Greetings and a warm welcome to members of the media who are in the West Indies to cover the ICC Women's World Twenty20 2018

This is the second time that the event is being organised in the Caribbean and already it is breaking boundaries before it's even started. It is the very first standalone ICC Women's World T20 event. It is the first time all 23 matches from an ICC Women's World T20 have been broadcast and it is the first time the Decision Review System will be used at any ICC World T20 event. 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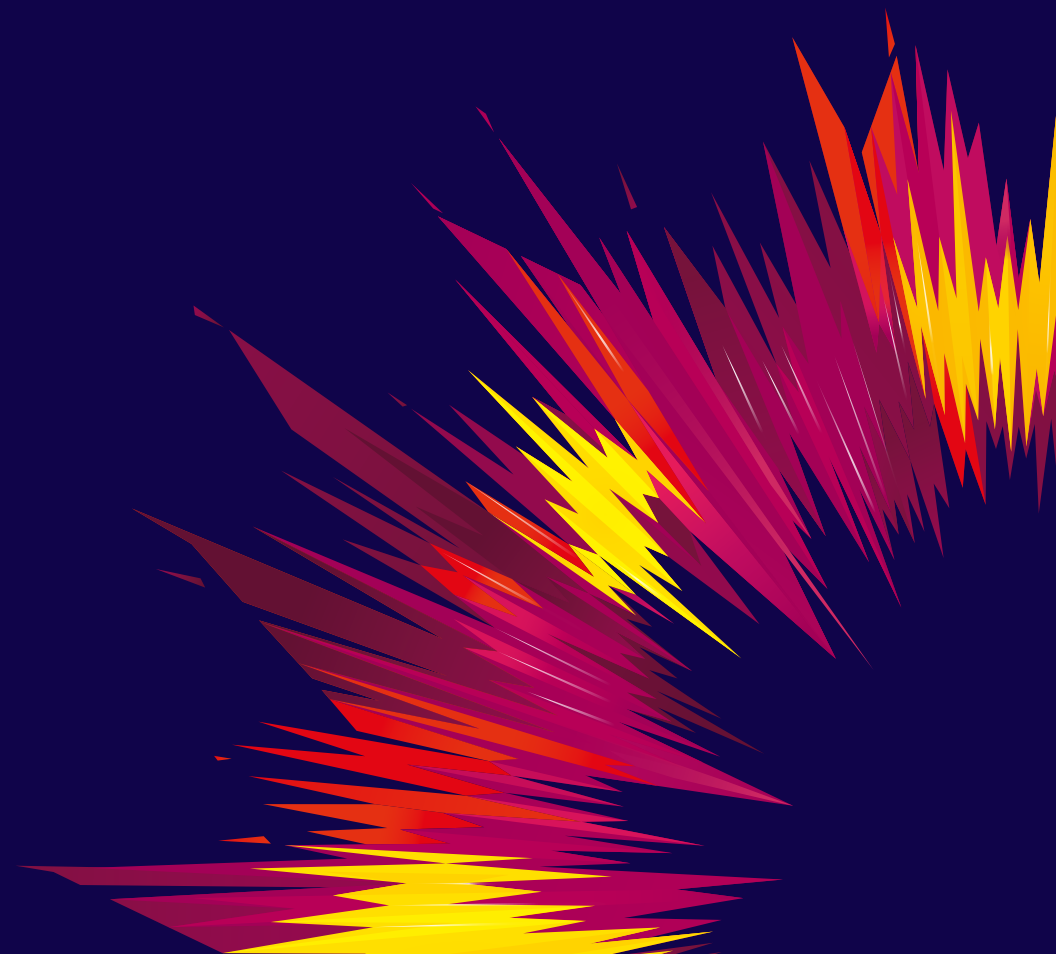

ABOUT THE TOURNAMENT

The upcoming ICC Women's World T20 will be the sixth edition of the tournament but the first held as a stand-alone event.

The tournament was first held in England along with the men's event, as were the following four editions. But with the rapid progress that the women's game has seen over the past few years, holding it separately was a natural progression.

The success of the ICC Women's World Cup 2017 in England and Wales last year and the cricket culture of the West Indies are expected to combine and produce a memorable 16-day event that runs from 9-24 November in Antigua, Guyana and St Lucia. The West Indies are hosting the event for the second time, having also organised it with great success in 2010.

For the first time, all matches of an ICC women's tournament will be broadcast live and the Decision Review System will be used in an ICC World T20 event for the first time.

Australia are the most successful team in the competition, having won three titles, while England and defending champions the West Indies have lifted the trophy once each.

The tournament is being played on a league-cup-knockout basis. The West Indies are placed in Group A along with England, South Africa, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh, while Australia, India, New Zealand, Pakistan and Ireland are in Group B. Two teams from either group will advance to the semi-finals, which will be staged in Antigua, also the venue for the final.

Joining the eight direct entrants in the tournament are Bangladesh and Ireland, who made it through the Qualifiers held in the Netherlands in July 2018.

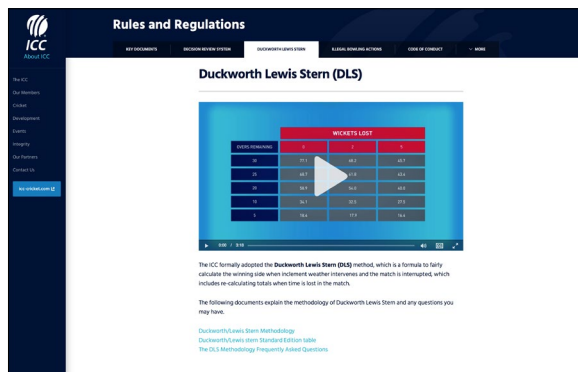

The Duckworth-Lewis-Stern method sets revised targets in rain-interrupted limited-overs matches, taking into consideration the run-scoring resources at the disposal of the two sides. The diverse history and culture of the game draws people together. There is a strong tradition of fans from rival teams enjoying matches alongside each other, while cricket players too are known to mingle with each other and often help each other out with the technicalities of the game.

ANTI-CORRUPTION

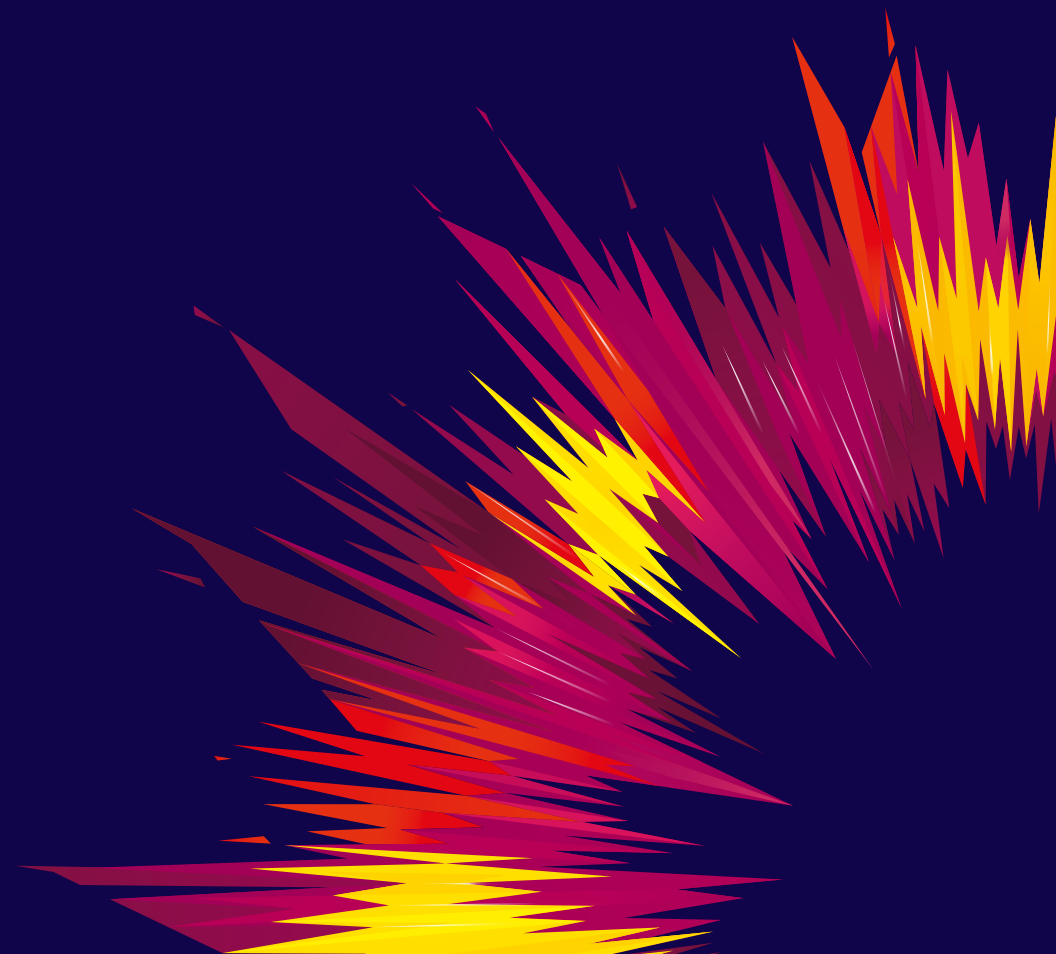
Cricket is considered by many to be a world leader in the fight against corruption in sport and strives to do its best to work towards the vision to 'Keep Cricket Clean'.

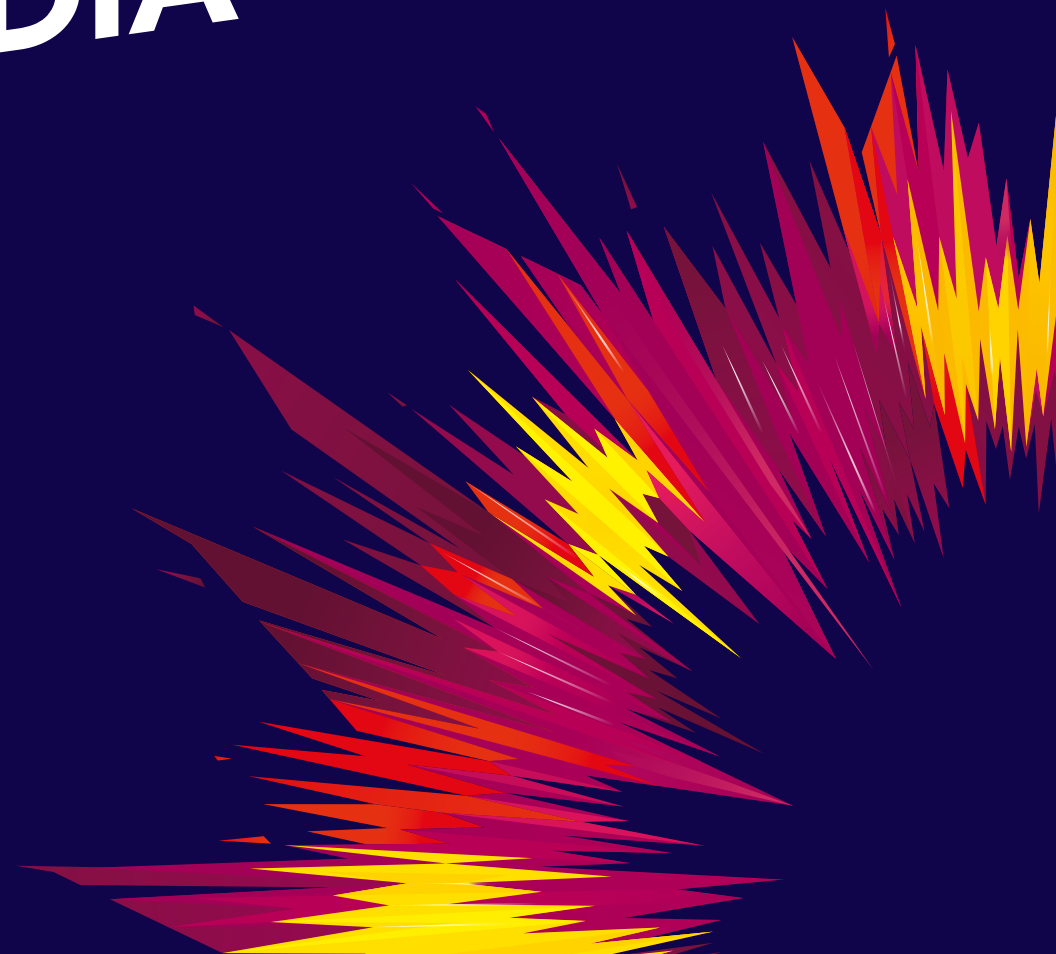

ESSENTIAL MEDIA INFORMATION

A full accreditation system is operational for all the venues of the ICC Women's World T20 2018.

Accreditation is the method of providing access to match venues for all working personnel in a controlled environment so that they can work efficiently and with least disturbance.

Media personnel wishing to access the stadia or any offsite practice sessions will have to wear their accreditation cards for security reasons. The accreditation cards will also be required to gain access to any media facilities provided during the tournament. All accreditation cards are personal and non-transferable. Wherever possible, arrangements will be made to provide parking facilities.

Written press and photographers must collect their accreditation from one of the accreditation centres shown above. All accreditation cards must be collected in person. You will be asked to produce the photo identity document you provided when you applied online in order to collect your accreditation.

Any lost or stolen accreditation represents a potential compromise to tournament security. It is therefore essential that every effort is made to look after your accreditation. A lost or stolen accreditation should be immediately reported to the nearest police station (a police report will be required), to any operational accreditation centre and via email to wwt2018@dnanetworks.com.

A full police investigation will be undertaken prior to any decision being made to re-issue the accreditation and is likely to cause a delay. If an accreditation has been left at a hotel or other local venue, the accredited media person will be required to return to the location to retrieve it. No additional, temporary or match day pass will be issued.

CODE OF CONDUCT

Please note that all journalists and photographers will have to adhere to the code of conduct for the tournament as well as the tournament media terms and conditions which were agreed to while signing the accreditation form. Accreditation cards of journalists will be cancelled should they be found to behave in an appropriate manner at any of the venues.

Photographers should adhere to the requests of security personnel, tournament officials and venue staff at all times. Final arrangements at each venue will be confirmed at the photographers' briefing. Should photographers wish to take venue shots prior to the game they should make this clear to the venue media manager before the briefing.

Every effort will be made to give photographers access to their requested vantage points. Equally, should photographers wish to gain access to a specific elevated position or locate a remote camera, they should make this request to the venue media manager.

Whenever possible, photographers are encouraged to meet with the venue media manager prior to match days at the stadium to discuss any special requests. Wherever possible, the requests will be facilitated, although access to restricted locations may not be available in all cases.

Photographers should note that any cameras or equipment left in remote positions or unattended at any time are the responsibility of the individual. The ICC, CWI, tournament staff and volunteers cannot take responsibility for any equipment misplaced, damaged, lost or stolen.

NO SHOWS

Journalists who have changed their plans and will not be attending the tournament, are strongly advised to alert us at wwt2018@dnanetworks.com. Failure to do so will jeopardise their accreditation for future ICC Events.

MEDIA ENHANCEMENTS

As part of its ongoing commitment to the increased promotion of women's cricket globally, the International Cricket Council has made a host of media enhancements for the event.

Match reports and round-ups - Reports of all matches and daily round-ups will be provided on each match day and previews and features on non-match days.

Photographs – A selection of photographs from each tournament match as well as from practice matches and other activities during the event will be provided for free download and editorial use.

Media conference videos – Unedited post-match media conference videos will be provided on each day which can be used giving credit to the ICC.

Daily stats pack – A daily statistics package will highlight the performances of the day as well as summing up team positions in the tournament.

Articles and features – The Online Media Zone will also have a number of other articles, features and interviews in the build-up of the tournament as well as during the event. These include columns by captains and past greats.

Audio News Releases – The ICC will release a 4-5 minute daily audio news release within an hour of the end of the last match, which will provide a summary of the day's matches and include sound clips of captains and performers of the day.

Transcripts – The ICC will provide verbatim transcripts from each of the 23 tournament matches within 30 minutes of the media interactions of the day, giving media the opportunity to quote players in their reports.

MEDIA PROTOCOLS

Training and practice matches - As per team schedule.
 Training - Before (if pm session) or after (if am session) depending on media demand. Practice matches - After every practice match.

Pre-match media conferences - As per team schedule.
 Two days before - senior player or coach; one day before - captain or senior manager.

Competitive matches - As per team schedule. Post-match media conference immediately after the end of the post-match presentation; Mixed Zone (semi-finals and final) - post-match brief media interactions in dedicated mixed zone areas.

Other Media Requests - Duration of tournament. Additional requests for interviews and player access outside ICC guidelines will be entirely at team management discretion.

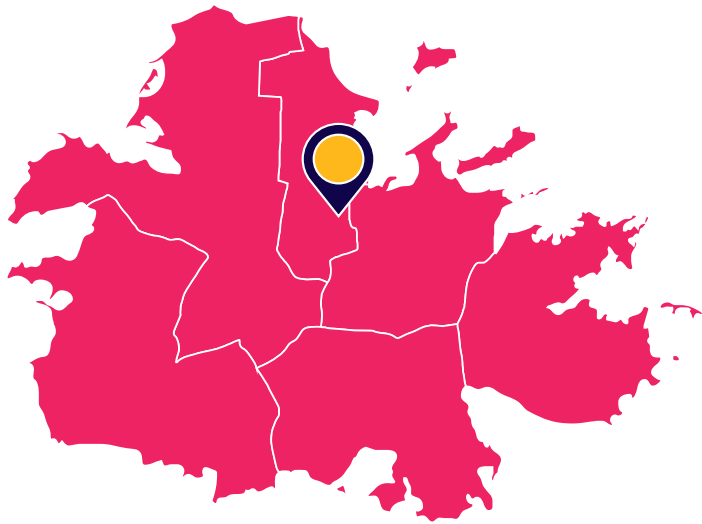

Sir Vivian Richards Stadium North Sound



Built to host the ICC Cricket World Cup 2007, this venue is named after cricket great and national hero Sir Vivian Richards.

The venue is located in the North Sound area. Accessing the stadium from the airport is a reasonable 15-minute drive depending on the traffic and from St. John's up to 25 minutes. This stadium can hold up to 10,000 spectators at a time.

Sir Vivian Richards is a world-famous cricketer whose international career stretched from 1974 to 1991. During the middle years of his career, the "Master Blaster" led a West Indian team that dominated world cricket.

The media centre is located on the North Stand Level 2. Entrance and parking for media will be permitted through gates 14 and 15.

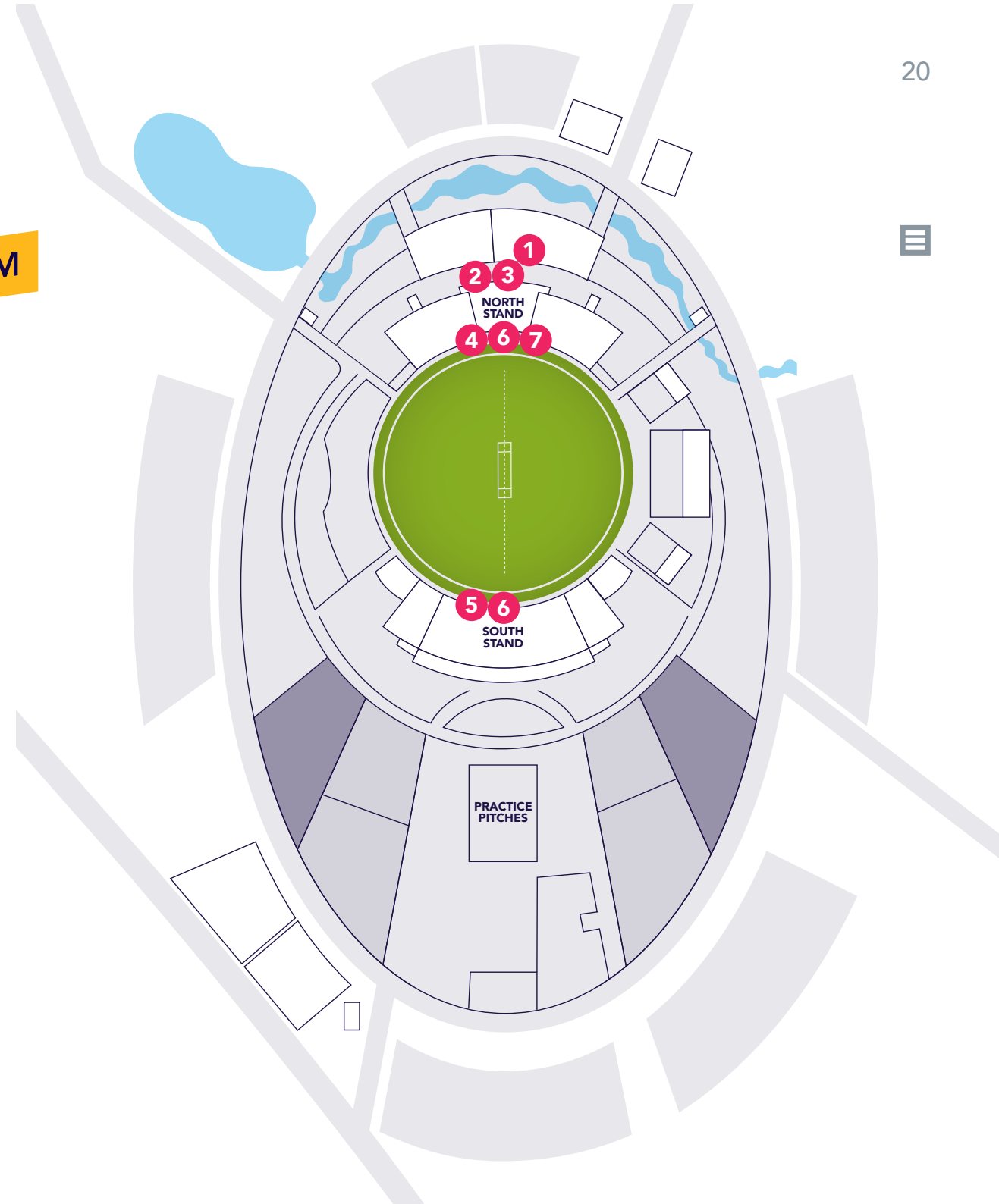

ANTIGUA

ABOUT THE CITY



St. John's is the capital and commercial centre of Antigua. The population is of about 22,000 and the city features a combination of contemporary and historical attractions.

At the Museum of Antigua and Barbuda one can find an interesting perspective of the nation's history from 10,000 years ago to the present.

The Cathedral is dominated by twin towers at the west end and provides a distinct baroque flavour. Two St. John's Anglican Churches already stood on the site of the present cathedral. The first was built of wood as early as 1681, The second was constructed with English brick about 1720 when the first fell in disrepair and became too small.

After over a century, the church was elevated to the status of a cathedral when the Diocese of Antigua was created in August 1842. In modern times the edifice has been cited as "the most imposing of all the Cathedrals of the West Indian Province". Restoration of the St. John's Cathedral is now ongoing. Among the other must-see attractions are the Antigua Recreation Grounds, Prince Klass Monument, the War Memorial (known as the Cenotaph) and the Westerby Memorial.

St. John's provides a number of distinctly diverse shopping opportunities. Heritage Quay overlooking St. John's Harbour is a duty-free area and offers everything from fine cigars and spirits to fragrances to artwork, leather goods, China, crystal and a variety of designer labels in clothing and jewellery. Redcliffe Quay, adjacent to Heritage Quay, features a number of local colourful boutique styled dining and shopping locations.

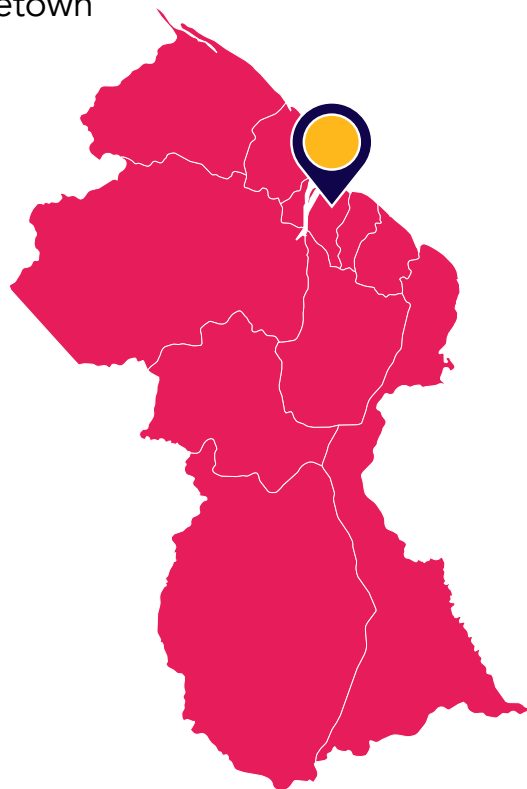

Guyana National Stadium
Georgetown



The Providence Stadium or Guyana National Stadium is a sports stadium in Guyana, replacing Bourda as the national stadium.

The stadium was built specifically to host Super Eight matches in the ICC Cricket World Cup 2007.

To get there, travel around Georgetown by Bus. Short stops within the limits of the city are approximately G\$80.00 and longer stops G\$120.00.

Travelling by taxi for short distances: approximately G\$400- \$GY500.00; longer drops G\$1,000.00 and upwards determined by the distance and destination. Prices will vary from location to location. Rented cars are also available. Parking arrangements on arrival.

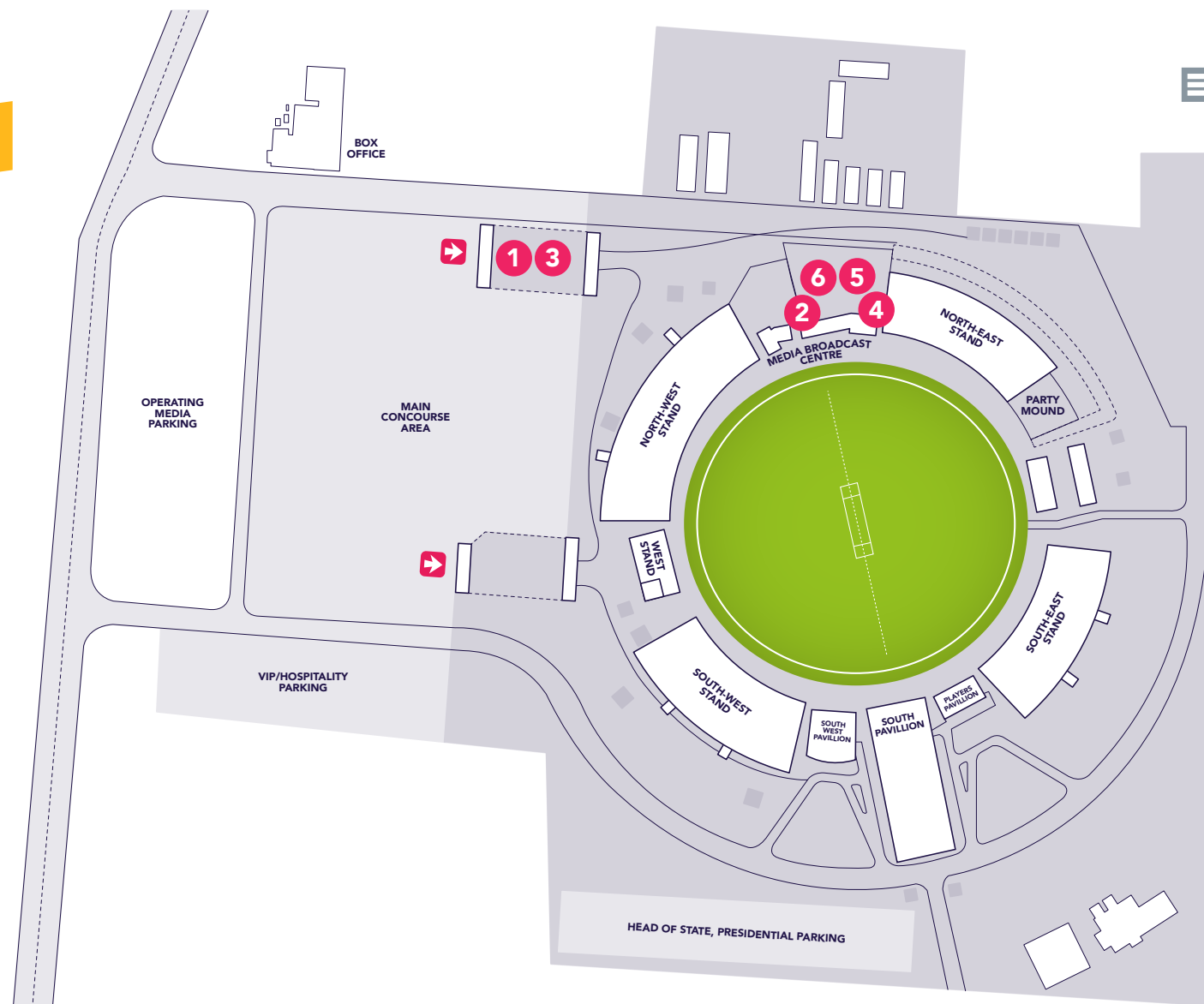

GUYANA NATIONAL STADIUM

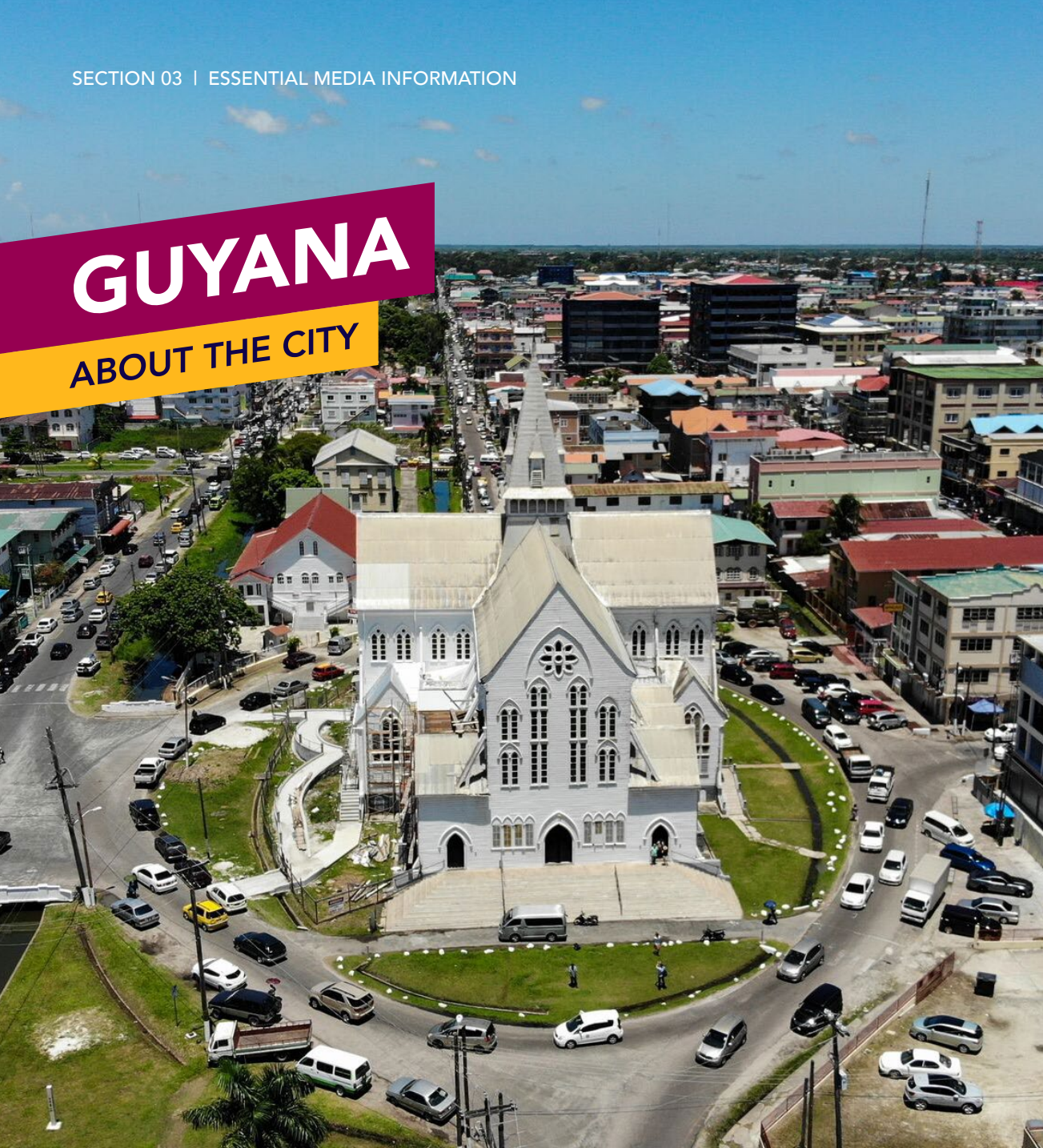
MAP KEY

ABOUT THE CITY



Georgetown is Guyana's largest urban centre and known as the "Garden City of the Caribbean".

It primarily serves as a retail and administrative centre but is also the financial services centre and has a population of a little over 200,000.

Georgetown is known for British colonial architecture, including tall, painted-timber St. George's Anglican Cathedral. A large clock marks the facade of Stabroek Market, a source of local produce

Georgetown is the seat of the central Government of Guyana and all executive departments are housed in this city as is the Parliament Building, the Legislative Building and the Court of Appeals, Guyana's highest judicial court.

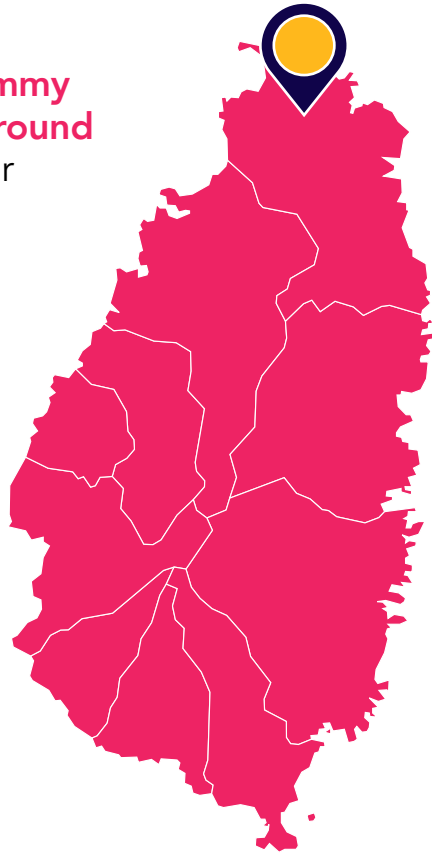
The country Guyana itself is defined by its dense rainforest. English-speaking, with cricket and calypso music, it's culturally connected to the Caribbean region.

The Daren Sammy Cricket Grounds (DSCG) was built in 2002 and played host to the ICC Cricket World Cup 2007.

The DSCG is arguably one of the finest grounds in the region, with a capacity of close to 12,500. While it does not have yet the same rich history as some of the region's more famous grounds, the DSCG has quickly gained the reputation of being one of most sought after venues by both regional and international cricket teams.

Initially named Beausejour Cricket Ground after the area where it is located near the bustling town of Gros Islet in the north of the island, the ground was officially renamed on 21 July 2016 after Daren Sammy, who captained the West Indies to two ICC World T20 championships in 2012 and 2016.

The facility has a permanent seating capacity of about 8,000 with an additional 4000 spectator accommodation in the grounds. There is the ability to increase the seating if necessary, as was done for the ICC Cricket World Cup 2007. It also offers some of the finest amenities to both players and spectators. (Gym, Lounge, four players' dressing rooms conference area and manager's quarters).

ABOUT THE CITY



St. Lucia is the sort of island that travellers to the Caribbean dream about - a small, lush tropical gem that is still relatively unknown.

One of the Windward Islands of the Lesser Antilles, it is located midway down the Eastern Caribbean chain, between Martinique and St. Vincent and north of Barbados. 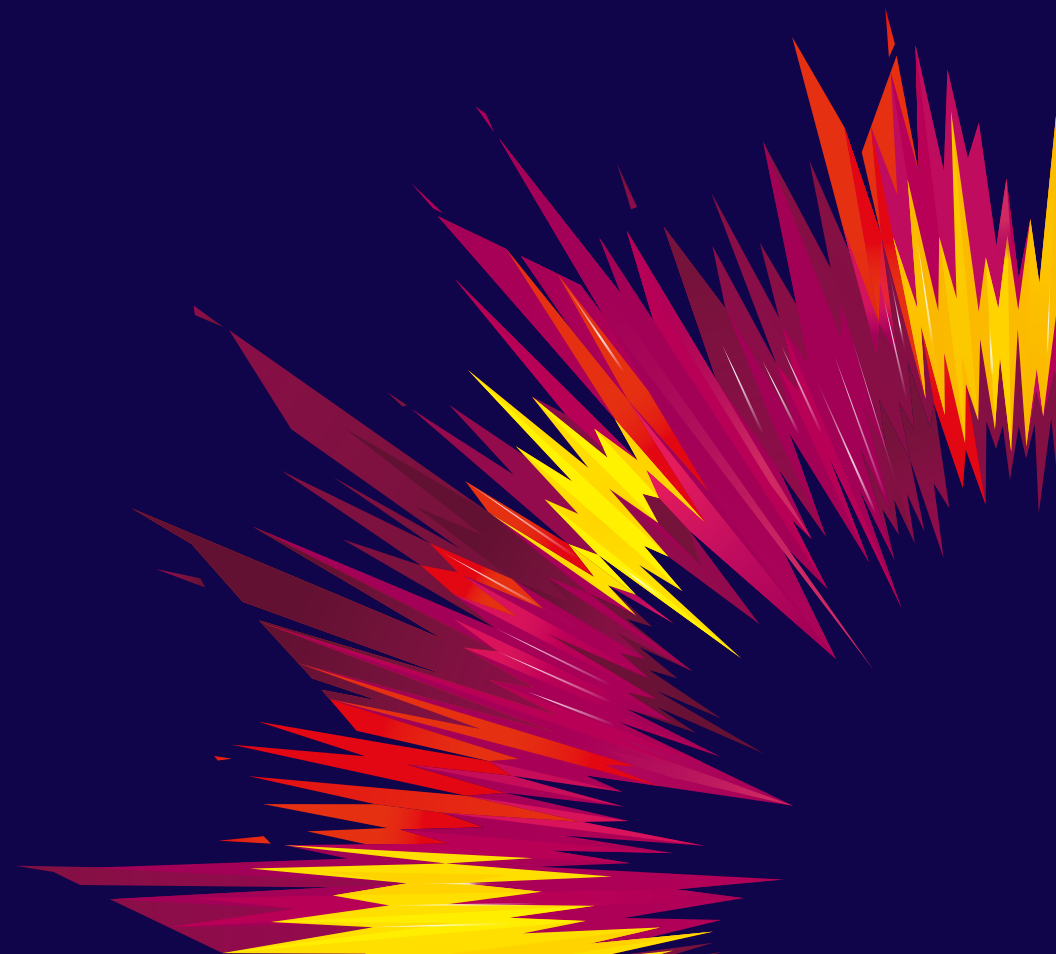

The rain-forest is broken only by verdant fields and orchards of banana, coconut, mango and papaya trees.

St. Lucia has been inhabited since long before colonial times and its cultural treasures are a fascinating mélange of its rich past and its many different traditions. The island's people have earned a well-deserved reputation for their warmth and charm and the island itself is dotted with aged fortresses, small villages and open-air markets.

There is a broad array of exciting and exotic activities available on St. Lucia. The island's steep coastlines and lovely reefs offer excellent snorkelling and scuba diving. The rainforest preserves of St. Lucia's mountainous interior are one of the Caribbean's finest locales for hiking and birdwatching. Of course, the island also possesses excellent facilities for golf, tennis, sailing and a host of other leisure pursuits. Not to be missed is St. Lucia's Soufriere volcano, the world's only drive-in volcanic crater.
