.

West Indies won its first nine matches in ICC CWC history, emerging victorious in the first two editions.

The Caribbean hosted the 2007 tournament, but the home side was unable to qualify for the semi-finals, finishing sixth in the Super Eight table.

Qualified for ICC CWC 2019 as runners-up in the 2018 ICC Men's Cricket World Cup Qualifier in Zimbabwe, losing to Afghanistan in the final.

He followed up with two hundreds in the next season, including a career-best 169 not out against Trinidad and Tobago.

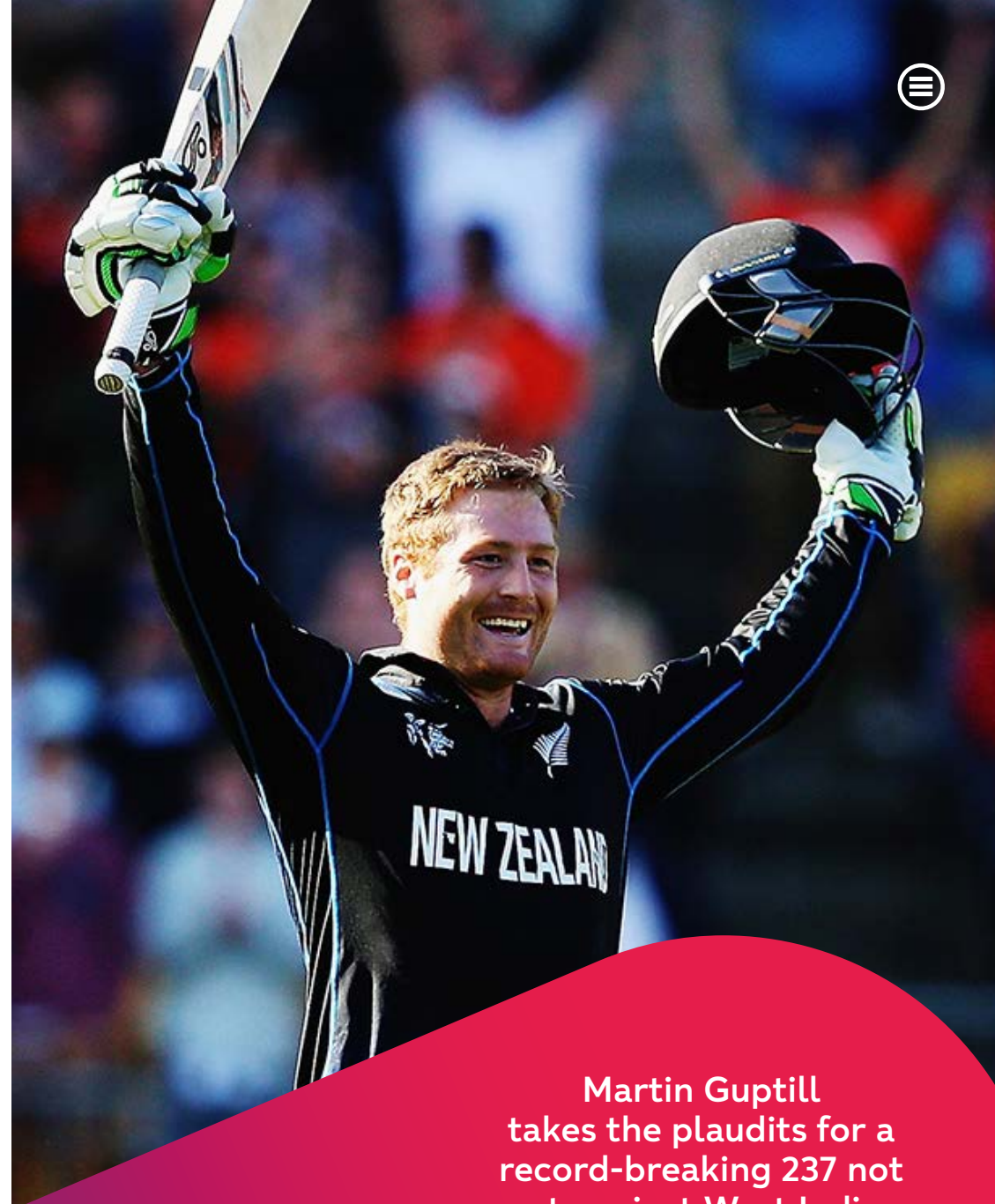
