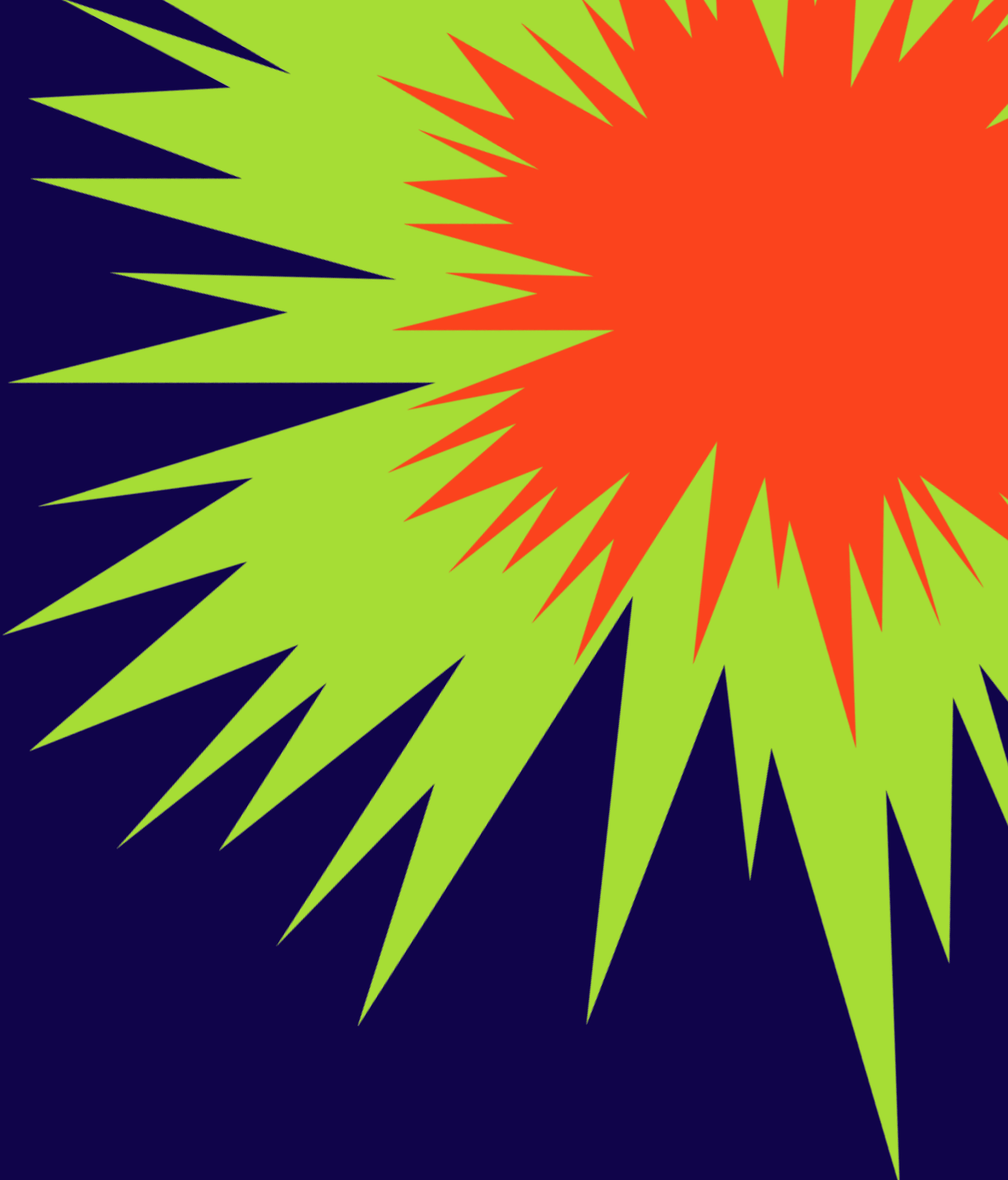

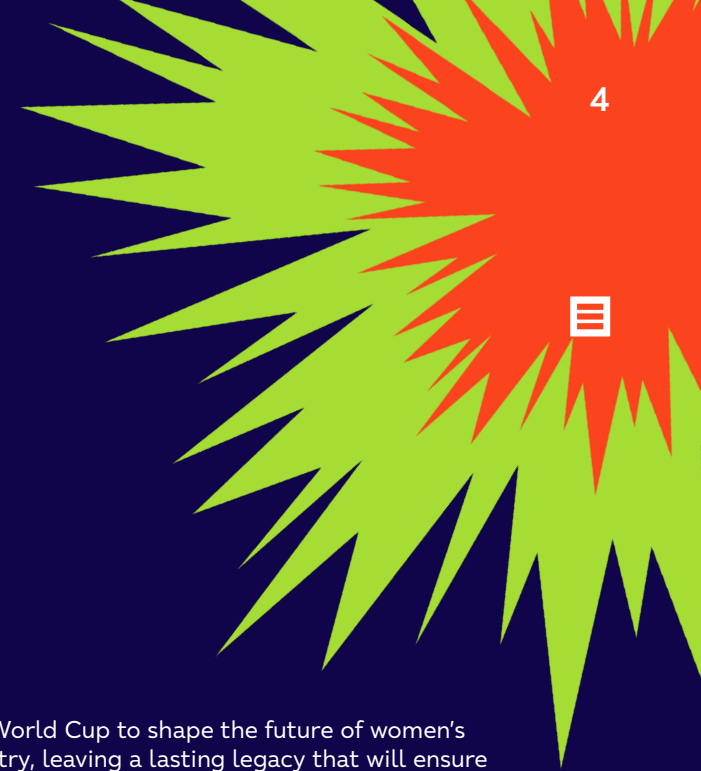

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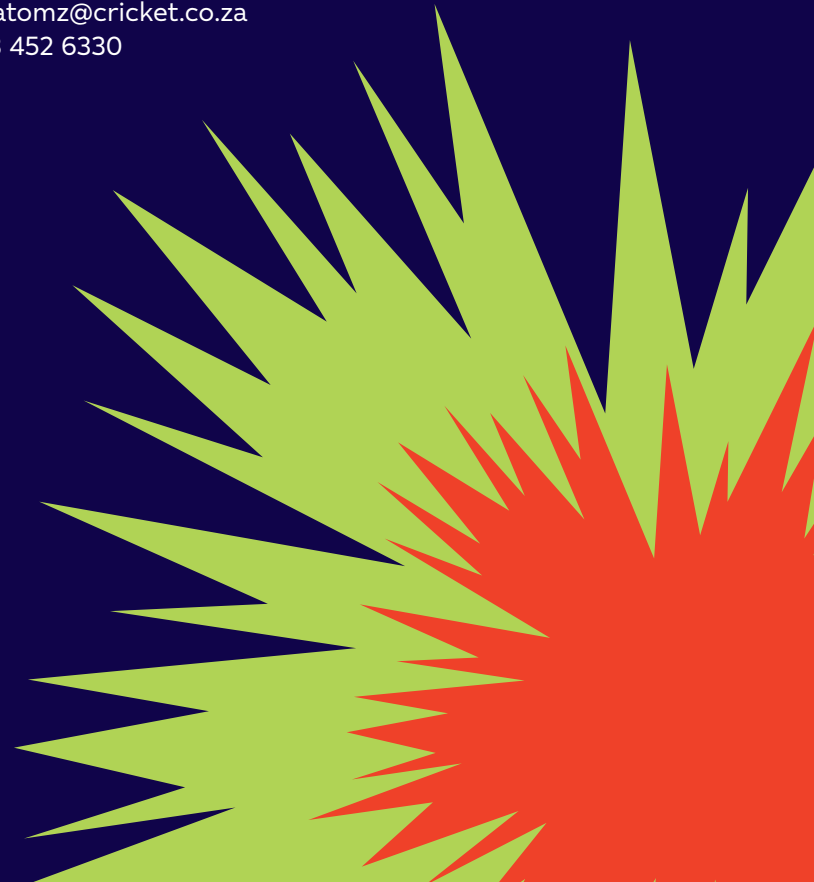

ABOUT THE TOURNAMENT

The ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2023 is the eighth edition of the tournament, and the first to be held in South Africa.

The ICC Women's T20 World Cup is a very important event on the cricket calendar. The women's game continues to build momentum and engage more fans than ever before, while T20 cricket is recognised as the vehicle of growth for the game.

The ICC Women's T20 World Cup has grown in stature over the years. The first five tournaments were held alongside men's events, but the event graduated to a standalone tournament in 2018, when it was held in the West Indies. The 2020 event in Australia proved to be a watershed, with an astounding 86,174 spectators watching the Australia vs India final at the MCG on International Women's Day.

The 17-day tournament will be played in Gqeberha, Paarl and Cape Town, which will be the venue for both semi-finals as well as the final. Australia, the defending champions, have won the title five times, while England and the West Indies have each won once.

TOURNAMENT FORMAT

The tournament is being played on a league-cum-knockout basis, which starts with the 10 teams divided into two groups:

GROUP A	GROUP B

The top two teams in each group will progress to the semi-finals, with the final taking place on 26 February 2023.

THE TROPHY

The ICC Women's T20 World Cup trophy stands 50cm high and represents the dynamic and explosive nature of T20 cricket, the most exciting and fast-paced format of the sport. Crafted in silver, the trophy has been carefully designed to ensure its uniqueness and is instantly recognised no matter from which angle it is viewed.

The trophy was instituted at the first edition of the tournament in 2009 as the perpetual prize for winning the ICC Women's T20 World Cup. An exact replica is produced to be handed to the winner of each subsequent ICC Women's T20 World Cup.

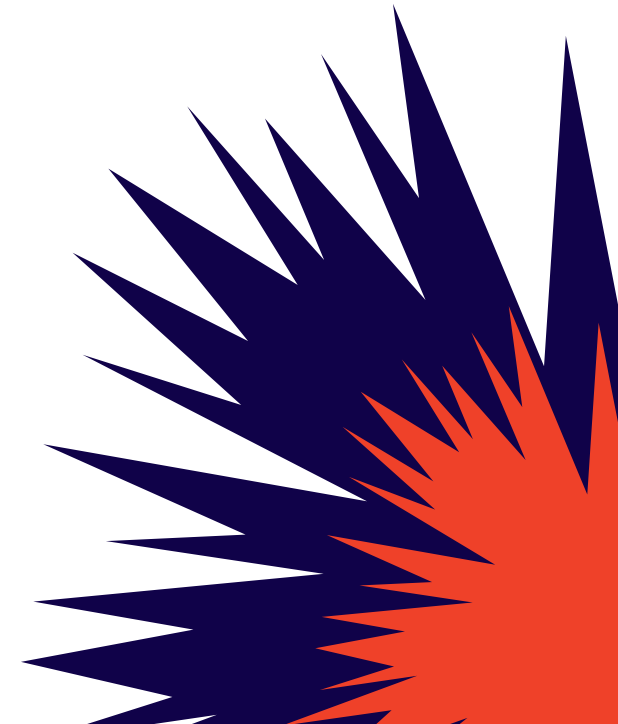

PLAYING REGULATIONS

PLAYING CONDITIONS

The full playing conditions for the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2023 are available in the Resources section of the **Online Media Zone**, and on the ICC's official website at icc-cricket.com.

DUCKWORTH-LEWIS-STERN METHOD

The Duckworth-Lewis-Stern (D-L-S) method sets revised targets in rain-interrupted limited-overs matches, taking into consideration the run-scoring resources at the disposal of the two sides. Information on the D-L-S method can be found on [the ICC website](#).

ANTI-DOPING

The ICC has a zero-tolerance approach to doping and is a signatory to the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) since July 2006. The ICC Anti-Doping Code, compliant with the World Anti-Doping Code, ensures cricket plays its part in the global fight against drugs in sport. ANTI-DISCRIMINATION

Across the world, cricket has a rich and diverse history and regularly demonstrates its capacity to break down boundaries and draw cultures together. There is a strong tradition of fans from rival teams enjoying matches side by side, and the off-field camaraderie among players is a celebrated feature of the game.

Against this backdrop, there is clearly no place for discrimination – so, in October 2012, the ICC Anti-Discrimination Policy for International Cricket (originally entitled the Anti-Racism Policy for International Cricket) was introduced as part of the ICC's continuing efforts to maintain the public image, popularity and integrity of cricket.

The Anti-Discrimination Policy replaced the Anti-Racism Code and permits Members to exercise more flexibility and discretion in determining what is appropriate within their own jurisdiction to achieve, to a consistently high standard, the desired aims of the Policy. In August 2019, the Policy was amended to widen the discriminatory conduct that was not prohibited by the ICC.

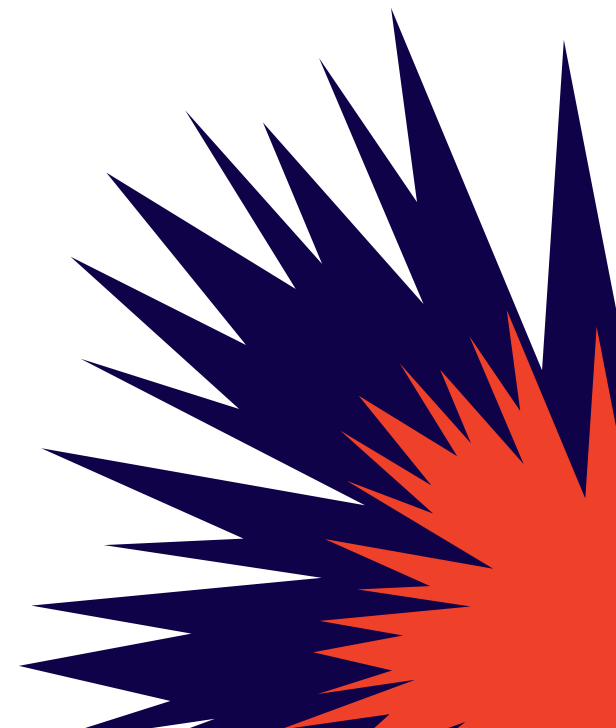
This Policy, one of the toughest in world sport, confirms a level of commitment from the ICC and its Members to promote and encourage participation at all levels regardless of race, colour, religion, descent, culture, ethnic origin, nationality, sex, gender, sexual orientation, disability, marital status and/or maternity status, and to ensure that there is no discrimination in the sport. ANTI-CORRUPTION

Cricket is considered by many to be a world leader in the fight against corruption in sport and strives to do its best to work towards the vision to "Keep Cricket

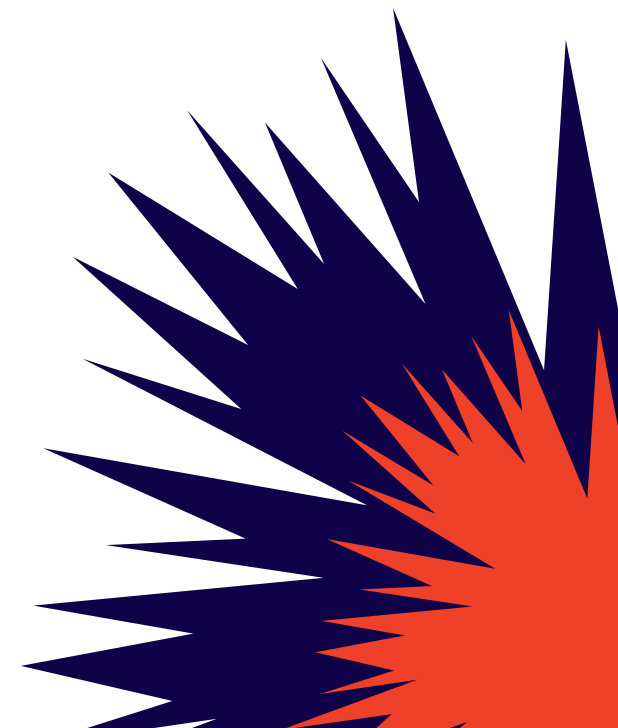
Clean". All players and officials who take part in the top level of international cricket pass through the Anti-Corruption Unit (ACU)'s education programme.

The ICC's Anti-Corruption Managers coordinate the ACU's prevention measures and are present at tournaments and international series to ensure that strict anti-corruption protocols are enforced at all venues, particularly around the dressing room areas. 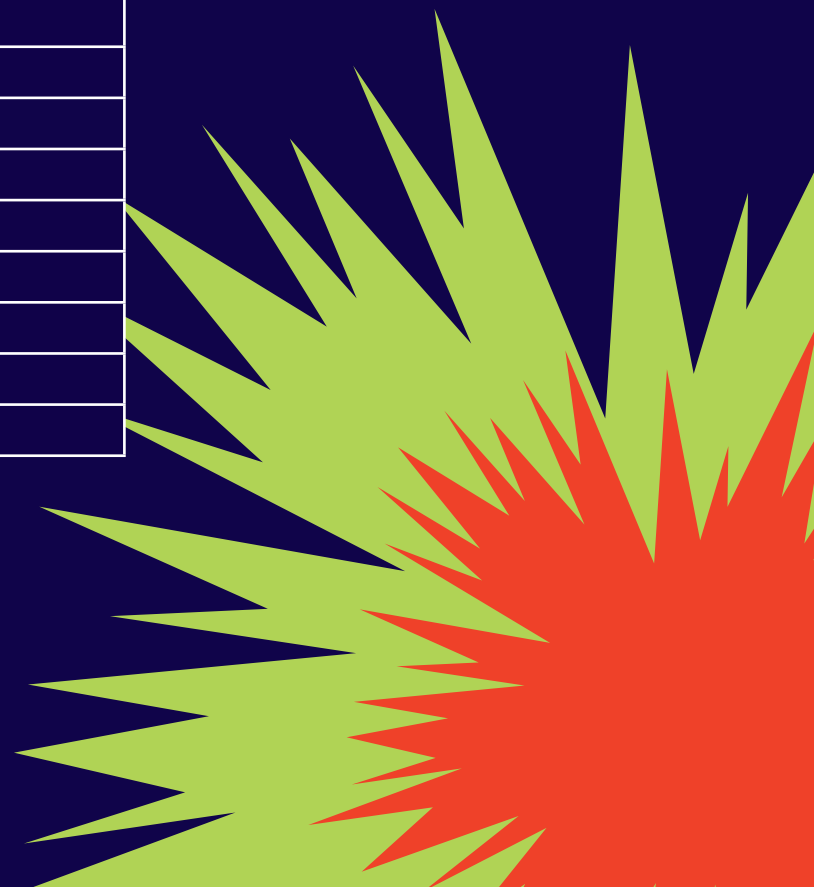

MEDIA ACCREDITATION



The ICC has accredited media from all over the world for the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2023. The tournament will be operating under a high trust model, and therefore all accredited media and participants are requested to practice safe behaviour.

As in previous tournaments, the ICC will follow its priority order in allotting match-day seats. This is done by the ICC Media and Accreditation teams, keeping in mind the teams playing. We follow the general principles outlined in the media advisory and FAQs document on accreditation, which we shared at the start of the accreditation process.

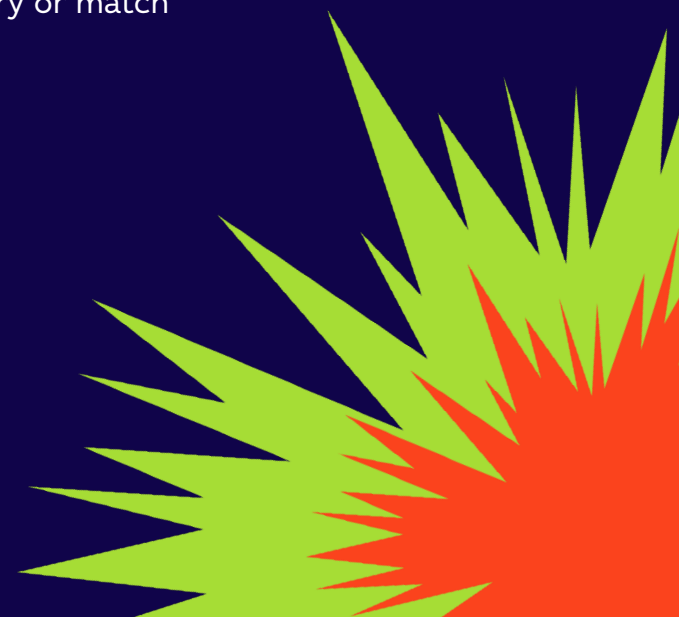
Media accreditation passes may be collected from the venues. Reporters will be allotted seats and photographers will be allotted photo positions, keeping in mind any biosafety and security protocols.

Updates through the tournament will be sent out to the tournament media email list that we maintain. Please remember to read our advisories: there may

be changes in protocols, biosafety measures or the way the media interactions are conducted, whether owing to changes in government guidelines or on advice from our own colleagues.

WHAT IF MY ACCREDITATION IS LOST?

If your tournament accreditation pass is lost or stolen, please report it to the Accreditation team and make a formal complaint at the nearest police station. Upon completion of the lost/stolen declaration form, the tournament accreditation will be replaced providing the individual has appropriate ID. If the original tournament accreditation is found, it should be surrendered, and the police should be informed. Please note that no additional temporary or match day passes will be provided.



CODE OF CONDUCT FOR MEDIA



Please note that all accredited Non Rights-Holders (NRH) media must adhere to the code of conduct for the tournament, as well as the tournament media terms and conditions agreed to while signing the accreditation form.

Accreditation cards of journalists will be cancelled if they are found to behave in an inappropriate manner at any of the venues. The ICC has a zero-tolerance policy towards racism and sexual harassment and action will be taken immediately in any such case, which could include suspension of the accreditation card and blacklisting from all ICC events.

Journalists could also face suspension from future matches or have their accreditation revoked if they are found to be in violation of other terms and conditions, including those of video and audio recordings at venues.

NO SHOWS

Journalists who have changed their plans – those withdrawing from the tournament, those who become unavailable to attend particular matches, and/or those who need to change their selection of matches – must please send details in an e-mail to leratomz@cricket.co.za.

Failure to do so could affect their chances of attending future ICC events. Journalists not informing us of their inability to attend any match of this tournament may not be given a match ticket for subsequent matches..



SECURITY

Cricket South Africa (CSA) has developed a comprehensive Master Security Plan for the event, a copy of which has been provided to each participating Member.

The aims of the Master Security Plan are:

- To deliver a safe and secure tournament for the attending public, media, workforce, teams and officials.
- To provide a proportionate approach to threat and risk that does not detract from the enjoyment of the tournament for those attending and participating.
- To maintain South Africa's excellent reputation for delivering safe and secure international events.
- To minimise the likelihood of a critical or major incident occurring at any tournament venue and to ensure that all contingency plans for such incidents are fit for purpose.

This will be achieved by:

- Maintaining a thorough, structured, intelligence-based approach to threat, risk and harm.
- Working with key stakeholders, venues and law enforcement agencies to ensure a consistent approach and a shared situational awareness.
- Ensuring that a robust command, communication and co-ordination strategy underpins decision-making processes.
- Ensuring that planning principles adhere to South Africa's best practise and legislative requirements.
- Ensuring that regular scrutiny, independent testing and exercises, and workforce upskilling take place.



BIOSAFETY

This is a summary of the *ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2023 Biosafety Plan*. For full details on the biosafety arrangements for this event, please refer to the detailed biosafety plan.

COVID-19 VACCINATIONS

There is no COVID-19 vaccine requirement for entry into South Africa. However, in the best interest of the health and safety of those around you, the *ICC* recommends that members of the media are fully vaccinated (double dose) with a booster shot or recovery from infection in the last six months.

COVID-19 TESTING

There will be no COVID-19 testing carried out by the *ICC* on arrival or during the event. It is recommended that members of the media test before travel to ensure they are free of COVID-19 before travel, and that they arrive at the event free of any infection.

SYMPTOMATIC TESTING

The *ICC* recommends that members of the media report any symptoms to the *ICC* Media Manager. It is in their best interests to PCR-test any member of the media should they display COVID-type symptoms during the event to avoid further spread of COVID-19 within the team. South Africa has many testing facilities, and the Event Chief Medical Officer can help facilitate a test.

ISOLATION PERIOD

Should a member of the media test positive during the event, there is no mandatory isolation required by the South African Government. The member of the media should consult with the Event Chief Medical Officer on the best way to manage the infected individual.

PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT

There is no requirement in South Africa for the use of masks or any other personal protective equipment.

ONLINE MEDIA ZONE

- **Build-up articles**

A variety of build-up articles about past events as well as this edition of the tournament is available. These include topics such as the history of the tournament, past performances, historic moments and players to look out for.

- **Captains' columns**

Captains of participating teams have written first-person articles for the ICC as part of the event build-up, speaking about their teams and the tournament. These columns provide insights into teams' objectives and what they expect in South Africa.

- **Match reports, round-ups and other articles**

Match reports and daily wraps form the core of the coverage with crisp articles in a ready-to-use form. A team is writing exclusively for the ICC, ensuring top-class content including features, interviews and previews covering all teams and venues.

- **Photographs**

A selection of photographs from matches and other activities are provided for free editorial use. Please note that only the images available in downloadable format are for editorial use. The rights of other images published in the Online Media Zone, including those in media releases, may not belong to the ICC.

- **Media conference videos**

All pre-match and post-match media conferences will be recorded by a dedicated ICC crew and unedited versions of the videos will be provided to the media. Please note that videos may be used on websites and news channels but are not for direct use on social media platforms. The media conferences will also be live on our social media channels.





- **Transcripts**

Verbatim transcripts will be provided from all post-match media conferences. These may be expected within 30 minutes of each media interaction, giving media the chance to quote players quickly without having to transcribe long audio recordings.

- **Translations**

We will also have translations from media conferences from other languages to English. This service will help players as well as the media since the players may be more fluent in their own languages.

- **B-roll footage**

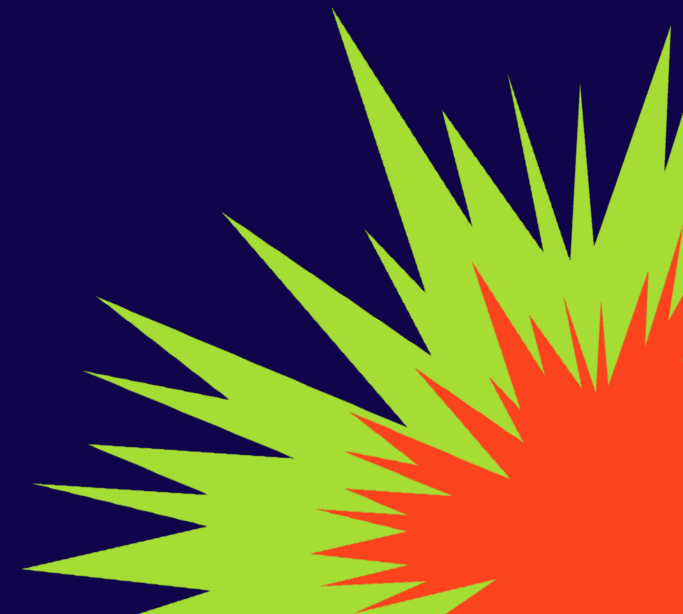

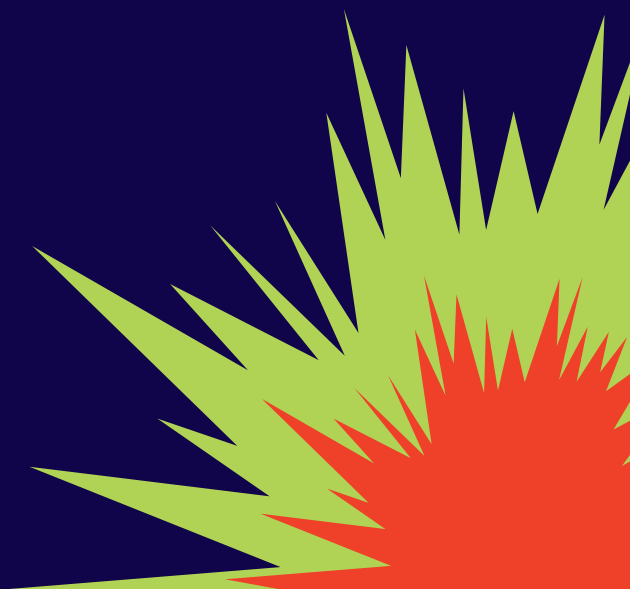

ICC WOMEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2023

Newlands is arguably the most beautiful cricket ground in the world. With Table Mountain and Devil's Peak providing the perfect backdrop to this iconic cricket stage, Newlands has much to offer visitors and Capetonians alike.

Established in 1888, the ground, which has a capacity of 25,000, boasts a rich history and has witnessed most of cricket's greatest players in action. Whether you come to a match, go on a stadium tour or attend an event, the rich atmosphere of Newlands will charm you and capture your heart forever.



CAPE TOWN

ABOUT THE CITY



Cape Town is known for its harbour, for its natural setting in the Cape Floristic Region and for landmarks such as Table Mountain and Cape Point.

In 2014, the city was named the best place in the world to visit by both *The New York Times* and *The Daily Telegraph*.

Cape Town is one of South Africa's three capital cities, serving as the seat of the Parliament of South Africa. The legislative capital of the country, it is the oldest city in the country and the second largest after Johannesburg. Colloquially named the Mother City, it is the largest city of the Western Cape province, home to 66% of its population. It is managed by the City of Cape Town municipality.

The city has a long coastline on the Atlantic Ocean, which includes False Bay, and extends to the Hottentots Holland Mountains in the East. The Table Mountain National Park is within the city boundaries and there are several other nature reserves and marine protected areas within and adjacent to the city, protecting the diverse terrestrial and marine natural environments.

BOLAND PARK

PAARL



ICC WOMEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2023

Boland Park is a multi-purpose stadium in Paarl that provides a home to Boland cricket team, Cape Cobras and Paarl Royals. With a capacity of 10,000, it is one of the smaller stadiums in South Africa – but what it lacks in size, it makes up for in beauty.

Boland, meaning “Land Above” or “Top Country” in Afrikaans, is overlooked by the Boland Mountain Complex, part of a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Some of the hard-to-miss peaks reach 2,000 metres (6,560 feet), providing picturesque views to spectators relaxing on grassed hills in the shade of the many adjacent trees.

The ground made its international debut in 1997 with a historic tie between Zimbabwe and India. The stadium hosted three matches during the *ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2003*, one of which saw Canada register what was then the lowest completed innings in ODI history – 36 all out against Sri Lanka.



PAARL

ABOUT THE CITY



Famous for its scenic environment, viticulture and fruit-growing heritage, Paarl is the seat of the Drakenstein municipality – not part of the Cape Town metropolitan area but falling within its economic catchment.

Paarl – derived from *Parel*, or “pearl” in Dutch – is located in the Western Province of South Africa, located about 60 kilometres (37 miles) northeast of Cape Town. Paarl is unusual among South African place names in being pronounced differently in English than in Afrikaans. Indeed, Afrikaners customarily add an attachment to the name – saying not “*in Paarl*”, but rather “*in die Paarl*” or “*in die Pêrel*” – literally, “in the Paarl”.

The district is particularly well known for its Pearl Mountain (“Paarl Rock”). This huge granite rock consists of three rounded outcrops and has been compared in majesty to Uluru (Ayers Rock) in Australia. Paarl itself gained additional international attention when, on 11 February 1990, Nelson Mandela walked out of Victor Verster Prison (now Drakenstein Correctional Centre) after 27 years of imprisonment. A bronze statue of Mandela today stands outside the prison.

ST GEORGE'S PARK

GQEBERHA



ICC WOMEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2023

St George's Park is the oldest Test venue in South Africa – and is home to the Port Elizabeth Cricket Club, one of the oldest cricket clubs in the country. The ground, which has a capacity of 19,000, is notable for its brass band that plays during major matches, adding a unique flavour to its atmosphere.

The ground hosted its first Test Match in March 1889, when England defeated South Africa by eight wickets in South Africa's first Test match. There have now been 32 Test matches played here, the most recent being South Africa's 332-run triumph over Bangladesh in April 2022.

The first ODI at the ground took place in December 1992, when South Africa beat India by 6 wickets. The venue hosted five matches in the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup in 2003.

ABOUT THE CITY



ICC WOMEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2023



Gqeberha, formerly Port Elizabeth, is known for its many beaches along the city's urban coastline, its rich and diverse cultural heritage, its popularity as a holiday destination, and its status as a gateway city for the Eastern Cape's adventure, outdoor and African "Big Five" game safari tourism.

Gqeberha is the most populous city in the Eastern Cape province, the seat of the Nelson Mandela Bay municipality, South Africa's second-largest metropolitan district (by area size) and the sixth-most populous city in the country.

The city was founded as Port Elizabeth in 1820 by Sir Rufane Donkin, then the governor of the Cape, and named after his late wife Elizabeth. In 2019, the Eastern Cape Geographical Names Committee recommended that Port Elizabeth be renamed Gqeberha, after the Xhosa and Southern Khoe name for the Baakens River that flows through the city. The city's warm oceanic climate ranks it among the top cities in the world for pleasant year-round weather.

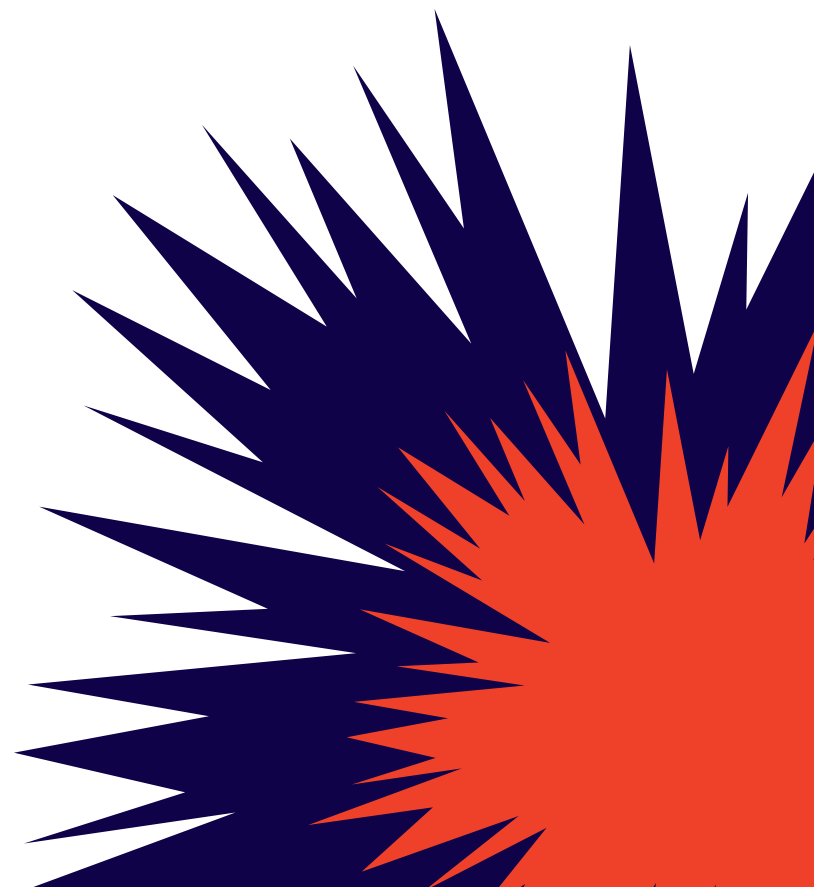

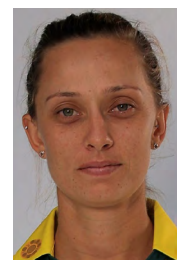

Those performances helped earn a call-up to the Australia squad for the tour of New Zealand in early 2021 where she made debuts in both ODI and T20I formats

She played six matches in Australia's march to glory in the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2022, and won a gold medal in the Commonwealth Games, taking six wickets

Her T20I debut finally came in December 2022, and she made it count, taking 3-22 on debut and then 4-8, including a hat-trick in the final match of the series

She was an unused member of the triumphant Australian squad who won the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2022, but was ever-present as Australia won Commonwealth gold later that year
