ABOUT THE TOURNAMENT

The *ICC Men's T20 World Cup* has grown enormously in stature since the inaugural edition in South Africa 14 years ago, which was won by a young India side led by Mahendra Singh Dhoni.

The two close matches between India and Pakistan, including the final, and Yuvraj Singh's six sixes in an over from Stuart Broad, essentially set the platform for its popularity even as the format grew apace the world over.

Pakistan won the second edition of the tournament in England in 2009 as they defeated Sri Lanka in the final of the event at Lord's. Associate Members enjoyed great success, with the Netherlands defeating England and Ireland beating Bangladesh.

One of the great strengths of the tournament has been the stage it gives growing cricketing nations to test themselves against the best. The format is now acknowledged as the one driving popularity of the game worldwide.

In 2009, the first ever women's tournament was also held alongside the men's event, with double-header matches played at the semi-finals and final stages. The women's tournaments moved to stand-alone events from 2018.

In 2010, England captured their first ever *ICC* global title, defeating Australia by seven wickets in the final; while in 2012, the West Indies beat hosts Sri Lanka by 36 runs to win the men's title, their first *ICC* trophy since the *ICC* Champions Trophy in 2004.

Sri Lanka won the 2014 edition in Bangladesh to join a select band of those to have also won the 50-over *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cup, before the West Indies became the first to win the tournament twice in 2016. Carlos Brathwaite's sensational four consecutive sixes off Ben Stokes capped what was a stupendous effort by the Darren Sammy-led side.

The pace and tactics of the game have grown manifold in the five years since, adding to the anticipation for the 2021 event.



THE TROPHY

Designed and manufactured by Links of London, the ICC Men's T20 World Cup trophy is based on the field dynamics of balls being hit to the boundary and fielders returning them in an interactive process. It has a sense of open space and vigour, and captures the constant movement of T20 cricket. Made of silver and rhodium, it represents a youthful and edgy design.

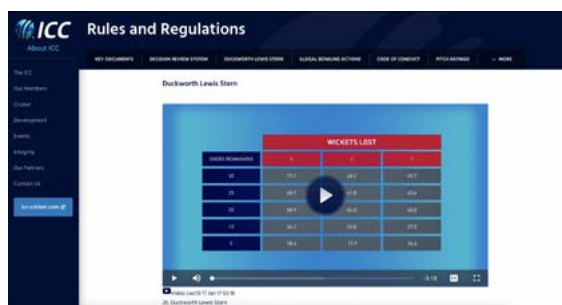

PLAYING CONDITIONS

THE DUCKWORTH-LEWIS-STERN METHOD

The Duckworth-Lewis-Stern (D-L-S) method sets revised targets in rain-interrupted limited-overs matches, taking into consideration the run-scoring resources at the disposal of the two sides. Information on the D-L-S method can be found on [the ICC website](http://icc-cricket.com).



ANTI-DOPING

The ICC has a zero-tolerance approach to doping and is a signatory to the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) since July 2006. The ICC Anti-Doping Code, compliant with the World Anti-Doping Code, ensures cricket plays its part in the global fight against drugs in sport. ANTI-DISCRIMINATION

The ICC has a strict Anti-Discrimination Code that confirms a level of commitment from the ICC and its Members to promote and encourage participation at all levels, regardless of race, religion, culture, colour, descent, national or ethnic origin, and to ensure that there is no discrimination in the sport.

The diverse history and culture of the game draws people together. There is a strong tradition of fans from rival teams enjoying matches alongside each other, while cricket players too are known to mingle with each other and often help each other out with the technicalities of the game. ANTI-CORRUPTION

Cricket is considered by many to be a world leader in the fight against corruption in sport and strives to do its best to work towards the vision to 'Keep Cricket Clean'. All players and officials who take part in the top level of international cricket pass through the Anti-Corruption Unit (ACU)'s education programme.

The ICC's Anti-Corruption Managers coordinate the ACU's prevention measures and are present at tournaments and international series to ensure that strict anti-corruption protocols are enforced at all venues, particularly around the dressing room areas. TOURNAMENT VENUES

The 45 matches at the 2021 ICC Men's T20 World Cup will be split between four venues, including one of the most popular of the last four decades of international cricket.

Sharjah is one of three venues in the tournament that is currently playing host to the Indian Premier League, with the Sheikh Zayed Cricket Stadium and Dubai International Cricket Stadium also set to host matches in the World Cup.

Completing the quartet is a relatively new venue, the Oman Cricket Academy Ground, which will be used in the first round in Group B where Oman will be looking to reach the second phase of the tournament for the first time.

MEDIA ACCREDITATION



The ICC has accredited media from all over the world for the ICC Men's T20 World Cup 2021. The required biosecurity measures have resulted in reduced capacity for the media, but we have tried to accommodate as many people as we could.

As in previous tournaments, the ICC will follow its priority order in allotting match-day seats. This is done in tandem by the ICC media and accreditation teams, keeping in mind the teams playing. We follow the general principles outlined in the media advisory and FAQs document on accreditation, which we shared at the start of the accreditation process.

Media accreditation passes can be collected from the venues. Reporters will be allotted seats and a limited number of photographers will be allotted photo positions keeping in mind the biosecurity protocols.

Updates through the tournament will be sent out either individually or to the tournament media email list that we maintain. Please remember to read our advisories: there may be changes in protocols, biosecurity measures or the way the media interactions are conducted, whether owing to changes in government guidelines or on advice from our own colleagues.

What if my accreditation is lost?

If your tournament accreditation is lost or stolen, please report it to the accreditation team and make a formal complaint at the nearest police station. Upon completion of the lost/stolen declaration form, the tournament accreditation will be replaced providing the individual has appropriate ID. If the original tournament accreditation is found, it should be surrendered and the police should be informed. Please note that no additional temporary or match day passes will be provided.



CODE OF CONDUCT FOR JOURNALISTS



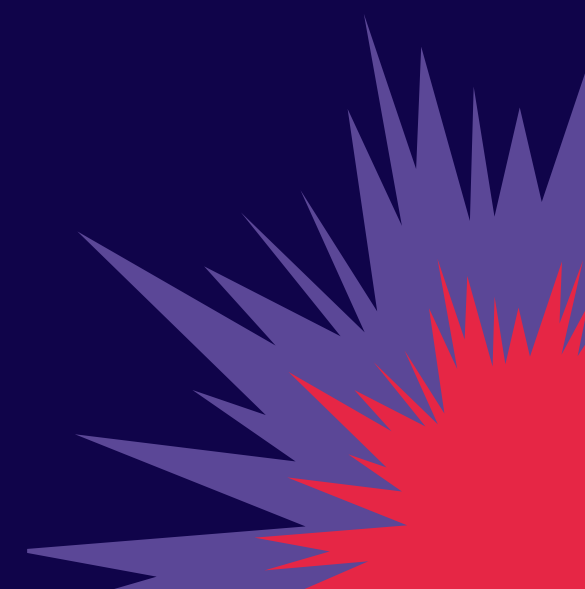
Please note that all accredited Non Rights Holders (NRH) media must adhere to the code of conduct for the tournament as well as the tournament media terms and conditions agreed to while signing the accreditation form.

Accreditation cards of journalists will be cancelled if they are found to behave in an inappropriate manner at any of the venues. The ICC has a zero-tolerance policy towards racism and sexual harassment, and action will be taken immediately in any such case, which could include suspension of the accreditation card and blacklisting from all ICC events.

Journalists could also face suspension from future matches or have their accreditation revoked if they are found to be in violation of other terms and conditions including those of video and audio recordings at venues.

NO SHOWS

Journalists who have changed their plans – those withdrawing from the tournament, those who become unavailable to attend particular matches, and/or those who need to change their selection of matches – must please send details in an e-mail to media-accreditation@icc-cricket.com. **Failure to do so could affect their chances of attending future ICC events. Journalists not informing us of their inability to attend any match of this tournament may not be given a match ticket for subsequent games.**



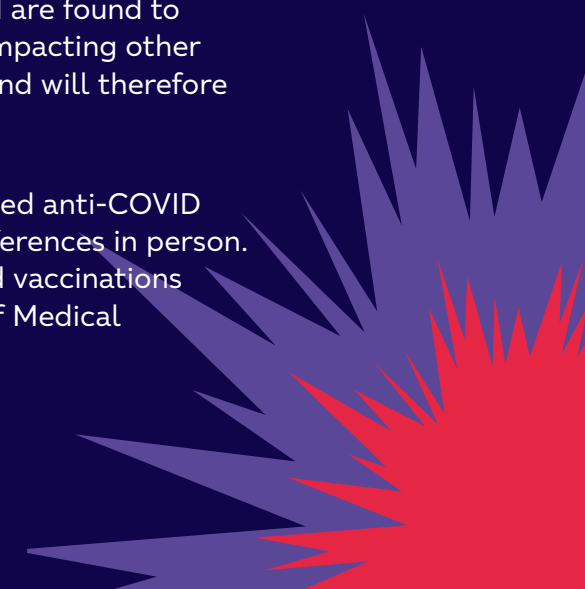
MEDIA PROTOCOLS



Members of the media will need to adhere to the biosafety protocols during the tournament. Non-compliance will result in the immediate removal of accreditation, and could have an impact on attendance at future ICC events.

Biosecurity measures: important points to note:

1. All accredited media and photographers will undergo a rapid antigen test on each match day, which will be done on entry to the venue. These tests will be provided by the ICC.
2. The media are responsible for any additional testing requirements to enter countries and venues. At present, testing is required for entry into both the UAE and Oman, and for entry to Abu Dhabi Stadium (within 48 hours of required access to the venue). Testing at a reduced rate is available through the ICC Tournament Medical Provider, details of which will be provided to all media, or at numerous convenient locations throughout the UAE. Additionally, there are also test-at-home services that can attend your hotel.
3. Should you become unwell due to COVID-19, the ICC has agreed preferential rates for treatment with our Tournament Medical Provider, VPS.
4. All accredited media are strongly advised to have a comprehensive travel insurance policy should hospitalisation be required.
5. Should a member of the media contract COVID-19, contact tracing will be carried out, and close contacts may also be required to quarantine pending further tests.
6. Accredited media will need to undertake any quarantine imposed by government guidelines at that time, and are personally responsible for understanding their obligations.
7. Any accredited media showing symptoms will either be denied entry or will be asked to leave the venue. The success of the event relies on us all taking personal responsibility and not attending the venue if you feel unwell. If you attend with symptoms and are found to have contracted COVID-19, you will be impacting other colleagues who may be close contacts and will therefore also be required to go into isolation.
8. Only those with proof of a WHO-approved anti-COVID jab will be allowed to attend media conferences in person. Any individuals with non-WHO approved vaccinations will be referred to the Tournament Chief Medical Officer for approval.



PROTOCOLS: MATCH DAY



Reporters

- The number of seats in the media boxes have been reduced due to the mandated social distancing. As a result, reporters/writers will be allotted seats as per ICC policy, and will not be able to move seats before or during the match due to biosecurity protocols.
- A limited number of people may be able to attend post-match media conference. Passes will be allocated by the ICC Media Manager in line with our usual priority order. If you are not going to attend in person, please advise the ICC Media Manager so they can reallocate your pass.
- All other media (accredited and approved remote journalists who have been unable to travel) will be able to attend the media conferences remotely, sending in any questions via the platform.
- Media lunch/dinner and refreshments will be available and consumed in the dining areas, adhering to biosecurity norms. Drinks may be consumed in the media box.

Photographers

- Photographers will be expected to keep a safe distance from Zone 1 and the biosecure managed environment.
- Photographers must remain at the position(s) allotted to them and in the demarcated zones.
- Attending the pre-match photographers' meeting is mandatory. Photographers will need to adhere to all the guidelines
- Lunch/dinner and refreshments will be served to the photographers in their work areas, so they do not need access to other media areas during matches for that reason.

NRH camerapersons

- NRH camerapersons will not be allowed inside the venues on match days.

- The media box will be open to journalists, who can work from there as per the timings notified by the ICC Media Managers.
- If accredited media want to attend a media conference in person, they must apply via email to robin.abrahams.ext@icc-cricket.com by 10am on the day. Approved attendees will be given passes to access the press conference. Others can join virtually.
- Refreshments will be available in the dining areas, adhering to biosecurity norms.
- Reporters may be allowed to watch training sessions from pre-designated areas wherever possible.

Photographers

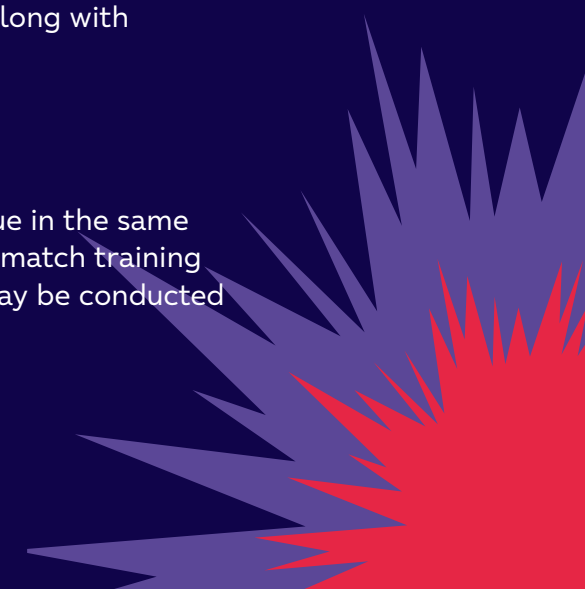
- Photographers will be able to shoot at training sessions from pre-designated areas wherever possible.
- They will be provided with refreshments in the media areas, adhering to biosecurity norms.

NRH camerapersons

- NRH camerapersons will be able to shoot from a distance at training sessions, along with still photographers, as per the terms and conditions signed at the time of applying for accreditation. These terms and conditions are available in the ICC Online Media Zone on the page [here](#).
- They will be able to capture imagery from some other parts of the venues, but may not go on to the field or close to the practice areas.
- Due to COVID-19 capacity restrictions, NRH camerapersons will not be allowed for the media conferences. Unedited videos will be provided by the ICC.
- They will be provided with refreshments along with other media.

Where matches are taking place at the venue in the same city where teams are undertaking their pre-match training sessions, match day -1 media conferences may be conducted online only owing to biosecurity protocols.

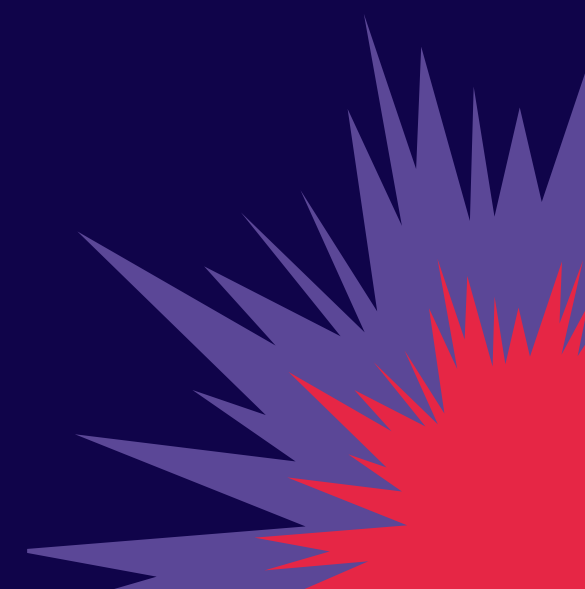

The *ICC* has arranged for video coverage of pre-match and post-match media conferences, to be conducted through online video conferencing, as well as transcripts of post-match media conferences, to be available on the OMZ shortly after they have been conducted.

The Resources section of the OMZ will have other important reference documents, including Playing Conditions and Stats Packs.

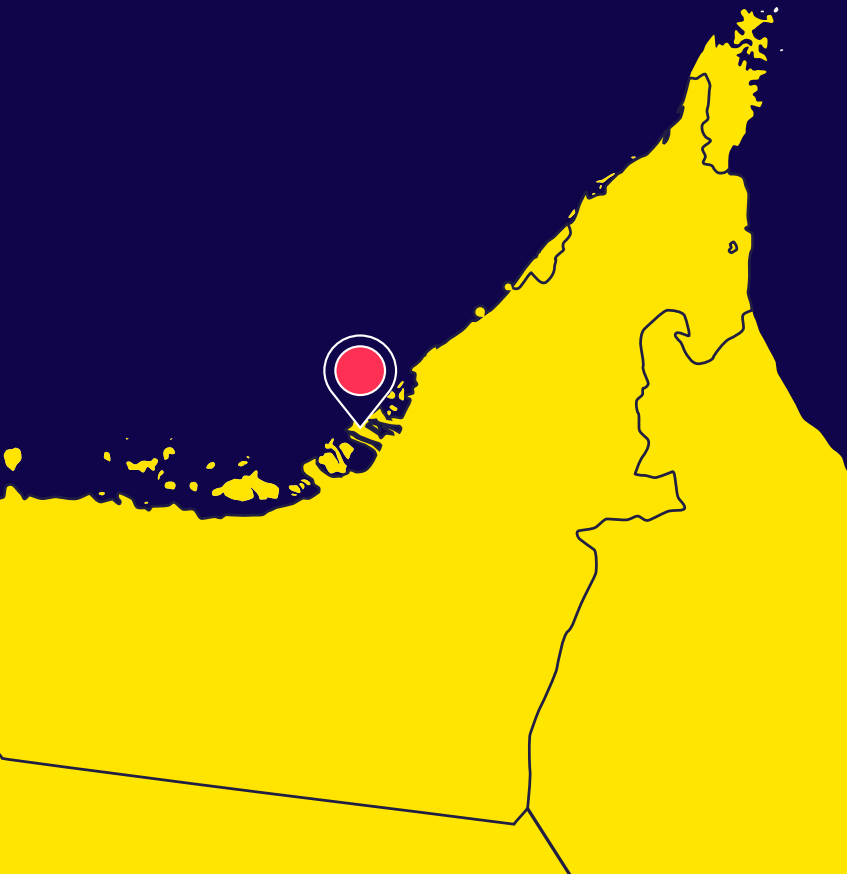
Prominent features of the OMZ include:

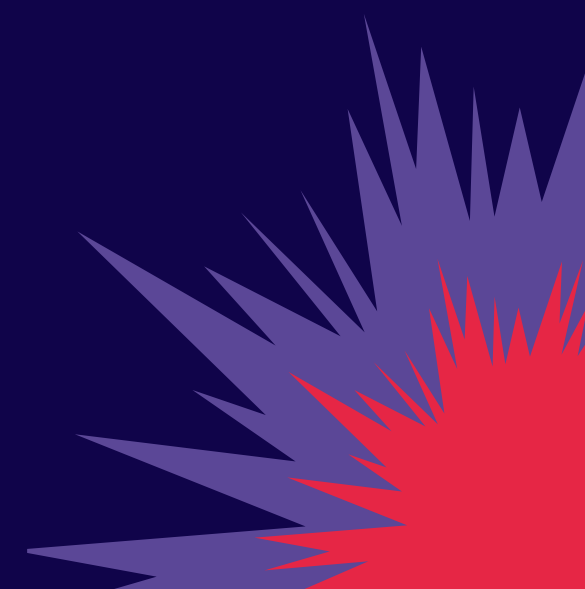


ICC MEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2021

When the ICC Men's T20 World Cup 2021 gets under way, it will have been 17 years since the Sheikh Zayed Cricket Stadium hosted its maiden first-class match: an intercontinental fixture between Scotland and Kenya. In 2021, the Abu Dhabi venue – which can hold up to 20,000 people – will host 15 matches in total, including the first semi-final.

Named in honour of Sheikh Zayed Bin Sultan al Nahyan, the first President of the UAE, the ground has played host to international cricket across all three formats. It was here that AB De Villiers recorded his highest Test score: an unbeaten 278 in the first Test played at the venue, a draw against Pakistan. The first ODI also featured Pakistan, which earned a six-wicket victory over India back in 2006 thanks to 71 from Younis Khan.

The first T20I played there was between Afghanistan and Scotland, with Afghanistan set to play at least three more matches here at the World Cup – including their penultimate group clash against India. That will be a day/night fixture, as will the first semi-final played at the Sheikh Zayed Cricket Stadium between the winners of Group 1 and the runners-up of Group 2.

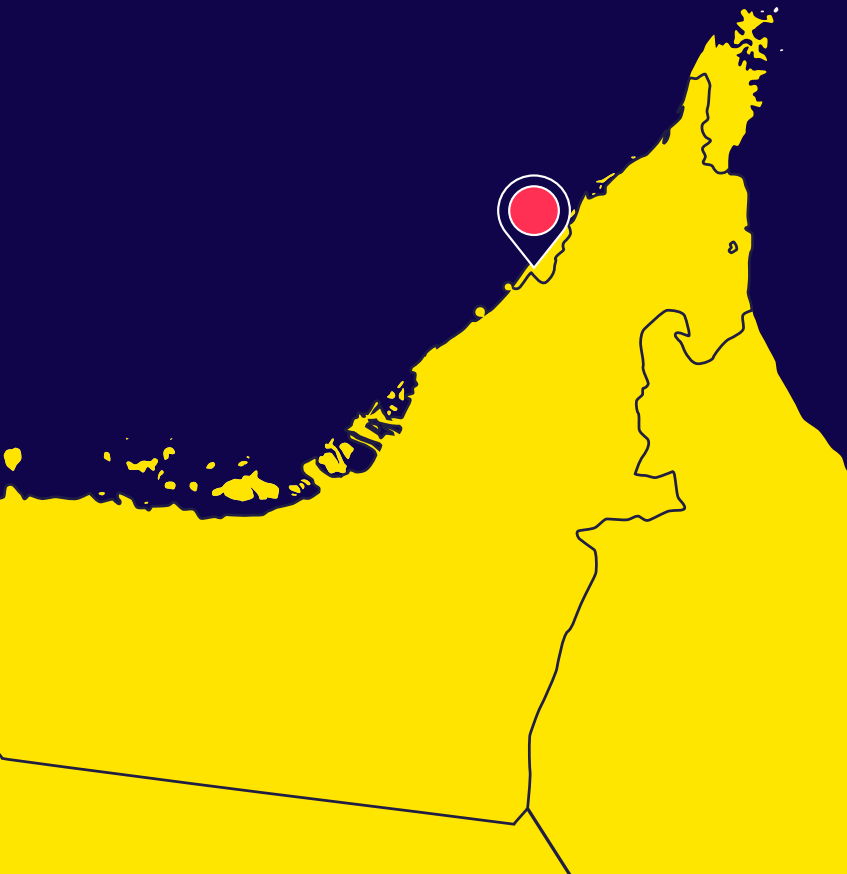

DUBAI INTERNATIONAL CRICKET STADIUM

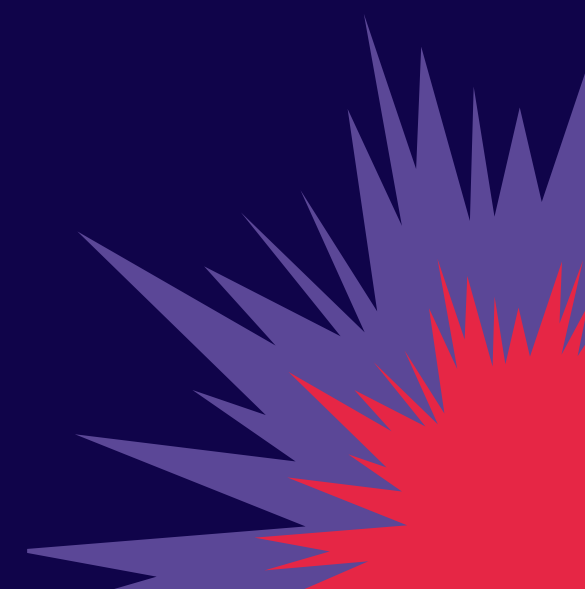


The Dubai International Cricket Stadium will be the venue for the second semi-final and the final of the ICC Men's T20 World Cup. Those are two of the 13 tournament matches to be played at the ground, which will play host to some of the fiercest rivalries in the sport.

The ground in Dubai will not be used during the first round but will then take centre stage in the Super 12 as England take on the West Indies in a rematch of the 2016 final. A day later, India and Pakistan will meet at the Dubai International Cricket Stadium, while England and Australia's Group 1 clash will also take place there.

With the semi-final between the Group 2 winners and the Group 1 runners-up at the ground, as well as the final, it is no understatement to say that the outcomes of matches at the ground will go a long way to deciding the tournament.

The ground made its entrance onto the international stage back in 2009, with Shahid Afridi starring for Pakistan – named Player of the Match in the maiden ODI and T20I played at the ground, both wins over Australia.

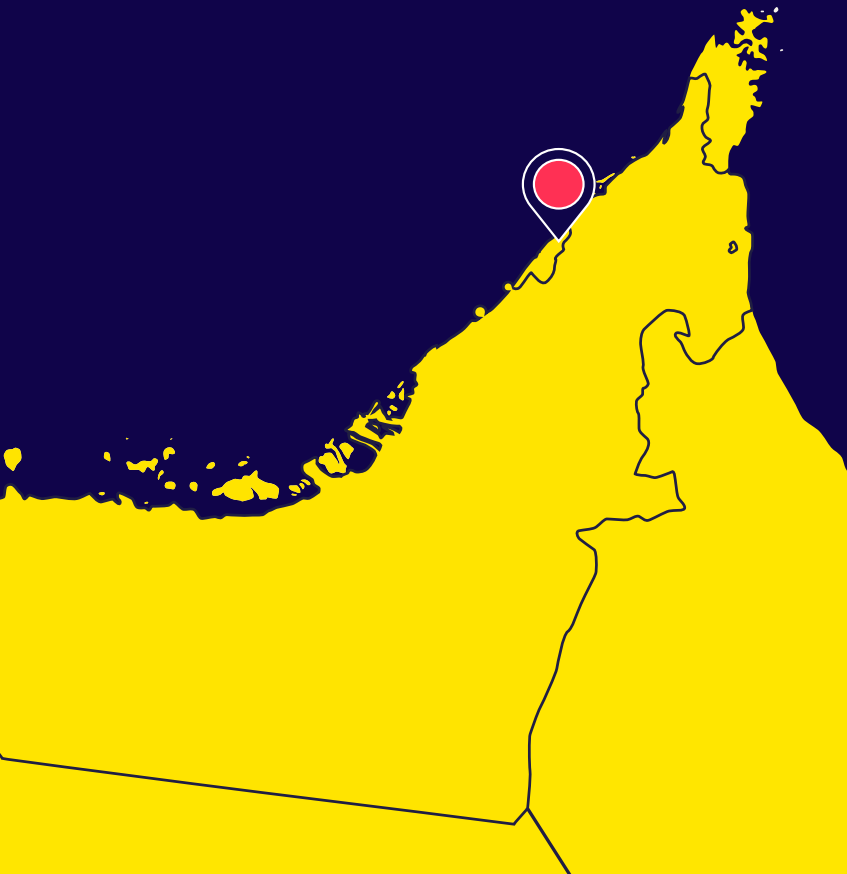

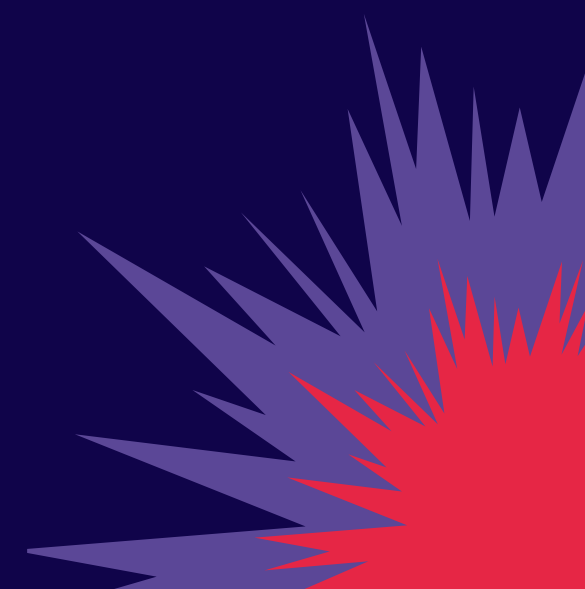
ICC MEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2021

Over nearly four decades, the Sharjah Cricket Stadium has played host to more than 200 ODIs and become a favourite on the international circuit. The ground entered the Guinness Book of World Records a decade ago for having hosted more ODIs than any other.

Opened all the way back in 1982, Sharjah became a popular venue for South Asian sides, attracting vast crowds made up of the many expats in the area. It would regularly play host to triangular tournaments, providing some classic encounters down the years.

Among them there was the 1998 Coca-Cola Cup Final between India and Australia, when Sachin Tendulkar produced one of his finest one-day performances with a 131-ball 134 as India chased down 273 to win the title. It has also hosted matches during the second half of the Indian Premier League this season.

In the ICC Men's T20 World Cup, Sharjah will be the venue for 11 matches including the first-round encounter between Namibia and Ireland. Among the other matches being played in Sharjah, the clash between England and South Africa in Group 1 of the Super 12, and Pakistan and New Zealand in Group 2, look to be standout matches.

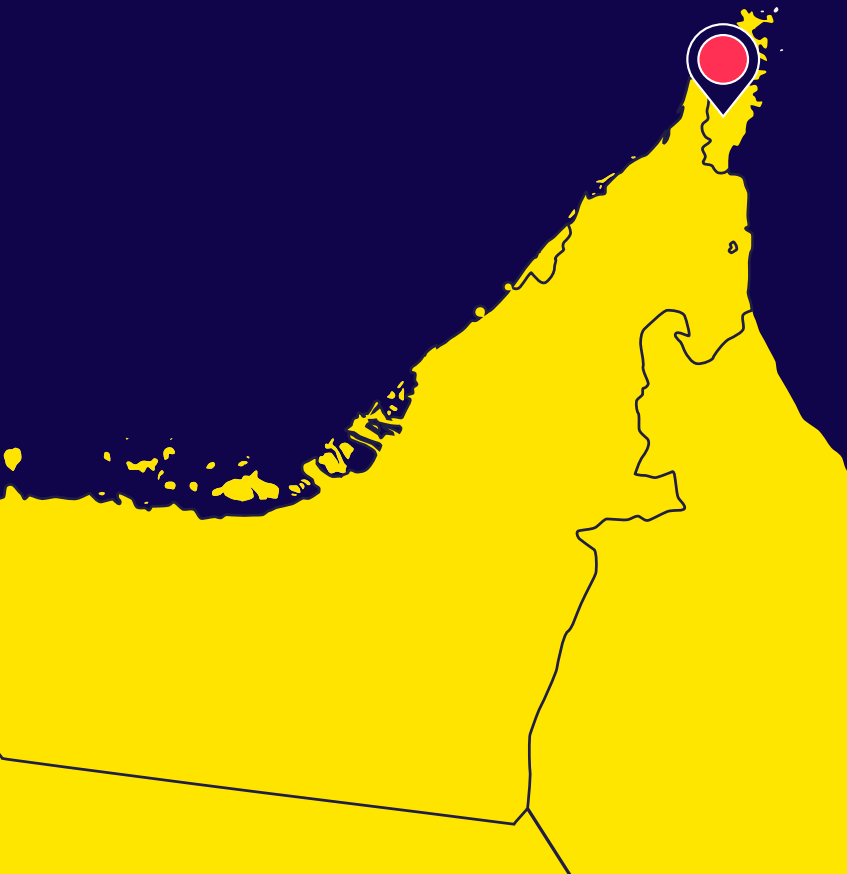

OMAN CRICKET ACADEMY GROUND



The opening match of the ICC Men's T20 World Cup will be played at the Oman Cricket Academy Ground, with the home side looking to get off to a flying start against PNG. All six Group B matches in the first round will be played at the ground, with a day/night clash between Bangladesh and Scotland on the opening day.

Plans to build the venue were announced in 2008, with the inauguration taking place four years later at the end of 2012.

Situated about 15km south-east of the centre of Muscat, the Oman Cricket Academy Ground hosted its first T20I in 2019 when Bahrain took on Saudi Arabia in the opening game of the ACC Western Region T20. Ibrahim Hassan of the Maldives was the first man to take a five-wicket haul at the ground in a T20I in that tournament, while it was here that Kevin O'Brien hit 124 for Ireland against Hong Kong, one of the ten highest T20I scores of all time.

The wicket is based on clay that was imported from Pakistan, while the grass was grown in Barka, is a farming town about an hour outside Muscat.
