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
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TOURNAMENT INFORMATION

ABOUT THE TOURNAMENT

From the moment Chris Gayle scythed the first delivery of the inaugural *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup for four, a new form of entertainment was born.

A total of 20 teams will participate in the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup for the first time in 2024. The tournament also welcomes a new host – and three new teams, all set to make their bow on the biggest stage.

Ahead of the ninth edition of the tournament, let's take a look back at its past.

A BEHEMOTH IS BORN

Four years after the introduction of T20 cricket to the English county game in 2003, the first *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup took place in South Africa. The 2007 tournament catapulted the then-novel format into the mainstream at a time when the global leagues of today had yet to come into existence.

Two weeks of intoxicating cricket ended with a final for the ages between arch-rivals India and Pakistan in Johannesburg. Misbah-ul-Haq dragged Pakistan to the brink of victory, but a mistimed scoop with just six runs required from four deliveries handed *India* (pictured) the trophy. The dramatic ending put the seal on what Wisden described as a 'dream' debut tournament as the new format became an instant hit.

LEGENDS CREATED AND MEMORABLE MOMENTS

Pakistan earned revenge for their 2007 final defeat by winning the second *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup in 2009. Shahid Afridi's unbeaten 54 led Pakistan to an eight-wicket win over Sri Lanka at Lord's, which had

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earlier witnessed one of the great *ICC* World Cup shocks when the Netherlands upset hosts England.

England bounced back in 2010 to win their first white-ball silverware in the Caribbean (pictured overleaf). Craig Kieswetter's 63 led them to a seven-wicket victory over Australia in the final at the Kensington Oval in Bridgetown, Barbados, also the venue for the 2024 final.

West Indies lit up Colombo in 2012 (pictured overleaf). Led by top scorer Marlon Samuels' 78, the Windies beat hosts Sri Lanka in the final – inspiring some memorable 'Gangnam Style'-inspired celebrations. Sri Lanka, though, didn't have to wait long to lift the trophy, winning the next edition in Bangladesh in 2014. Playing in his final T20I, Kumar Sangakkara made an unbeaten 54 to lead his team past India, a fitting T20 swansong for Sangakkara and Mahela Jayawardene.

West Indies then became the first team to win two ICC Men's T20 World Cups with victory in 2016 on Indian soil. Marlon Samuels' unbeaten 85 was enough to give him his second ICC Men's T20 World Cup Final Player of the Match award – but the headlines went to Carlos Brathwaite, who struck four consecutive sixes off Ben Stokes in the final over to seal a four-wicket win.





Australia had won four of the five ICC Men's Cricket World Cups between 1999 and 2015 – but they had to wait until 2021 to lift their first ICC Men's T20 World Cup. Their eight-wicket win (pictured below) left New Zealand as the only previous ICC Men's T20 World Cup finalists who are yet to lift the trophy.

England come into the 2024 edition as the World Cup holders after their win in Australia in 2022 – when Player of the Tournament Sam Curran produced a Player of the Match display to see off Pakistan in the final.



LOOKING AHEAD

The ICC Men's T20 World Cup 2024 will break new ground – with 20 teams competing for the first time ever.

It will also be the first *ICC* World Cup tournament to feature matches played in the USA. And with 55 games on the schedule, it will also be the biggest cricket tournament in *ICC* history.

Three new teams will be welcomed to the top table, with the USA, Canada and Uganda all participating in their maiden *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup.

With new faces and new pitches, the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2024 promises to be more unpredictable and unforgettable than ever before.



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COMPETITION FORMAT

The expanded 20-team tournament also sees the debut for a new format.

GROUP STAGE

The 20 teams will be split into four groups of five in the first round, with each group containing two seeds (seed numbers in brackets).

Team will play every other team in their group in a round-robin format. The top two teams in each group will qualify for the Super 8 stage.

SUPER 8 STAGE

The eight qualifying teams from the group stage will then be divided into two groups of four for the Super 8 stage.

The top two teams in each first-round group will retain their seeding from the first round if they qualify for the Super 8, regardless of whether they finish first or second. If either seeded team from a particular group fails to qualify, the qualifying team assumes their seeding for the Super 8s.

To use Group A as an example:

- India are seeded A1 and Pakistan are seeded A2.
- If India and Pakistan both qualify for the Super 8, they will retain their seedings – so India would go forward as A1 even if they finish second in Group A.
- If Pakistan top Group A and an unseeded team qualifies in second place, Pakistan would still go forward as A2, while the unseeded qualifier would become A1 for the purposes of the Super 8 draw.

The four teams in each group will play one another in a round-robin format, with the top two teams in each group going forward to the knockout stages.

KNOCKOUT STAGE

The top two teams from each group will progress to the semi-finals, which take place on consecutive days in Trinidad & Tobago and Guyana.

The winners of the two semi-finals will then go forward to the final on Saturday 29 June 2024 in Bridgetown, Barbados.



HOW THE TEAMS QUALIFIED



The biggest ICC Men's T20 World Cup in history will include more teams and more matches than ever before.

For the first time, 20 nations will take to the stage and battle for world glory in the United States and West Indies across 55 matches and four weeks of thrilling action.

You may be familiar with the teams but here is a refresher on how they got here.

THE HOSTS:
USA. West Indies

West Indies (pictured left) and the USA earned automatic entry as the host nations, with the USA set to play in the tournament for the first time.

Two-time winners West Indies will host the competition for the second time after staging the 2010 tournament, which saw England beat Australia in the final. As it did in 2010, the Kensington Oval in Bridgetown, Barbados, will again host the final.

TOP EIGHT FROM THE ICC MEN'S T20 WORLD CUP 2022:

England, Pakistan, India, New Zealand, Australia, Netherlands, South Africa, Sri Lanka

The top eight teams from the last *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup in Australia all ensured automatic qualification to the tournament's ninth edition.

England recorded their second ICC Men's T20 World Cup title as Ben Stokes steered his side to victory with the bat in the final after Player of the Tournament Sam Curran (pictured right) helped restrict runners-up Pakistan (pictured overleaf) to 137.

Beaten semi-finalists *India* and *New Zealand* also secured their passage for 2024. India will be looking to build on their runners-up finish in the *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cup 2023, while the Black Caps will be hoping to add their name to the trophy for the first time.

The sides that finished third and fourth in the two Super 12 groups in 2022 also secured qualification: former winners *Australia* and *Sri Lanka*;

two-time semi-finalists *South Africa*; and the *Netherlands*, who achieved their best *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup finish.

ICC MEN'S T201 TEAM RANKINGS:

Afghanistan, Bangladesh

Afghanistan and Bangladesh qualified as the next two highest-ranked unqualified teams in the ICC Men's T20I Team Rankings as of 14 November 2022, the day after the end of the previous ICC Men's T20 World Cup.

The Tigers came close to a couple of shock victories last time out and will be hoping to build on that, while Afghanistan players such as Rashid Khan and Qais Ahmad will be tapping into their experiences of Major League Cricket to aid their team's cause.



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REGIONAL QUALIFIERS:

Scotland, Ireland, Papua New Guinea, Canada, Nepal, Oman, Namibia, Uganda

The remaining eight spots were determined at five regional qualifiers, which took place between July and November 2023.

The first two teams to secure their spots at the Europe Qualifier (20–28 July 2023) were hosts *Scotland*, who topped the table with a perfect six wins from six matches, and *Ireland*, who finished second thanks in no small part to a crucial seven-run victory over Italy.


The East Asia-Pacific Qualifier (22–29 July 2023) was also won by the hosts: *Papua New Guinea*, who recorded a perfect run to reach their second *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup.

The Americas Qualifier (30 September – 7 October 2023) was won by *Canada*, who snuck past hosts Bermuda on net run rate to reach the main event for the first time.

Oman and hosts Nepal secured their places through the Asia Qualifier (30 October – 5 November 2023). The pair defeated Bahrain and UAE respectively in the last four, before Oman won a thrilling final following a super over to cap an unbeaten tournament.

The World Cup line-up was completed at the Africa Qualifier (22–30 November 2023). Hosts *Namibia* went unbeaten to secure their place for the third straight edition. And they were joined by *Uganda*, who beat Zimbabwe – their debut T20I win over an *ICC* Full Member – en route to qualifying for their first *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup.





THE TROPHY

The ICC Men's T20 World Cup trophy is based on the field dynamics of balls being hit to the boundary and fielders returning them in an interactive process. Designed and manufactured by Links of London, it has a sense of open space and vigour, and captures the constant movements of T20 cricket. Made of silver and rhodium, it represents a youthful and edgy design.

PLAYING CONDITIONS

The full playing conditions for the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2024 are available in the Resources section of the **Online Media Zone**, and on the *ICC*'s official website at icc-cricket.com.

ICC CODE OF CONDUCT

The ICC Code of Conduct is part of the ICC's continuing efforts to maintain the public image, popularity and integrity of cricket by providing: (a) an effective means to deter any participant from conducting themselves improperly on and off the field of play, or in a manner that is contrary to the 'spirit of cricket'; and (b) a robust disciplinary procedure pursuant to which all matters of improper conduct can be dealt with fairly, with certainty and in an expeditious manner.

THE DUCKWORTH-LEWIS-STERN METHOD

The Duckworth-Lewis-Stern (D-L-S) method sets revised targets in rain-interrupted limited-overs matches, taking into consideration the runscoring resources at the disposal of the two sides. Information on the D-L-S method can be found on the ICC website.

ILLEGAL BOWLING

An Illegal Bowling Action is where a player is throwing rather than bowling the ball. This is defined by the *ICC* as being where the player's elbow extends by an amount of more than 15 degrees between their arm reaching the horizontal and the ball being released. Match Officials in international cricket use the naked eye and their cricketing experience to decide whether they believe a player may be using an Illegal Bowling Action and, if so, they will submit a report.

ANTI-CORRUPTION

Cricket is considered by many to be a world leader in the fight against corruption in sport and strives to do its best to work towards the vision to 'Keep Cricket Clean'. All players and officials who take part in the top level of international cricket pass through the Anti-Corruption Unit (ACU)'s education programme.

The ICC's Anti-Corruption Managers coordinate the ACU's prevention measures and are present at tournaments and international series to ensure that strict anti-corruption protocols are enforced at all venues, particularly around the dressing room areas. ANTI-DOPING


Th *ICC* has a zero-tolerance approach to doping and is a signatory to the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) since July 2006. The *ICC* Anti-Doping Code, compliant with the World Anti-Doping Code, ensures cricket plays its part in the global fight against drugs in sport. ANTI-DISCRIMINATION

The *ICC* has a strict Anti-Discrimination Code that confirms a level of commitment from the *ICC* and its Members to promote and encourage participation at all levels, regardless of race, religion, culture, colour, descent, national or ethnic origin and to ensure that there is no discrimination in the sport.

The diverse history and culture of the game draws people together. There is a strong tradition of fans from rival teams enjoying matches alongside each other, while cricket players too are known to mingle with each other and often help each other out with the technicalities of the game. THE WEST INDIES EFFECT

The ICC Men's T20 World Cup returns to the Caribbean, providing the West Indies with a chance rekindle their former glories as co-hosts with the USA.

Winners of the first two *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cups in 1975 and 1979, the Windies have also lifted the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup on two occasions, in 2012 and 2016.

Only Pakistan have made the semi-finals on more occasions than the West Indies, who have done so four times, but each of the last two campaigns have been disappointing.

One win in 2021 was followed by elimination in the first round a year later – but under new white ball coach Daren Sammy, there has been an uptick in performances.

Series victories at home over India and England were a reminder of just how destructive their batting line-up can be.

And the Windies were knocked out at the Super 8 stage the last time the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup was held in the Caribbean in 2010, there is no reason why they should not be dangerous this time around.

The feelgood factor around the side has stretched across multiple formats, not least following a sensational Test victory in Australia to share the series Down Under.

Shamar Joseph was the newcomer who grabbed all the headlines in that series. It is a sign of how quickly his star has risen that he is still to make his white-ball debut for the Windies, but Sammy has already talked



him up as a potential World Cup bolter. If he can translate the red-ball heroics to the shortest format, then the Windies' bowling attack will start to look formidable.

His namesake Alzarri Joseph has established himself as the go-to man with the new ball, a strike rate of 14.4 putting him among the most dangerous bowlers in the game in the 2020s.

Add in the all-round talents of Romario Shepherd and Jason Holder, and spinners Akeal Hosein and

Roston Chase, and there is plenty of talent with the ball.

That is without mentioning that this will possibly be the final time we will see Andre Russell in a West Indies shirt.

"Dre Russ" is one of the many explosive options in the side, with Nicholas Pooran, Johnson Charles and skipper Rovman Powell also capable of taking the game away from the opposition in a matter of overs.

Recent tournament form has not lived up to that potential, but on home soil and with some form to call upon, there is reason to believe this year could be different.

If it is, then Sammy will truly have something on which to build. This is the man who captained the Windies to their two previous T20 World Cup successes, after all.

Could he have the Midas touch once more? As cricket heads back to the Caribbean, you just never know.





CRICKET IN THE USA

The USA will make their *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup debut when they co-host the tournament in June and excitement is at fever pitch.

Two decades on from their appearance at the ICC Champions Trophy, the Americans return to the global cricketing stage. Captained by Monank Patel, they'll hope to make the most of home advantage – with matches to look forward to at Grand Prairie Cricket Stadium in Dallas, Broward County Stadium in Lauderhill and Nassau County International Cricket Stadium in New York.

It marks the next step in the growth of cricket in a country with a long history within the sport – and an exciting future, with an Olympic return on the cards after a 128-year absence when Los Angeles hosts the 2028 Games.

USA played their first international match in 1844 against Canada, their opponents in the *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cup opener on 1 June 2024, making it the oldest rivalry in world cricket.

The sport remained popular in the mid- to late 19th century, helped by the exploits of the Philadelphia cricket team, who played first-class matches until 1913. Interest has surged once more in the 21st century, which has seen the USA make their mark in the international arena.

Victory in the *ICC* 6 Nations Challenge 2004 saw them qualify for the *ICC* Champions Trophy 2004, at which they played their first-ever ODI in the Group A curtain-raiser against New Zealand.



Their first T20I arrived in 2019 against the UAE, followed two years later by a maiden victory against a Test-playing nation when Ireland were beaten by 26 runs in Lauderhill.

Further steps were taken in 2023, when the USA made it through to the *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cup Qualifier for the first time in 18 years. Their bid to make it to the showpiece in India ended at the group stage, but their campaign contained plenty of memorable moments – not least Gajanand Singh's unbeaten century, which gave West Indies a scare in an eventual 39-run defeat. Shayan Jahangir also reached three figures at the competition with a 79-ball ton against Nepal. The USA will be relying on the 29-year-old Singh and hard-hitting Aaron Jones to power their batting line-up come June.

The New York-born Jones has an ODI high score of 123, achieved against Scotland in 2022, and will relish the chance to take on the Netherlands at Nassau County International Cricket Stadium.

Having made his List A debut for his country in 2016, he is well placed to observe the changes that have taken place in the intervening years.

"A lot has changed in terms of facilities and investment in cricket in the US," he told the *ICC* in 2023.

"There are more grass wickets around, as opposed to AstroTurf and matting, and the amount of quality players we have to play against has gone up.

"We want to grow the sport in our country and play in World Cups. When we move on, we want to leave something behind for the youngsters to look up to. It is very important for us to have a legacy."

Positive results this summer will only serve to cement the legacy Jones and his teammates are seeking.

The USA knows from the explosion in interest in soccer since 1994 how hosting a World Cup can lead to a surge in momentum – and now it's cricket's turn to ride a similar wave.



MEET THE ASSOCIATE MEMBERS

No fewer than nine of the teams at the ICC Men's T20 World Cup will be Associate Members - and three will be making their debuts.



CANADA

Canada are set to make their ICC Men's T20 World Cup debut. However, they're no strangers to the global stage, having appeared at four ICC Men's Cricket World Cups – most recently in 2011.

They've never been beyond the group stage, but will be determined to spring a surprise. They'll do so this time around on North American soil, having booked their place with victory in the Americas Qualifier.

An opening match against the USA, the oldest rivalry in cricket, is an enticing start. They'll then take on Ireland, when they'll be hoping for a similar result to the two teams' first-ever meeting four years ago – when Canada won by four runs.



All-rounder Harsh Thaker (pictured) has the ability to win matches for Canada with bat or ball in hand. The 26-year-old has impressed in both limited overs formats in the past year and will be determined to step up to the plate this summer.

NAMIBIA

Namibia return for their third consecutive appearance at an *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup after cruising through the Africa Qualifier with a perfect record.

The Eagles reached the Super 12 on their ICC Men's T20 World Cup debut in 2021 thanks to victories over

Netherlands and Ireland, then narrowly missed out on reaching the same stage in 2022 despite defeating Sri Lanka.

They'll be hopeful of reaching the knockout stages again – but they'll first need to navigate their first ever T20Is against England and Australia.

One to watch

Captain Gerhard Erasmus (pictured) is the man that makes Namibia tick. The all-rounder has been there from the very start, appearing in Namibia's first-ever T20I, and has been influential ever since. The 2023 ICC Associate Cricketer of the Year will hope his influence continues this summer.



Nepal are set for their first *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup appearance for a decade after booking their ticket with a runners-up place in the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup Asia Qualifier.

The Rhinos pushed winners Oman all the way to a super over in Kirtipur and will take plenty of heart from their impressive performances, which also included a victory over the UAE in the semi-final.

Their last ICC Men's T20 World Cup appearance in 2014 ended in a narrow exit at the first stage despite winning two of their three games. Ten years later, they'll be determined to hang around a little longer.



One to watch

Opener Rohit Paudel (pictured) has been key to recent Nepalese success, and will continue to be so this summer. The Nepalese captain is just 21 years old but is the lynchpin of his side, and his runs from the top of the order will be crucial.





NETHERLANDS

Netherlands are no stranger to the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup and will look to make it back-to-back progressions from the group stage. The Dutch reached the Super 12s in 2022 before bowing out, and will aim to make it to the Super 8s this time.

Their record at the 2022 tournament confirmed their spot at the 2024 edition – and their performances since then, including a first-ever victory over South Africa later that year, have provided plenty of further encouragement.

The Dutch will be hoping for a repeat result when they meet the Proteas again in Group D, which also features Bangladesh, Nepal and Sri Lanka.



Big-hitting Max O'Dowd (pictured) will hope to continue to lead from the front.

The top T20I run scorer in Netherlands cricket history and one of only two Dutchmen ever to make a T20I century, the opening batter will be determined to extend his record this summer.



OMAN

Oman return to the biggest stage in men's T201 cricket after missing out in 2022, and will be determined to make up for lost time.

They booked their place at this year's event with victory in the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup Asia Qualifier, defeating Bahrain in the semi-final to book their ticket before taking home the trophy with a dramatic super over victory against Nepal – who also qualified through the event.

Oman have never made it beyond the group stages of an *ICC* Men's World Cup and will hope to put that right in 2024. However, they'll need to break records to do so, having never beaten Australia, England, Namibia or Scotland – their four opponents in Group B.

One to watch

Vice-captain Aqib Ilyas (pictured) will look to hold the side together through his work with bat and ball. The 31-year-old is one of the most experienced members of the squad. Named Player of the Tournament in the Asia Qualifier, he'll look to repeat those performances in the USA and the Caribbean.

PAPUA NEW GUINEA

Papua New Guinea are back for their second *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup and will be determined to better their 2021 showing, where they finished 16th.

There have been positive strides since then, including comfortable qualification via victory in the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup East Asia-Pacific Qualifier, as well as regular victories over other Associate Member nations.

The key will be whether this side can make the step up and earn a victory over one of the three Test-playing nations in Group C, something PNG have never done before.



One to watch

No man has scored more T20I runs for PNG than Tony Ura (pictured), and the 34-year-old will hope to pile on some more this summer. Ura was part of PNG's first-ever T20I squad in 2015 and has been integral to the side ever since, top-scoring against both Japan and Philippines in qualification.


SCOTLAND

Scotland make their fourth straight appearance at an *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup and will have their eyes set on reaching the knockout stages for only the second time after impressing in qualification.

The Scots edged out Test-playing nation and neighbours Ireland to earn top spot in the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup Europe Qualifier, a feat that will give them plenty of confidence for their chances across the Atlantic.

An opening match against England is a mouthwatering prospect, and Scotland will be hoping to set out their stall as they look to match their 2021 achievement of progressing from the groups.





Bowler Brad Currie (pictured) could be a match winner for Scotland, with the 25-year-old starring in qualification. Currie posted 5-13 in the final against Ireland, the best-ever T20I figures from a Scot, and will hope to take that form into the summer.




UGANDA

Uganda make their World Cup debut in the USA and Caribbean after finishing second in the ICC Men's T20 World Cup Africa Qualifier behind Namibia.

The Cricket Cranes pulled off victory

over a Test-playing nation at the first attempt with a win over Zimbabwe in qualifying, and will look to pull off the same feat when they face Afghanistan, New Zealand, PNG and co-hosts West Indies in Group C at the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2024.

Uganda's success at reaching an *ICC* World Cup final tournament at the ninth attempt sparked jubilant scenes – and after being made to wait for so long, they'll hope to make their mark.



Riazat Ali Shah (pictured) was the star of Uganda's victory over Zimbabwe, and the all-rounder will be determined to match that form in the summer. Shah scored 42 off 28 balls against Zimbabwe, and both his quick middle-order hitting and his effective medium pace will be key to Ugandan success.



USA

Co-hosts USA make their *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup debut in 2024, with an opening match against Canada in Texas the perfect way to announce themselves.

It has been a rapid rise for the US since playing their first T20I against the UAE only five years ago – but American cricket has gone from strength to strength, with their first victories coming against the Cayman Islands later that year.

A first win against a Test-playing nation came with victory over Ireland in 2021, something they will look to repeat in the World Cup group stage when they meet in Lauderhill.



Batter Aaron Jones (pictured) will again form the bedrock of the batting line-up. The New Yorker, a mainstay of the American line-up, boasts an ODI high score of 123*, and will be key to American fortunes.



MEDIA ACCREDITATION

The ICC has accredited media from all over the world for the ICC Men's T20 World Cup 2024. The tournament will be operating under a high-trust model, and therefore all accredited media and participants are requested to practice safe behaviour for the duration of the event.

As in previous tournaments, the *ICC* will follow its priority order in allotting match-day seats. This is done in tandem by the *ICC* Media and Accreditation teams, keeping in mind the teams playing. We follow the general principles outlined in the media advisory and FAQs document on accreditation, which we shared at the start of the accreditation process.

Media accreditation passes may be collected from the venues. Reporters will be allotted seats and a limited number of photographers will be allotted photo positions keeping in mind the biosafety protocols.

Updates through the tournament will be sent out either individually or to the tournament media email list that we maintain. Please remember to read our advisories: there may be changes in protocols, biosafety measures or the way the media interactions are conducted, whether owing to changes in government guidelines or on advice from our own colleagues.

WHAT IF MY ACCREDITATION IS LOST?

If your tournament accreditation pass is lost or stolen, please report it to the accreditation team and make a formal complaint at the nearest police station. Upon completion of the lost/stolen declaration form, the tournament accreditation will be replaced providing the individual has appropriate ID. If the original tournament accreditation is found, it should be surrendered, and the police should be informed.

Please note that no additional temporary or match day passes will be provided.



CODE OF CONDUCT FOR MEDIA

Please note that all accredited Non-Rights Holders (NRH) media must adhere to the code of conduct for the tournament, as well as the tournament media terms and conditions agreed to while signing the accreditation form.

Accreditation cards of journalists will be cancelled if they are found to behave in an inappropriate manner at any of the venues.

The ICC has a zero-tolerance policy towards racism and sexual harassment, and action will be taken immediately in any such case, which could include suspension of the accreditation card and blacklisting from all ICC events.

Journalists could also face suspension from future matches or have their accreditation revoked if they are found to be in violation of other terms and conditions, including those of video and audio recordings at venues.

NO SHOWS

Journalists who have changed their plans – those withdrawing from the tournament, those who become unavailable to attend particular matches, and/or those who need to change their selection of matches – must please send details in an e-mail to media-accreditation@icc-cricket.com.

Failure to do so could affect their chances of attending future *ICC* events. Journalists not informing us of their inability to attend any match of this tournament may not be given a match ticket for subsequent games.



GUIDELINES FOR NON-RIGHTS HOLDER (NRH) MEDIA

All the points listed below are detailed in the Terms and Conditions and the FAQs document available on the accreditation portal and in the Resources section of the Online Media Zone.

MATCH DAYS

- Filming of any kind is strictly prohibited for non-rights holders in any area inside a match venue on a match day. This includes (but is not limited to): match action, fans and stadium concourse areas, press conferences, media box(es), and team training/practise sessions.
- Video cameras are not allowed inside venues on match days.
- Live-scoring, commentary and radio broadcasts are not allowed from inside venues on match days.
- •Any photography and filming from the media box is prohibited.

NON-MATCH DAYS

- •Access to training sessions will only be allowed on match day -1 (the day prior to a game) and match day -2.
- Training sessions on non-match days may be filmed, but only from zones determined by the *ICC*.
- Filming shall not exceed ten (10) minutes in total, of which a maximum of five (5) minutes may be live.
- NRH are permitted to film media conferences that take place on non-match days.
- Footage cannot be published natively (directly) on any social media channel, including but not limited to YouTube, from any tournament match, warm-up match, practice venue or any other event during the tournament.
- Videos may be embedded in news articles on websites for editorial purposes only, and the link to this webpage may be shared on social media channels.

Footage of media conferences obtained from the *ICC*'s Online Media Zone may be used in addition to the filming time allowed under the same terms of usage.

IN ADDITION, PLEASE NOTE:

- Accreditation must be worn at all times inside venues on match days and non-match days.
- Only ICC-appointed photographers are allowed to take pictures at media conferences.
- If you intend to film non-matchday press conferences on a mobile phone, please occupy the back rows at press conferences so as not to disturb others.
- Phones and recorders are not allowed on the head table during media conferences.

All of these will be available to registered members of the media for free editorial use, giving credit to the ICC.

The ICC has arranged for video coverage, transcripts and translations of pre-match and post-match media conferences to be available on the OMZ shortly after they have been conducted.

The Resources section of the OMZ will have other important reference documents, including the Playing Conditions, stats packs, and media accreditation terms and conditions.

Videos provided on the OMZ may be used on websites but not on social media. All editorial content must give credit to the *ICC*.

KEY FEATURES OF THE OMZ

Previews, announcements and feature articles

There will be several build-up articles and announcements ahead of the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2024, as well as feature articles and columns during the tournament. These will include write-ups on previous editions, broadcast and digital plans, as well as commercial partnerships.

Photographs

A selection of photographs from promotional events and other iconic images will be available for free editorial use. These will include images from the tournament launch, the pre-final photo shoot of captains and post-tournament photographs. Please note: match-day and training photographs will not be available on the OMZ.

Media conference videos

Unedited videos of all pre-match and post-match media conferences will be available in the OMZ. Most of these media conference videos will also be live-streamed on *ICC*'s social media channels.

Transcripts and translations

Transcripts of all pre-match and post-match press conferences will be uploaded on the OMZ within 30 minutes of completion. Translations to English from other languages will be provided within two hours.





NASSAU COUNTY INTERNATIONAL CRICKET STADIUM



Nassau County International Cricket Stadium is a new temporary modular stadium, a first for international cricket. The 34,000-seat stadium is scheduled to host eight World Cup matches, including India v Pakistan on 9 June.

Sustainability is at the forefront of the project, utilising grandstands previously used for the Formula 1 Las Vegas Grand Prix. The same infrastructure will be reused elsewhere following the completion of the tournament when the venue is disassembled. The design team behind this ambitious project is Populous – renowned for creating some of the world's most iconic stadia, including the Narendra Modi Stadium in Ahmedabad and the Tottenham Hotspur Stadium in London.

BROWARD COUNTY STADIUM



Broward County Stadium in Lauderhill, Florida is one of two permanent cricket stadiums in the United States and is owned and operated by Broward County. Opening in 2007, the stadium was the first US cricket venue to receive certification by the *ICC* to host international matches, and hosted its first T20I series in 2010, featuring New Zealand and Sri Lanka.

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ANTIGUA & BARBUDA



This twin-island paradise in the heart of the Caribbean features superb coastlines, friendly and welcoming people, pink and white-sandy beaches, crystal clear water and the most satisfying and enjoyable climate.

Antigua (108 square miles) is hugged by 95 miles of coastline, and people travel from all over the world to visit the amazing sights, none more captivating than English Harbour and Shirley Heights. They also come to watch cricket, which is more than just a mere sport on Antigua: it's one of the major passions on the island.

Barbuda (62 square miles), meanwhile, is surrounded by protective reefs and features a large lagoon – and one of the world's largest breeding and nesting colonies of the magnificent frigatebird.

SIR VIVIAN RICHARDS STADIUM



Sir Vivian Richards Stadium is named in honour of one of the greatest cricketers of all time and Antigua's national hero, and a statue of the great man stands majestically at the entrance. Completed in 2006, the venue hosted its first ODI during the *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cup 2007. More recently, it hosted the semi-finals and final of the first ever *ICC* Women's T20 World Cup in 2018.

The venue is dominated by the North Stands (with seating depicting the national flag) and the five-storey South Stands, with grass terraces either side of the field to provide different viewing experiences. In 2015, the North and South Ends were renamed in honour of newly knighted fast bowlers Sir Curtly Ambrose and Sir Andy Roberts.

BARBADOS

KENSINGTON OVAL



Cricket was first played in 1882 at Kensington Oval. The first Test match, which was also the first hosted in the West Indies, was played in 1930 – a draw between the West Indies and England.

The stands are named in honour of the country's cricketing greats – the Garfield Sobers Pavilion, the Worrell, Walcott & Weekes Stand, the Greenidge & Haynes Stand and the Hall & Griffith Stand. Statues of Sobers, Wes Hall and Charlie Griffith stand at the entrance. The ground was redeveloped for the *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cup 2007, when it hosted the final, before hosting the finals of the *ICC* Men's and Women's T20 World Cups in 2010. It is also home to the Barbados Pride and the Barbados Royals.

GUYANA



Cricket forms a major part of the national identity of Guyana, a former British colony – and the only nation in South America to host cricket at the highest level.

England and the West Indies first played here in 1930 at the Bourda Ground, the spiritual home of cricket in Guyana. Cricketing landmarks in Georgetown include the Georgetown, Demerara and Everest Cricket Clubs, Malteenoes Sport Club, and streets named after players such as Sir Clive Lloyd, Lance Gibbs and Shivnarine Chanderpaul.

Georgetown comes alive when the Guyanese go about their daily routines at places such as Stabroek Market in the heart of the city. Close by stands St George's Anglican Cathedral, the tallest wooden building in the world. Away from the city is Kaieteur Falls, a breathtaking must-see and the world's largest single-drop waterfall located in Kaieteur National Park in the Amazon rainforest.

GUYANA NATIONAL STADIUM



Guyana National Stadium was built for the *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cup 2007, when it hosted six matches – including the contest between Sri Lanka and South Africa, when Lasith Malinga became the first bowler in international cricket to take four wickets in four balls. It has since hosted marches in the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2010, the *ICC* Women's T20 World Cup 2018 and the *ICC* U19 Men's World Cup 2022, plus West Indies internationals in all three formats and the finals of the Caribbean Premier League.

Also known as Providence Stadium, the venue stands around 9km south of Georgetown in Providence. It boasts three major stands and a grass mound that can accommodate 4,000 people, giving an overall capacity of approximately 15,000.

SAINT LUCIA




Saint Lucia is the quintessential island paradise, known worldwide for the majestic peaks of the Piton Mountains and its stunning ocean views.

Castries, the capital, is home to the country's busiest seaport and nearly one-third of the island's population. Much of Saint Lucia's history is still visible through its eye-catching mix of French and British architecture. Derek Walcott Square, located in the heart of the city, contains bronze busts of two Nobel laureates: Sir William Arthur Lewis, who won the Nobel Prize for Economics in 1979, and Sir Derek Walcott, who won the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1992. Another highlight for any visitor is a trip to one of the highest peaks – the world-famous Piton Mountains, majestically perched in the west.

DAREN SAMMY CRICKET STADIUM



The Beausejour Ground was renamed the Daren Sammy Cricket Ground in 2016 to honour the West Indies captain who led the team to victories in both the 2012 and 2016 editions of the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup – the first captain to do so. At the same time, the stand to the west was renamed for Johnson Charles, a member of those victorious teams.

The stadium was built in 2002, and four years later hosted the first ever day/night ODI in the West Indies. It has since hosted the semi-finals of the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2007 and the ICC Men's and Women's T20 World Cups in 2010, as well as the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2018. With a capacity of over 12,200, it is the home of the Saint Lucia national team and the Saint Lucia Kings in the Caribbean Premier League.

SAINT VINCENT & THE GRENADINES




Saint Vincent and the 32 Grenadines islands are located in the south-eastern Windward Islands, south of St Lucia and west of Barbados – and are home to one of the West Indies' most scenic cricket grounds.

Saint Vincent, the main island, is also home to the capital, Kingstown (not to be confused with Kingston, Jamaica). Located on the south-western end of the island, Kingstown overlooks Kingstown Harbour, and is home to a number of notable heritage sites – including the Botanical Gardens, the Georgian-style St George's Cathedral, and other 18th- and 19th-century buildings including the courthouse and the House of Assembly.



ARNOS VALE SPORTS STADIUM



Arnos Vale is one the most picturesque cricket grounds in the West Indies. The stadium is the central sporting point on the island of Saint Vincent, and is used for matches involving the Saint Vincent & the Grenadines men's and women's cricket teams, the Windward Islands Volcanoes and the Saint Vincent & the Grenadines national football team.

Arnos Vale hosted its first ODI in 1981, with West Indies beating England by two runs thanks to Colin Croft's career-best figures of 6-15. The first Test match took place in June 1997, when the West Indies hosted Sri Lanka. And in March 2012, a capacity crowd packed into the stands to witness a famous tie in an ODI between West Indies and Australia.

Trinidad & Tobago is a twin island republic famous for its carnival season, which is among the largest and most vibrant in the world.


Port of Spain, the capital, is home to the Queen's Park Oval, one of the most famous sporting venues in the Caribbean. The Brian Lara Cricket Academy, meanwhile, is located in Tarouba, San Fernando, about 50km from the capital.

Cricket fans visit to pay homage to the islands' sporting heritage: Brian Lara, one of the greatest ever to play the game, was born in Santa Cruz, Trinidad. Other travellers, though, head here for Carnival – "The Greatest Show on Earth", as some call it, which features music, street parades and a fabulous celebration of island culture.

BRIAN LARA CRICKET ACADEMY



The Brian Lara Cricket Academy is a state-of-the-art competition venue and training facility for the development of world-class cricketers. Since opening in 2017, the venue has hosted men's and women's internationals featuring West Indies, India and England, with the first men's T20I held here in 2022 – the same year that the venue hosted matches during the *ICC* U19 Men's World Cup 2022.

The Brian Lara Cricket Academy has also become the destination for premium social events. From weddings and other formal functions to festivals and Carnival parties, the venue meets the needs of Trinidad & Tobago's multicultural society.

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Bulawayo in 2015

Playing in his fourth ICC Men's T20 World Cup

Afghanistan's first global cricketing superstar, he took 11 wickets in the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2016 and opened the 2021 tournament with 4-9 against Scotland

He became the youngest player to top the *ICC* Men's ODI Bowling Rankings, the fastest to 100 ODI and T20I wickets and the first bowler to take four wickets in four balls in T20I cricket

He led his team with 11 wickets in the ICC Men's Cricket World Cup 2023, as well as contributing 105 runs with the bat

AZMATULLAH OMARZAI





DOB: 24 Mar 2000 BORN: Kunar STYLE: RHB/RMF

Made his T201 debut against Bangladesh at Mirpur in 2022

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 World Cup

Having been part of Afghanistan's squad for the ICC U19 Men's Cricket World Cup 2018, he went on to represent them in the 2018 ACC Emerging Teams Asia Cup

He enjoyed an excellent start to his T20I career, taking 2-31 and 3-22 in his first two matches

He played two matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2022 but had more success the following year, striking 353 runs in the *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cup 2023 including three half-centuries

FAREED AHMAD





DOB: 10 Aug 1994 BORN: Nangarhar STYLE: LHB/LFM

Made his T20I debut against UAE at Dubai in 2016

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 World Cup

A talented left-arm seamer, he made a strong start to his T20I career, picking up 11 wickets in his first seven matches, before injury and poor form plagued him

He made a successful return to national colours in 2021, and bowled well in the 2022 Asia Cup, taking 3-31 against Pakistan

He went on to play two matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2022, but was only named a reserve player for the World Cup the following year

Made his T20I debut against Zimbabwe at Abu Dhabi in 2021

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 World Cup

He represented Afghanistan in the *ICC* U19 Men's Cricket World Cup 2020, then Chennai Super Kings included him as a net bowler in their squad for the 2021 IPL

He took six wickets in his first three T20I matches, and enjoyed a successful Asia Cup in 2022, taking 3-11 against Sri Lanka and 3-31 against Pakistan

He bowled well to take 2-29 against Australia in the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2022, and took six wickets in six matches in the *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cup 2023

GULBADIN NAIB

Made his T20I debut against the West Indies at Lucknow in 2019

Playing in his second ICC Men's T20 World Cup

He was the leading run-scorer for Afghanistan in the ICC U19 Men's Cricket World Cup 2018 with 186 runs, and repeated the feat two years later in South Africa with 240 runs

He batted superbly in the 2022 Asia Cup, where he was Afghanistan's top-scorer with 196 runs at an average of 65.33

He played all eight of Bangladesh's games in the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup, taking 3-19 in his first match against Scotland and striking 27 against South Africa

Playing only three games in the *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cup 2023, he took 4-71 against England at Dharamsala

Made his T201 debut against New Zealand at Hamilton in 2021

He starred with nine wickets as Bangladesh won the *ICC* U19 Men's Cricket World Cup 2020, and went on to take four wickets in his four matches in the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2021

He ended the *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cup 2023 as his team's joint-leading wicket-taker with 10, and led all bowlers in the 2023/24 BPL with 22 victims

He struck a superb 169 in ODI cricket against New Zealand at Nelson in December 2023 and became the fastest Bangladesh player to score 2,000 ODI runs

Made his T20I debut against England at Mirpur in 2023

Playing in his first ICC Men's T20 World Cup

Selected to represent the Bangladesh Emerging Players against the touring Ireland Wolves in early 2021, he took 13 wickets in the four-day game to give his side an innings victory

He was joint-leading wicket-taker for Comilla Victorians in the 2023/24 BPL with 13 wickets at just 20.76 apiece as his side reached the final

He enjoyed a superb *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup 2022, taking 4-25 against the Netherlands and 3-19 against Zimbabwe, but could only add five wickets across seven matches in the *ICC* Men's Cricket World Cup 2023

He bettered that score the following year, when he struck an unbeaten 121 against Panama in the *ICC* Men's T20 World Cup Americas Qualifier in 2023

In the 2023 Men's National T20 Championship, he ended as the highest run scorer with 143 runs but at a strike rate of just 88.82

He started his Test career in spectacular form, and became the fastest player to reach 1,000 Test runs in terms of balls faced

No mug with the bat, he struck an unbeaten 95 at number 8 to almost bring about an incredible ODI victory against India at Pune in March 2021

He was named Player of the Tournament in the ICC Men's T20 World Cup 2022 in which he took 13 wickets, including 5-10 against Afghanistan and 3-12 against Pakistan in the final at Melbourne

He starred in the summer of 2023, striking a century before lunch against Ireland in the Lord's Test and making an undefeated century against the same opposition at Bristol

A late replacement, he took a five-wicket haul on his Test debut to bring about a memorable win in Rawalpindi in December 2022
