ABOUT THE TOURNAMENT

The ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2024 will be the ninth edition of the tournament, and the first to be held in the United Arab Emirates.

The ICC Women's T20 World Cup has grown in stature over the years. The first five tournaments were held alongside men's events, but it has been a standalone tournament since 2018's tournament in the West Indies.

The 2020 event in Australia proved to be a watershed, with an astounding 86,174 spectators watching the Australia vs India final at the MCG on International Women's Day.

Australia, the three-time defending champions, have won the title a total of six times, while England and the West Indies have won once each.

TOURNAMENT FORMAT


The tournament is being played on a league-cum-knockout basis in Dubai and Sharjah.

The 10 participating teams have been divided into two groups:

GROUP A	GROUP B

The top two teams in each group will progress to the semi-finals, which will be played on 17 October (Dubai) and 18 October (Sharjah). The final will be played at the Dubai International Stadium on 20 October.

ICC WOMEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2024



THE TROPHY

The ICC Women's T20 World Cup trophy stands 50cm high and represents the dynamic and explosive nature of T20 cricket, the most exciting and fast-paced format of the sport.

Crafted in silver, the trophy has been carefully designed to ensure its uniqueness and is instantly recognised no matter from which angle it is viewed. The trophy was instituted at the first edition of the tournament in 2009 as the perpetual prize for winning the ICC Women's T20 World Cup. An exact replica is produced to be handed to the winner of each subsequent ICC Women's T20 World Cup.

PRIZE MONEY

The ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2024 will be the first ICC event where women will receive the same prize money as their male counterparts, a significant milestone in the sport's history.

The decision was taken at the ICC Annual Conference in July 2023, when the ICC Board took steps to reach its prize money equity target seven years ahead of schedule. As a result, cricket is now the only major team sport to have equal prize money for its men's and women's World Cup events.

The winners of the tournament will receive USD 2.34 million, a massive 134 per cent increase on the USD 1 million awarded to Australia when they clinched the title in 2023. The runners-up will receive USD 1.17 million, which is also an increase of 134 per cent compared to the USD 500,000 that South Africa received for reaching the final on home soil in 2023.

The two losing semi-finalists will each earn USD 675,000, while the six teams who fail to reach the

semi-finals will share USD 1.35 million, up from USD 180,000 in 2023. All 10 qualified teams will also each receive USD 112,500, with each win during the group stage worth USD 31,154 to the victors.

These sums take the overall prize pot to nearly USD 8 million, a 225 per cent increase from USD 2.45 million at the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2023. The increase in prize money is in line with the prize pot for the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2022 also increasing to USD 3.5 million.

This move is in line with the ICC's strategy to prioritise the women's game and accelerate its growth by 2032. Women's and men's teams will now receive equal prize money for the equivalent finishing position at comparable events, as well as the same amount for winning a match. The prize money at the ICC Men's T20 World Cup 2024 is only higher as it featured 10 more teams and 32 more matches than at this ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2024.

PLAYING REGULATIONS

PLAYING CONDITIONS

The full playing conditions for the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2024 are available in the Resources section of the <u>Online Media Zone</u>, and on the ICC's official website at <u>icc-cricket.com</u>.

ICC CODE OF CONDUCT

The ICC Code of Conduct is part of the ICC's continuing efforts to maintain the public image, popularity and integrity of cricket by providing: (a) an effective means to deter any participant from conducting themselves improperly on and off the field of play, or in a manner that is contrary to the 'spirit of cricket'; and (b) a robust disciplinary procedure pursuant to which all matters of improper conduct can be dealt with fairly, with certainty and in an expeditious manner.

THE DUCKWORTH-LEWIS-STERN METHOD

The Duckworth-Lewis-Stern (D-L-S) method sets revised targets in rain-interrupted limited-overs matches, taking into consideration the runscoring resources at the disposal of the two sides. Information on the D-L-S method can be found on the ICC website.

ILLEGAL BOWLING

An Illegal Bowling Action is where a player is throwing rather than bowling the ball. This is defined by the ICC as being where the player's elbow extends by an amount of more than 15 degrees between their arm reaching the horizontal and the ball being released. Match Officials in international cricket use the naked eye and their cricketing experience to decide whether they believe a player may be using an Illegal Bowling Action and, if so, they will submit a report.

ANTI-CORRUPTION

Cricket is considered by many to be a world leader in the fight against corruption in sport and strives to do its best to work towards the vision to 'Keep Cricket Clean'. All players and officials who take part in the top level of international cricket pass through the Anti-Corruption Unit (ACU)'s education programme.

The ICC's Anti-Corruption Managers coordinate the ACU's prevention measures and are present at tournaments and international series to ensure that strict anti-corruption protocols are enforced at all venues, particularly around the dressing room areas. ANTI-DOPING

The ICC has a zero-tolerance approach to doping and is a signatory to the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) since July 2006. The ICC Anti-Doping Code, compliant with the World Anti-Doping Code, ensures cricket plays its part in the global fight against drugs in sport. Information on the ICC's Anti-Doping Code can be found on the ICC website.

ANTI-DISCRIMINATION

The ICC has a strict Anti-Discrimination Code that confirms a level of commitment from the ICC and its Members to promote and encourage participation at all levels, regardless of race, religion, culture, colour, descent, national or ethnic origin and to ensure that there is no discrimination in the sport.

The diverse history and culture of the game draws people together. There is a strong tradition of fans from rival teams enjoying matches alongside each other, while cricket players too are known to mingle with each other and often help each other out with the technicalities of the game. HOW THE TEAMS QUALIFIED

THE HOSTS Bangladesh

Bangladesh qualified as hosts before the competition was moved to the UAE. This is set to be the sixth time they have participated in the ICC Women's T20 World Cup. They have yet to make it past the group stage.

ICC WOMEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2024

Australia lifted the trophy for the sixth time with a 19-run victory over the hosts at Newlands Cricket Ground. The Australians won all six of their matches in the tournament and have not lost a match in the ICC Women's T20 World Cup since being beaten by India in their opening group match in 2020.

South Africa qualified as runners-up. The 2023 tournament was their first ever final, and they will be aiming to go one better when the competition comes to Sharjah and Dubai.

England qualified after reaching the semi-finals in South Africa, where they were beaten by the hosts. Since lifting the trophy 15 years ago, the English have been beaten in the final on three occasions.

India were the other beaten semi-finalists, edged out by just five runs against Australia in Cape Town.

West Indies, champions in 2016, qualified through their third-place finish in Group 2 after defeating Ireland and Pakistan.

New Zealand finished third in Group 1, securing their spot at the 2024 tournament. The beaten finalists in 2009 and 2010 qualified thanks to comprehensive victories over Bangladesh and Sri Lanka.



ICC WOMEN'S T20I TEAM RANKINGS Pakistan

Pakistan qualified through being the next highest ranked side in the ICC Women's T20I Team Rankings at the end of February 2023. They have yet to reach the semi-finals.

ICC WOMEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2024 QUALIFER Sri Lanka, Scotland

Two teams booked their place through the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2024 Qualifier in May.

Sri Lanka claimed a stunning win over hosts South Africa in the opening game of the 2023 tournament, but were pipped by New Zealand to third place in Group 1 on net run rate. Not to be denied, they won all four of their Group A matches in the Qualifier, then sealed their spot with a 15-run victory over the UAE at the Sheikh Zayed Cricket Stadium in Abu Dhabi.

Scotland had to coming through the ICC Women's T20 World Cup Europe Qualifier 2023 to reach the global Qualifier, winning five of their six matches in the process. At the global Qualifier, they finished second behind Sri Lanka in Group A, then beat Group B winners Ireland by 54 runs at the Sheikh Zayed Cricket Stadium to guarantee their spot at the tournament – where they will be the only team making their first appearance at an ICC Women's T20 World Cup.



15 YEARS OF PROGRESS

The ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2024 is set to mark the next step in the evolution of the game.

Women's cricket has enjoyed substantial growth in the last 15 years, and it's no coincidence that this rise has come alongside the emergence of the ICC Women's T20 World Cup.

While Australia may currently be the women's game's pre-eminent force, there is a feeling of the sport becoming more open, with nations outside of the traditional powers starting to emerge.

IN THE BEGINNING

The ICC Women's T20 World Cup itself has grown, a fact made clear by the fact that just eight teams contested the first competition in England in 2009. The tournament was held simultaneously with the men's event, and the form of the hosts captivated a nation.

The event culminated in over 12,000 attending the final at Lord's, where Charlotte Edwards' side defeated New Zealand by six wickets to become the inaugural champions. The triumph pushed England women into the spotlight, with the same being said of Australia when they claimed the title in 2010 – and how they have run with it since.





AUSTRALIA TAKE THE LEAD

Australia's margin of victory over New Zealand at the Kensington Oval in 2010 might have been slim – just three runs – but it kicked off an era of dominance that continues to this day.

Australian players such as Ellyse Perry and Meg Lanning became prized commodities off the back of their exploits at the ICC Women's T20 World Cup, with teams all over the world bidding for their services. Lanning was the top run-scorer at the 2014 tournament in Bangladesh, the first in which 10 teams took part, as her country claimed their third consecutive title.



WEST INDIES INTERRUPT THE AUSSIE

However, there was a new name on the trophy in 2016, when the competition took place for the first time in India. West Indies crowned their emergence as a leading nation by dethroning the Australians at Eden Gardens. It was the first women's final to take place on the same day as the men's – and it set the tone, with the Windies' men memorably defeating England to make the men and women from the Caribbean double world champions.

West Indies then hosted the next edition in 2018. Australia reclaimed the trophy that year and they haven't yet relinquished it. Indeed, when the Australians hosted in 2020, the competition truly was taken to new heights – capped by the extraordinary crowd of 86,174, a record for a women's cricket match, that witnessed Australia's victory over first-time finalists India at the MCG.

LOOKING AHEAD

The ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2020 turned out to be the largest global sporting event to take place for some time thanks to the COVID-19 pandemic, which took hold soon after, and it sticks in the memory for all the right reasons.

The tournament's increased profile in 2020 brought much-increased prize money for the winners of USD 1 million USD, five times more than what was awarded in 2018. Tournament prize money has continued to skyrocket, with the winners of the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2024 set to take home USD 2.34 million.

Nine countries will be attempting to dethrone Australia, one of the toughest tasks in the sport, when the action gets under way in the UAE on 3 October. With household names such as Nat Sciver-Brunt (England), Smriti Mandhana (India) and Marizanne Kapp (South Africa) set to lead the challenge for their respective nations, we're set for the most explosive competition yet.

The ICC has unveiled 'Whatever It Takes', the official event song for the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2024.



Recorded at the iconic Abbey Road Recording Studios in London, the unique score evokes the sound of cricket – leather on willow, the roar of the crowd and every emotion of the game – and will resonate and connect with fans around the world.

Launched and used for the very first time at the recently concluded ICC Men's T20 World Cup 2024 in the West Indies and the USA, the Anthem is now available to fans on all major streaming platforms.

"We are pleased with how well the Anthem was received at the recent ICC Men's T20 World Cup," said Chris Tetley, ICC Head of Events. "It played well in stadia on match days and its various cuts were implemented brilliantly on broadcast. By the end of the tournament, it felt like a long-standing part of the event.

"We look forward to cementing its place during the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2024. Releasing the song as a single gives cricket fans everywhere an opportunity to enjoy it wherever they are."

Lorne Balfe, the composer, said: "Cricket is a sport that portrays the widest possible ranges of emotions



MEDIA ACCREDITATION

The The ICC has accredited media from all over the world for the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2024. The tournament will be operating under a high-trust model, and therefore all accredited media and participants are requested to practice safe behaviour for the duration of the event.


As in previous tournaments, the ICC will follow its priority order in allotting matchday seats. This is done in tandem by the ICC Media and Accreditation teams, keeping in mind the teams playing. We follow the general principles outlined in the media advisory and FAQs document on accreditation, which we shared at the start of the accreditation process.

Media accreditation passes may be collected from the venues. Reporters will be allotted seats and a limited number of photographers will be allotted photo positions, keeping in mind the biosafety protocols. Updates through the tournament will be sent out either individually or to the tournament media email list that we maintain. Please remember to read our advisories: there may be changes in protocols, biosafety measures or the way the media interactions are conducted, whether owing to changes in government guidelines or on advice from our own colleagues.

WHAT IF MY ACCREDITATION IS LOST?

If your tournament accreditation pass is lost or stolen, please report it to the accreditation team and make a formal complaint at the nearest police station. Upon completion of the lost/ stolen declaration form, the tournament accreditation will be replaced providing the individual has appropriate ID. If the original tournament accreditation is found, it should be surrendered, and the police should be informed.

Please note that no additional temporary or match day passes will be provided.



CODE OF CONDUCT FOR MEDIA

Please note that all accredited Non-Rights Holders (NRH) media must adhere to the code of conduct for the tournament, as well as the tournament media terms and conditions agreed to while signing the accreditation form.

Media members' accreditation cards will be cancelled if they are found to behave in an inappropriate manner at any of the venues.

The ICC has a zero-tolerance policy towards racism and sexual harassment. Action will be taken immediately in any such case, which could include suspension of the accreditation card and blacklisting from all ICC events.

Members of the media could also face suspension from future matches or have their accreditation revoked if they are found to be in violation of other terms and conditions, including those of video and audio recordings at venues.

NO SHOWS

Members of the media who have changed their plans – those withdrawing from the tournament, those who become unavailable to attend particular matches, and/or those who need to change their selection of matches – must please send details in an email to **media-accreditation@icc-cricket.com**.

Failure to do so could affect their chances of attending future ICC events. Members of the media who do not inform us of their inability to attend any match during this tournament may not be given match tickets for subsequent games.



GUIDELINES FOR NON-RIGHTS HOLDER (NRH) MEDIA

All the points listed below are detailed in the Terms and Conditions and the FAQs document available on the accreditation portal and in the Resources section of the Online Media Zone.

MATCH DAYS

- Filming of any kind is strictly prohibited for non-rights holders in any area inside a match venue on a match day. This includes (but is not limited to) match action, fans and stadium concourse areas, press conferences, media box(es), and team training/practise sessions.
- Video cameras are not allowed inside venues on match days.
- Live-scoring, commentary and radio broadcasts are not allowed from inside venues on match days.
- Any photography and filming from the media box is prohibited.


NON-MATCH DAYS

- Access to training sessions will only be allowed on match day -1 (the day prior to a game) and match day -2.
- Training sessions on non-match days may be filmed, but only from zones determined by the ICC.
- Filming shall not exceed ten (10) minutes in total, of which a maximum of five (5) minutes may be live.
- NRH are permitted to film media conferences that take place on non-match days.
- Footage may not be published natively (directly) on any social media channel, including but not limited to YouTube, from any tournament match, warm-up match, practice venue or any other event during the tournament.
- Videos may be embedded in news articles on websites for editorial purposes only, and the links to these webpages may be shared on social media channels.

Footage obtained from the ICC's Online Media Zone of media conferences can be used in addition to the filming time allowed under the same terms of usage.

IN ADDITION, PLEASE NOTE:

- Accreditation must be worn at all times inside venues on match days and non-match days.
- Only ICC-appointed photographers are allowed to take pictures at media conferences.
- If you intend to film non-match day media conferences on a mobile phone, please occupy the back rows at the media conference so as not to disturb others.
- Phones and recorders are not allowed on the head table during media conferences.



ONLINE MEDIA ZONE

The ICC Online Media Zone (OMZ) will be the one-stop shop for media. It will include build-up content, features, expert columns, match previews, reviews, select photographs, videos, transcripts and translations. All of these will be available to registered members of the media for free editorial use, giving credit to the ICC.

The ICC has arranged for video coverage, transcripts and translations of pre-match and post-match media conferences to be available on the OMZ shortly after they have been conducted.

The Resources section of the OMZ will have other important reference documents, including the Playing Conditions, statistics packs and media accreditation terms and conditions.

Videos provided on the OMZ may be used on websites but not on social media. All editorial content must give credit to the ICC.






Sharjah is the third largest of the seven emirates that make up the UAE, and the only one to have land on both the Arabian Gulf Coast and the Gulf of Oman.

Played three matches in the 2018 competition, and was ever-present two years later, but failed to make a major impression with either bat or ball

Enjoyed her most prolific year to date in T20I cricket in 2022, and top-scored for her team in the Commonwealth Games with 61 runs

Enjoyed a successful ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2023, scoring an unbeaten 41 against Bangladesh at Cape Town, and scored her maiden half-century against the same opposition later the same year

Played all four of Sri Lanka's games in the 2020 tournament, bowling economically, and made useful contributions with bat and ball in T20I cricket throughout 2022

Ended the 2024 Asia Cup as her team's leading wicket-taker with nine wickets at just 12.33 apiece as Sri Lanka won the competition

INOSHI FERNANDO



DOB: 23 Mar 1987 BORN: Colombo STYLE: RHB/OB

Made her T20I debut against South Africa at Colombo in 2014

Playing in her second ICC Women's T20 World Cup

She played a solitary match in the 2018 competition, taking 1-17 in her four overs against Bangladesh at Gros Islet, but spent four years out of the international reckoning

Returning in 2023, she took 3-17 against New Zealand in her first match back, and bowled well in the Asian Games, taking five wickets in her three matches

Carried that form into the ICC Women's T20 World Cup Qualifier, in which she helped her team to the title with eight wickets





DOB: 9 Dec 2008 BORN: Mahamodara STYLE: RHB/SLC

Made her T20I debut against Uganda at Abu Dhabi in 2024

Playing in her first ICC Women's T20 World Cup

Have impressed Chamari Athapaththu, she was called-up for the T20 World Cup Qualifiers in May 2024 and took 2-23 on her first appearance

She continued to impress at a tender age, taking 3-9 against Malaysia in the subsequent Asia Cup, which Sri Lanka won

Made her T20I debut against Scotland at Kuala Lumpur in 2022

Playing in her second ICC Women's T20 World Cup

She smashed 417 off 128 balls for Rathnavali Balika Vidyalaya in the U19 Girls Inter Schools Cricket Tournament and made her international debut in the 2022 Commonwealth Games Qualifier

She captained Sri Lanka's side in the ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup 2023 and ended as her team's leading run-scorer with 134 runs, including an unbeaten innings of 60 against Bangladesh at Benoni

Played four matches in the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2023, and struck 189 runs in the qualifier for the 2024 tournament, highlighted by 73 not out against Uganda

KAWYA **Kavindi**



DOB: 30 Oct 2002 BORN: Mahamodara STYLE: RHB/RMF

Made her T20I debut against Bangladesh at Colombo in 2023

Playing in her first ICC Women's T20 World Cup

Having been named as a reserve player for both the 2022 Commonwealth Games Qualifier and for the subsequent tour of Pakistan, she finally made her international debut the following year

She started well in T20I cricket with four wickets in her three matches against Bangladesh to end as joint-leading wickettaker as Sri Lanka won the series 2-1

Went on to play one match in each of the ICC Women's T20 World Cup Qualifier and Asia Cup competitions in 2024 as Sri Lanka emerged victorious in both

Played four matches in the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2016, taking 3-24 against Ireland at Mohali and 2-24 against South Africa at Bengaluru, but went wicket-less two years later, and again in 2020

Started the 2023 tournament with figures of 2-28 against hosts South Africa, and was part of the Sri Lanka squads who won the 2024 Qualifier and Asia Cup tournaments

HARSHITHA MADHAVI

Made her T20I debut against Ireland at Mohali in March 2016

Playing in her fourth ICC Women's T20 World Cup

Averaged over 60 in T20Is in 2023, before scoring an unbeaten 54 in the decider to clinch Sri Lanka's first-ever T20I series win against South Africa

Struck 69 not out in the 2024 Asia Cup final against India, and a few days later struck a maiden ODI century against Ireland

Made her T20I debut against Scotland at Kuala Lumpur in 2022

Playing in her first ICC Women's T20 World Cup

She first made headlines in early 2017 for picking up 7-18 and 10-15 in Galle District's win over Hambantota District

In 2021 she picked up eight wickets in the Women's Division One Tournament, which put her in the minds of the national selectors

In only her third ODI she took 5-28 against the West Indies at Hambantota in 2024 and bowled well on the tour of Ireland later in the year

Made her T20I debut against Bangladesh at Svlhet in 2014

- Playing in her fourth ICC Women's T20 World Cup

In December 2015, she topped the batting charts in Sri Lanka's Zonal T20 tournament but struggled in international cricket, failing to pass 20 in her first 21 matches

She finally found her form in the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2020, striking 20 against New Zealand and an unbeaten 39 against Bangladesh

Made some useful contributions in the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2024 Qualifier in the UAE and was part of the triumphant Asia Cup squad

UDESHIKA **PRABODHANI**

Made her T20I debut against Pakistan at Taunton in June 2009

Playing in her eighth ICC Women's T20 World Cup

A veteran of seven previous ICC Women's T20 World Cup competitions, she is Sri Lanka's leading wicket-taker with 21 victims at 20.00 each, despite missing the 2023 event

Started the 2023 competition with 3-18 against South Africa at Cape Town, and took three wickets in her two matches in the 2024 Qualifier

Playing in her third ICC Women's T20 World Cup

A talented footballer, playing as a striker for Carlton and then Empire Women's team, she only came to cricket relative late in life, at the age of 18

She helped Barbados Women win the 2019 West Indies Cricket Board Twenty20 Blaze competition and played two matches in each of the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2020 and 2023

Bowled economically in her six matches in the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2022, and struck a career-best 49 in T20I cricket against New Zealand in September

SHEMAINE CAMPBELLE



DOB: 14 Oct 1992 BORN: Guyana STYLE: RHB/RMF/WK

Made her T20I debut against South Africa at Paarl in 2009

Playing in her eighth ICC Women's T20 World Cup

She became the first player to score an ODI century when batting at number seven or lower when she struck 105 against Sri Lanka at Dambulla in 2013

Struck 45 against England in the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2018 and made useful contributions in each of the following two competitions

Contributed 185 runs in her eight matches in the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2022, which included 66 against England and an unbeaten 53 against Bangladesh

SHAMILIA CONNELL



DOB: 14 Jul 1992 BORN: Barbados STYLE: RHB/RFM

Made her T20I debut against New Zealand at Arnos Vale in 2009

Playing in her fifth ICC Women's T20 World Cup

She started playing cricket in primary school, but soon gave that up for track and field which she stuck with during high school, until a Barbadian cricket coach spotted her

The biggest prankster in the team and the life of any party, she loves photography and media, and led the celebrations after the 2016 tournament win

Took seven wickets in her seven matches in the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2022 and followed up the following year with 3-24 against Ireland at Cape Town in the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2023

Made her T20I debut against the Netherlands at Utrecht in 2008

Playing in her fifth ICC Women's T20 World Cup

She started off playing in the area she grew up and took 4-22 on her ODI debut against Ireland

She was one of the bowlers who spun the team to victory in the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2016 and bagged her first fivewicket T20I haul against Sri Lanka the following year

She played three matches in the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2022, taking four wickets a cost of just 13 apiece, and took four more in her four matches in the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2023

CHINELLE HENRY

Playing in her second ICC Women's T20 World Cup

Enjoyed an outstanding the ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup 2023 in which she was her team's leading run-scorer with 124, and wicket-taker with six

In the tournament in South Africa, she scored 52 and took 4-20 against Ireland before adding 55 against Indonesia in her next match to earn a spot in the senior squad

QIANA **JOSEPH**

Made her T20I debut against South Africa at North Sound in 2021

Playing in her first ICC Women's T20 World Cup

Awarded her first central contract in 2021, she bowled well in the ODI series against South Africa in Antigua, taking 2-24 and 2-29 in successive matches

A regular in the Barbados team in the Women's CPL, she enjoyed her best season to date in 2024 with six wickets at 12.66 apiece, while conceding just 4.75 per over

MANDY **MANGRU**
