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ABOUT THE TOURNAMENT

This is the second edition of the ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup, following the tournament's inaugural edition in South Africa in January 2023. A total of 16 teams are competing in 41 matches across 16 days in a bid to succeed India as ICC U19 Women's T20 World Champions.

The tournament features 11 ICC Full Member teams, which gained automatic qualification, alongside five Associate Members teams from each of the five regions, which qualified through regional qualifiers in their regions. For details of how each qualified, see pages 11–12.

COMPETITION FORMAT

The 16 teams have been divided into four groups – see below (seedings in brackets). The top three teams from each group will advance to the Super Six stage.

The fourth-placed teams in groups A and D, and the fourth-placed teams in groups B and C, will play against each other before their tournaments end.

The Super Six stage features two groups of six teams – one that includes the top three teams from groups A and D, and the other featuring the top three teams from groups B and C. Each team will carry forward the points, wins and net run rate (NRR) they earned against their fellow Super Six qualifiers.

Each team plays two Super Six fixtures against opponents from the corresponding group that finished in different group stage positions. For example, the top team in group A (A1) will play the teams placed second and third in group D (D2 and D3).

The top two teams in each Super Six group following these fixtures then qualify for the semi-finals, with the winners competing in the final on 2 February.

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HOW THE TEAMS QUALIFIED

THE HOSTS

Malaysia

Malaysia makes its debut at the tournament after missing out on the inaugural edition in 2023 following defeat in the Asia Qualifier, which they hosted.

TOP 10 FULL MEMBER SIDES AT THE ICC U19 WOMEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2023

India, England, Australia, New Zealand, Bangladesh, Ireland, Pakistan, South Africa, Sri Lanka, West Indies

Malaysia will be joined by the top 10 full member sides from the 2023 tournament.

India, champions in 2023 (*right*), are back to defend their title, while **England** will have eyes on going one step further after finishing as runners-up.

Australia and New Zealand were the beaten semi-finalists last time around. They're joined by Bangladesh, Ireland, Pakistan, South Africa, Sri Lanka and West Indies, all of whom reached the Super Six stage in 2023.

EAST ASIA PACIFIC QUALIFIER Samoa

The first regional qualifier for the ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup 2025 took place in Indonesia from 14–20 May 2024, when hosts Indonesia were joined by Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Samoa for a week of double round-robin competition.



Samoa (*below right*) qualified thanks to five wins from six matches – doing the double over Indonesia to ensure they progressed. Olive Lefaga's three for 13 was crucial to Samoa winning their first match against Indonesia by two wickets, before Silepea Polataivao took six for 15 as Samoa clinched the second fixture by eight runs. Their only defeat came to Papua New Guinea, who eventually finished third.



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EUROPE QUALIFIER

Scotland

Scotland (*bottom left*) emerged victorious from a three-match qualifying series against Netherlands on 1–4 August 2024, becoming the second team to book their place through a regional qualifier.

The Scots won all three matches in Aberdeen, opening with a 10-wicket victory inspired by Mollie Parker's spell of three for eight. A six-wicket victory followed to secure qualification, before Scotland swept the series with a 64-run win, Emma Walsingham starring with 73 not out from 49 balls.

AFRICA QUALIFIER Nigeria

The qualification pathway then moved to Kigali, Rwanda for the Africa Qualifier – with **Nigeria** (*left*) emerging victorious, the first time a Nigerian women's side has qualified for an ICC World Cup event.

A Division 2 qualifier (21–27 August 2024) determined that Malawi and Kenya would join the eight-team Division 1 qualifier, which took place from 22–29 September 2024. Both Nigeria and Uganda won all three of their group stage matches, with Rwanda and Zimbabwe completing the semi-final line-up.

Nigeria saw off hosts Rwanda by 62 runs in their semi-final, with Zimbabwe beating Uganda by 75 runs in the second semi-final. After rain led to the abandonment of the final, Nigeria progressed to the World Cup because they finished above Zimbabwe in the group stage.

ASIA QUALIFIER Nepal

The Asia Qualifier was contested between four sides in the UAE from 6–13 November 2024. **Nepal** (*bottom right*) won five of their six matches against Kuwait, Thailand and the UAE, edging top spot ahead of the UAE by virtue of a superior net run rate.

The UAE earned a 13-run victory in the two teams' opening match in Dubai – but Nepal held their nerve to win the sides' second match by eight wickets. Player of the Match Krishma Gurung produced figures of four for 17 to restrict the UAE to a total of 83 for nine. Nepal chased down their target in 14.4 overs to book their place in Malaysia.

AMERICAS USA

The **USA** automatically qualified for the ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup 2025 as they were the only nation in the region to fulfil the required criteria. The USA finished fourth in Group A at the 2023 edition before losing to Scotland in the fourth-place play-offs.







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TOURNAMENT PREVIEW

Excitement is on the rise as the ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup 2025 showcases the best young talent in the women's game.

The second edition of the ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup follows the success of the first edition, which was held in South Africa in 2023. Once again, 16 teams will battle it out to be crowned the champions, following India in etching their names on the trophy.

The reigning champions are set to be among the frontrunners once more, alongside the other teams to make the top four in 2023: England, runners-up first time around, and Australia and New Zealand, the beaten semi-finalists two years ago.

Four teams will make their debuts – including hosts Malaysia, who will stage a major cricket tournament for the first time since hosting the ICC U19 Men's Cricket World Cup 2008. They will be joined by fellow newcomers Nepal, Nigeria and Samoa, with the latter's first international match coming in the East Asia Pacific Qualifiers that secured them their place in the tournament. They're the first side from Samoa to qualify for any ICC World Cup, having won five and lost just one game during qualification.

GETTING GOING

The tournament begins on 18 January, with 12 teams in action across groups B, C and D. Group A gets under way a day later, with matches featuring hosts Malaysia and defending champions India.



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Teams have been drawn into four pools of four, with each team playing the other three teams in their group. That will decide which 12 teams advance to the Super 6 stage, with the four teams who finish bottom of their respective groups playing off to decide the standings from 13th to 16th. Scotland and the USA are the two returning teams who failed to make it to the Super 6s last time, and both will be hoping to fare better in Malaysia.

The Super 6 stage, made up of two groups of six, will see all sides play teams they have yet to face in the tournament, with those results added to their initial group stage standings. The top two teams in each Super 6 pool will then advance to the semifinals on 31 January, with the final following two days later.

TURNING BACK THE CLOCK

The 2023 tournament saw England go undefeated on their way to the final, recording a thrilling threerun victory in the semi-final against Australia – who had earlier sent India to what turned out to be their only loss in the tournament, a seven-wicket defeat in the Super 6 stage.

Before that, Australia had been involved in the first shock of the tournament – and in the very first match. The Aussies were beaten comfortably by Bangladesh thanks to 40 from Dilara Akter, who went on to be selected for the ICC Women's T20 World Cup. A high point for Australia was the emergence of Maggie Clark (*below right*), with the then-15-year-old taking 12 wickets to end as the tournament's leading wicket-taker. Clark has been selected for her second ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup, with South African wicketkeeper Karabo Meso (*aboue right*) another of the players named in the Team of the Tournament who are returning for a second time.

Grace Scrivens of England hit the highest score of the tournament with 93 against Ireland and has since graduated to the senior side, along with several players from across the teams involved in the first tournament.

WELCOME TO MALAYSIA

The ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup 2025 is set to be played across four venues. Pandamaran's Bayuemas Oval will be the base for Group A, while Johor Cricket Academy Oval hosts Group B. Borneo Cricket Ground in Sarawak provides the backdrop to Group C, while Group D takes place at the YSD–UKM Cricket Oval in Bangi.

All four grounds then host Super 6 and play-off matches before everyone moves to Pandamaran for the final stages at the 3,000 capacity stadium.

India will look to be back to defend their crown, having stormed to the title against England two years ago – setting off a wave of positivity that is ready to roll on to Malaysia.







BUILDING ON SUCCESS



Snehal Pradhan, Manager of Women's Cricket at the ICC, looks back on the first ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup – and looks ahead to the future.

The inaugural ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup was a long time in the making – but when it finally took place in 2023, it was a roaring success. The tournament was scheduled to be played in January 2021 in Bangladesh, but the COVID-19 pandemic saw the tournament pushed back two years and moved to South Africa. While that wasn't part of the initial plan, it meant a double-header of ICC women's events in the country, with the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2023 taking place just a month later.

BACK TO BACK

For Snehal Pradhan, Manager of Women's Cricket at the ICC, that turn of events served to make the tournament even more successful.

"It aligned that South Africa got the opportunity to host two back-to-back global women's events. That is probably a unique opportunity for the country," says Prahan.

"It created momentum. The U19 Women's T20 World Cup started to create awareness around women's cricket in the country, which was capitalised upon with the Women's T20 World Cup that followed. It culminated in that sell-out crowd in Newlands, a market where women's cricket had never been ticketed before. The whole thing came together really well, even though it came together much later and in a different place than originally planned."

PARITY, QUALITY AND OPPORTUNITY

Prahan is keen to stress that many people deserve credit for the tournament's success.

"I have to give credit to those who came before me at the ICC. The U19 tournament has been in discussion for a number of years, and so many people – primarily our events team and the Board, who had the vision to commit to the tournament at this age – need to be acknowledged. The ambition was around opportunity and quality."

And, as Prahan points out, parity.

"Having this U19 tournament meant there was parity between the men's and women's events. You had men's and women's 50-over World Cups, men's and women's T20 World Cups, and U19 men's and women's World Cups as well. The fact that parity existed was a big statement.

"The other part was opportunity, because the ambitions were that this tournament would drive change in member countries. It would build the junior pathways in those countries and that's exactly what we've seen."

Archana Devi's stunning catch helped India

to victory in the final against England.

AN IMMEDIATE IMPACT

When the tournament did finally take place, it began with a bang as Bangladesh shocked Australia in the very first match in Benoni, a statement seven-wicket victory. From that point on, it was clear that the quality of cricket and the possibility of surprises would be sky-high – and so it proved.

India made their intentions clear, with senior international stars Shafali Verma and Richa Ghosh both named in their squad and playing a big role in their run to the title. For Verma, it provided an opportunity to captain the national side in a landmark tournament.

"The positioning of the tournament across men's and women's is 'future stars'," says Prahan. "This is a tournament that allows players to make their name at U19 level before going on to play high-level international senior cricket. It gives a few players who had already made their name in international cricket a platform to really step up as senior players in the team.

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"Someone like Shafali Verma got the chance to lead the team and get captaincy experience, which she wouldn't be close to at senior level – that was fantastic. The fact that she was able to lead India to a first ICC trophy on the women's side was icing on the cake as far as the storyline goes. It's huge for the tournament to be able to produce stars, but also to have stars coming in."

TOMORROW'S STARS TODAY

Verma and Ghosh helped India ease through the group stage with three wins from three matches, before they were beaten by Australia in their opening Super 6 encounter. Both teams made it through to the semi-finals, though, with India beating New Zealand before England won a three-run thriller against the Aussies.

On that occasion, England successfully defended 99 – but after being bowled out for 68 in the final, the bowlers could not save the day again, and India prevailed by seven wickets.

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

Established stars played a big role, but there were others from elsewhere who have since kicked on.

This tournament gave many a first chance to see Georgia Plimmer in action for New Zealand, for example. A little more than one year later, she was starring in the final of the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2024 in Dubai as the White Ferns claimed the title.

"It's such a great story, and probably a great advertisement of how important this tournament is in the pathway," says Prahan.

"It's fair to say that if Georgia Plimmer hadn't had the opportunity on the international stage that she got with New Zealand, she may not have been fast-tracked into the senior team as quickly. She was making her name in a World Cup final just a couple of years after playing in the inaugural U19 tournament.

"The international exposure that they get, the fact that they get the experience of what a global event feels like, helps them settle down a bit more quickly in the senior side.

"They have been there before, and so for players like her, like Milly Illingworth of Australia, who had a great Women's Big Bash League season, like Theertha Satish of the UAE, who had a great tournament as well – she's one of those who is now making a very big impact in the senior squad. To see these players graduate into international cricket is incredibly satisfying and incredibly exciting to watch." The tournament also saw the introduction of social media protection for female cricketers by the ICC. This structure was developed in conjunction with the players, who had shared their own experiences of abuse on social media.

MORE TO COME

With 16 teams competing in all, the ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup 2023 was the largest women's tournament ever organised by the ICC. This tournament in Malaysia will look to build on its success, with Pradhan confident that the impact of this event will be long-lasting.

"It was a fantastic success. It was very much a commitment to equity between the men's tournament and the women's tournament but also a leap of faith. Countries were still maturing in how developed their women's and junior pathways were, so it was a chance to see the work that the countries have been putting in over the last few years.

"Having 16 teams was a fantastic starting point in the first place and this will drive more progress in those countries."



A VITAL LEARNING GROUND

Shafali Verma, who captained India to victory at the ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup 2023, discusses the importance of the tournament for young players.

Shafali Verma has hailed the ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup as the perfect breeding ground for the next generation of stars.

The superstar batter Verma captained India to victory in the inaugural staging of the tournament in South Africa, which took place in January 2023.

Verma led from the front, scoring 172 runs across the competition and guiding her team to a seven-wicket win over England in the final.

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A SPECIAL TRIUMPH

"Representing India in itself is a great honour," says Verma. "Being chosen to captain the Indian cricket team was icing on the cake, honestly. I was fortunate to have some of the finest talent in the age-group cricket from back home at my disposal.

"While it was simply brilliant to lead that talented lot, it was more about playing together as a unit, sharing a solid camaraderie and making sure everyone is in great spirits as we looked to enjoy ourselves in the middle.

"Obviously, winning the tournament – the first of its kind in women's age-group cricket – as a captain will remain one of the best moments of my cricketing career; something that I will remember forever. It is safe to say that I was pretty emotional as we were about to lift that trophy and started to celebrate a special triumph."

A TALENT SHOWCASE

The first edition of the ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup provided a platform for a number of top Indian prospects to announce themselves on the global scene. Foremost among them were leg-spinner Parshavi Chopra, who took 11 wickets, and batter Shweta Sehrawat, who scored more runs than anyone else with 297.

Verma believes the competition is an ideal stage on which young players can showcase their talent and test themselves against the best.

"It is a massive help to play in a tournament like this," said the 20-year-old. "It is a big opportunity to showcase your talent on the world stage. It has all



the potential to fast track some of the young and promising cricketers to represent their respective countries with the senior teams.

"It also remains one of the vital learning grounds for the players where they get to play against the talented cricketers from across the globe. The players get to sharpen their skills and make a name for themselves and bring laurels to the country. It is a big boost to be a part of such tournaments."

LOOKING AHEAD

A third edition of the ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup has already been scheduled for Bangladesh and Nepal in 2027, with Verma seeing it as a vital addition to the ICC major events calendar.

"It is extremely crucial to have a U19 women's tournament in a structure that only had senior women's tournaments before this. It is a win-win for the age-group teams – as well as the senior sides where you have a larger pool of players available for selection. "There is healthy competition, and that always is a welcome sign. The U19 women's tournament structure is a need of the hour, as it also acts as a crucial segue to move into the senior sides. So it's not only massive for age-group cricket, but also for the overall growth of the game."

Nepal, Nigeria, Samoa, Scotland and the USA have qualified through the regional route, giving new nations a chance to shine, and Verma hopes the next generation seize the opportunity presented to them over the coming weeks.

"My best wishes are with them," she said. "Having played the tournament in its first-ever edition, I can vouch for the fact that it will be a fantastic experience for the players who are going to take part in this second edition.

"The message from me for everyone who is going to be a part of this year's tournament is very simple: enjoy this experience and make the most of it. This could just be a start for something bigger – but live in the moment and enjoy the process." 曰

ICC CODE OF CONDUCT

The ICC Code of Conduct is part of the ICC's continuing efforts to maintain the public image, popularity and integrity of cricket by providing: (a) an effective means to deter any participant from conducting themselves improperly on and off the field of play or in a manner that is contrary to the 'spirit of cricket'; and (b) a robust disciplinary procedure pursuant to which all matters of improper conduct can be dealt with fairly, with certainty and in an expeditious manner.

THE DUCKWORTH-LEWIS-STERN METHOD

The Duckworth-Lewis-Stern (D-L-S) method sets revised targets in rain-interrupted limited-overs matches, taking into consideration the runscoring resources at the disposal of the two sides. Information on the D-L-S method can be found on the **ICC website**.

ILLEGAL BOWLING

An Illegal Bowling Action is where a player is throwing rather than bowling the ball. This is defined by the ICC as being where the player's elbow extends by an amount of more than 15 degrees between their arm reaching the horizontal and the ball being released. Match Officials in international cricket use the naked eye and their cricketing experience to decide whether they believe a player may be using an Illegal Bowling Action and, if so, they will submit a report.

ANTI-CORRUPTION

Cricket is considered by many to be a world leader in the fight against corruption in sport and strives to do its best to work towards the vision to 'Keep Cricket Clean'. All players and officials who take part in the top level of international cricket pass through the Anti- Corruption Unit (ACU)'s education programme.

The ICC's Anti-Corruption Managers coordinate the ACU's prevention measures and are present at tournaments and international series to ensure that strict anti-corruption protocols are enforced at all venues, particularly around the dressing room areas. Information on the ICC's Anti-Corruption Code can be found on the ICC website.

ANTI-DOPING

The ICC has a zero-tolerance approach to doping and is a signatory to the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) since July 2006. The ICC Anti-Doping Code, compliant with the World Anti-Doping Code, ensures cricket plays its part in the global fight against drugs in sport. Information on the ICC's Anti-Doping Code can be found on the ICC website.

ANTI-DISCRIMINATION

The ICC has a strict Anti-Discrimination Code that confirms a level of commitment from the ICC and its Members to promote and encourage participation at all levels, regardless of race, religion, culture, colour, descent, national or ethnic origin, and to ensure that there is no discrimination in the sport.

The diverse history and culture of the game draws people together. There is a strong tradition of fans from rival teams enjoying matches alongside each other, while cricket players too are known to mingle with each other and often help each other out with the technicalities of the game. - Filming and photography are allowed from pre-designated media areas.
- Filming of media conferences (by camera or phone) may be done from the back row or behind the seating arrangement.

Additional guidance (both days):

• Nothing is to be posted natively on social media channels, including YouTube

Where can media post their videos?

Posting any content that has been downloaded from the ICC's Online Media Zone on to social media channels or YouTube is not permitted.

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KUALA LUMPUR



As well as being the financial hub of the country, Kuala Lumpur is a true melting pot of cultures and food – a city that never sleeps. It's home to many cultures, something reflected in the skyline of the city.

The city offers cuisines from literally every part of the world and is rapidly developing toward its 'smart city' status with green initiatives, efficient public services and innovative infrastructure. With one of the best medical facilities, Kuala Lumpur is also big on medical tourism. The city is modern with skyscraper buildings, and yet there are sprinkles of heritage buildings surrounding them. A safe city with friendly people of diverse cultures.

BAYUEMAS OVAL

Bayuemas Oval is the headquarters of the Malaysian Cricket Association (MCA). Established in 2004, the 3,000-capacity Oval has hosted significant tournaments, including the ICC U19 Men's Cricket World Cup 2008, and continues to be a preferred venue for international and domestic matches.

As the MCA's operational base, the venue also plays a crucial role in the development and promotion of cricket in Malaysia, supporting competitive matches, training camps and administrative functions that drive the sport forward.

JOHOR BAHRU


Johor Bahru District is Malaysia's secondlargest district by population, and the second-largest contributor to national GDP among the country's major cities. It serves as one of two border gateways between Malaysia and Singapore, making it the world's busiest international border crossing.

The city of Johor Bahru – or 'JB', as it's commonly known – has many attractions, fron LEGOLAND to shopping malls offering duty-free goods. From its rich cultural heritage to its modern attractions, JB is a tourist attraction.

JOHOR CRICKET ACADEMY OVAL

The Johor Cricket Academy Oval, officially the Dato' Dr Harjit Singh Johor Cricket Academy & Oval, was established in 1997 as Malaysia's first dedicated cricket oval. Managed by the Johor Cricket Council, it features a natural turf wicket block, a spacious pavilion and modern facilities, and has hosted domestic and international matches, including women's T20Is.

The Oval is also home to southeast Asia's first indoor cricket hall, built in 2008, and plays a key role in cricket development in Malaysia. The venue serves as a hub for talent identification and grassroots programmes, and supports the growth of cricket and the preparation of players for competitive tournaments.



SELANGOR



The state of Selangor is one of the most developed and industrialised states in Malaysia.

The capital of Shah Alam is known for its lush greenery, beautiful lakes and grand mosques, while further up you'll find the country's largest and most talked-about amusement park: Sunway Lagoon, which houses water rides, wildlife park and an extreme park.

The state is not short of top-notch malls, and is also a food haven, with bustling activities both day and night. It is definitely a shoppers' paradise, with easy access via the overhead trains and public transport that run round the clock.

YSD-UKM CRICKET OVAL

The YSD–UKM Cricket Oval, located within the Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia campus in Bangi, Selangor, is a premier cricket venue in Malaysia. Home to one of the nation's leading universities, which hosts over 30,000 students, the Oval is a key venue for high-profile events. It symbolises Malaysia's growing stature in international cricket, providing a platform for global competitions and the development of local talent.

KUCHING



An adventure awaits the visitor in Sarawak. Steeped in culture, the state is known for its lush rainforests, hospitality, exquisite cuisine, preserved wildlife and festivals – including the annual Rainforest World Music Festival, held in the Sarawak capital of Kuching.

Kuching – or 'Cat' in English – is situated on island of Borneo. Look out for an array of seafood, often with fresh catches of the day. Other highlights include the Sunset River Cruise, the Orangutan Wildlife Centre, heritage bike tours and shopping. In Kuching, you have the choice either to take an adventurous path or to sit with nature and enjoy the serenity.

BORNEO CRICKET GROUND

Borneo Cricket Ground is the first international-sized cricket ground in Borneo. Construction began in June 2023 ahead of the August 2024 Malaysia Games, fully funded by the Sarawak government with an investment of MYR 15 million. The pavilion was added in August 2024 after Sarawak was confirmed as the host for Group C matches at the ICC U19 Women's T20 World Cup 2025.

The ground is inspired by the Bay Oval in Mount Maunganui, New Zealand, and features the first natural turf wicket in Borneo – made using Sarawak clay. The ground marks a major milestone for cricket development in the region.






